A few years ago Pope Francis met, before Christmas, with Vatican employees (mostly lay people with families) and asked them to do 10 things. The list sounded remarkably like suggestions for New Year's resolutions:

- Take care of your spiritual life, your relationship with God, because this is the backbone of everything we do and everything we are.
- Take care of your family life, giving your children and loved ones not just money, but most of all your time, attention and love.
- Take care of your relationships with others, transforming your faith into life and your words into good works, especially on behalf of the needy.
- Be careful how you speak, purify your tongue of offensive words, vulgarity and worldly decadence.
- Heal wounds of the heart with the oil of forgiveness, forgiving those who have hurt us and medicating the wounds we have caused others.
- Look after your work, doing it with enthusiasm, humility, competence, passion and with a spirit that knows how to thank the Lord.
- Be careful of envy, lust, hatred and negative feelings that devour our interior peace and transform us into destroyed and destructive people.
- Watch out for anger that can lead to vengeance; for laziness that leads to existential euthanasia; for pointing the finger at others, which leads to pride; and for complaining continually, which leads to desperation.
- Take care of brothers and sisters who are weaker ... the elderly, the sick, the hungry, the homeless and strangers, because we will be judged on this.

The moment of Jesus' baptism was the beginning of his public ministry; a ministry that would culminate in his dying to save us and rising again that we might also have victory over death. The Church marks this beginning with a change in liturgical seasons today.

Today both formally ends the Christmas season, as well as begins the first of two liturgical periods of what is called Ordinary Time. The first period begins today and ends on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday (aka Mardi Gras, or Shrove Tuesday), and the second period begins the week after Pentecost and concludes with the feast of Christ the King. Depending on how certain feasts and seasons fall on the Church calendar, Ordinary Time takes up between 33 and 34 weeks of the year, or about two-thirds of the liturgical calendar.

Most Catholics know that the high points of the year celebrate the Incarnation of Christ (Advent and Christmas), and that Lent is the penitential season leading to Holy Week and Easter, which commemorate Jesus' Passion, Death & Resurrection.. All of those seasons together, however, only take up about a third of the calendar. There is something to be learned about the reality that a season called Ordinary Time takes up most of the Church's way of reckoning sacred time.

There are some who have said that Ordinary Time has perhaps been misnamed. There is nothing ordinary at all about the Eucharist, or about what Christ has passed down to us, and we go right on celebrating that "little Easter" each and every Sunday, and for those fortunate to have the ability, they can receive the Eucharist every day by attending Mass daily. However, Ordinary Time recognizes two important things that are easy for us to forget. Firstly, while the Incarnation and the Paschal Mystery are the most important elements of our faith, without which we would have no faith as we know it. Jesus' ministry involved more than just these essential events, but involved teaching and preaching an entire way of life and showing others how to live it by his example. Jesus had an ordinary life with the same difficulties we live with as human beings. Most of his life was so ordinary, in fact that the majority of it was never written down. Jesus had to deal with the daily difficulties of "just getting by," much like many of the rest of us do.

The second thing that Ordinary Time recognizes is the reality of our own human existence and that most of our days are pretty ordinary. We get up, we make that pot of coffee or tea, maybe pack the kids off to school, go to work or work from home, we come home, fix supper, find some time for prayer, unwind for a couple of hours before heading to bed for a few hours' sleep before rising again to repeat the same cycle. Hopefully most of us get to rest on Sunday, or at least can make time for Mass if nothing else...but our normal existence outside of those special times of the year is pretty...well...ordinary.

In giving us "Ordinary Time," the Church not only signals that she understands the daily reality of the cycle of life, but the Church is, in fact, sanctifying everyday living and setting it apart for the sake of the Kingdom of God. There is nothing at all ordinary about that.

Someone once asked me: What does Catholic Charities do for me? My response to that query was several-fold.

- ❖ Firstly, any services of Catholic Charities are available to anyone in Oberlin—though we may have to travel to Elyria or Lorain to obtain those services.
- More importantly, the services of Catholic Charities are predominantly offered in areas of the diocese where there's the greatest need. The fact that Catholic Charities services aren't readily available here in Oberlin should make us grateful that our need, however great it might be, is significantly less than the need of many other communities!
- Ultimately, as followers of Christ, we ought respond to the needs of others around us without regard for what we get back. Remember the parable of the Good Samaritan?

Sacred Heart Catholic Church has always been extremely generous to the Catholic Charities Annual Appeal. In 2018, we were asked to pledge at least \$28,6839 and exceeded that amount and pledged \$33,347. In this 2019 appeal, we've been asked to increase our generosity by pledging at least \$32,019.

I know times are challenging and finances are often tight. I simply ask that you prayerfully consider what you're able to do to assist the efforts of Catholic Charities in this annual appeal. In this season of tax-preparation, my daily newsfeed regularly has articles about retirement savings. Have you contributed the full amount to your 2018 IRA? What about your 401K? Or a 529 for your children's education? (I always get a chuckle out of that one. Do they know something that I don't?)

As all these emails are reminders to "plan ahead" ... we, as a parish, are encouraged to do likewise. That foresight has not only to do with appropriate savings for the future, but also prudent planning when it comes to maintenance, repairs, and renovations. To that end it makes sense to establish a Parish Buildings and Grounds Committee (PBGC).

What exactly would a PBGC look like and involve? The committee itself would be comprised of 4-6 individuals who would have a keen eye for issues of maintenance. Individuals who can look at a

- structure and recognize issues of wear that will need attention whether in the immediate, proximate, or distant future.
- roof and recognize what kind of maintenance or replacement it will require (and this will be critically important with the roof of the Ed Building since it is nearly beyond its life expectancy)
- parking lot with a recommendation for restriping, repair, or replacement
- boiler and/or HVAC system and suggest preventative, as well as critical, maintenance.

While this is just a short list of items, the PBGC would be charged with annually meeting to identify and categorize requisite maintenance around the parish. It would then be the responsibility of the Parish Finance Council to address the aspect of *How do we pay for the needed maintenance?* 

If you have skills that would be of benefit to a PBGC, would you kindly send me an email (fr.trask@SacredHeartOberlin.org). While I'd like to field possible membership now, we won't be meeting to "walk the grounds" until sometime after Easter.

Hard as it may be to believe, we're almost on the doorstep of March and the season of Lent—which starts on Wednesday, March 6th.

Being entrusted with pastoral responsibilities here, as well as at St. Patrick Parish, all of us will find Lent (as well as Holy Week) to be a bit different this year. And those differences will first appear on Ash Wednesday.

In years past each parish has enjoyed a morning and an evening Mass on Ash Wednesday—as a way of allowing as many as possible to begin the penitential season by being nourished at the altars of both Word and Sacrament. While each parish will have two opportunities for Ashes on Ash Wednesday—there will be only one Mass at each parish on that day.

#### The Mass schedule on Ash Wednesday will be:

8:45 AM—St. Patrick 6:30 PM—Sacred Heart

Thanks to the pastoral assistance of Deacon Tom and Deacon Dino (St. Patrick), each parish will also have an Ash Wednesday Liturgy of the Word service—followed by the distribution of Ashes. The Liturgy of the Word and Ashes service, a liturgy which does NOT include Communion, will be held concurrently at the other parish. These <u>non-communion</u> Ash Wednesday services will be held at:

8:45 AM—Sacred Heart 6:30 PM—St. Patrick

As always, the Mass is the source and summit of our faith—and participation at Mass is always the preference. But aware that everyone's schedule won't afford them the luxury of travelling to the other parish, I felt it was important to at least offer the option of the distribution of Ashes outside of Mass at each parish.

The chief liturgist of the Diocese is the Bishop—who is, essentially, our local successor to the Apostles. In several places in the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), how things are to be done in the local church are to be determine by the local Bishop. Case in point is our posture following the Lamb of God.

In paragraph 43 of the GIRM (first stated in 2002, and restated in 2012), it reads: In the dioceses of the United States of America, they should kneel beginning after the singing or recitation of the Sanctus until after the Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer, except when prevented on occasion by reasons of health, lack of space, the large number of people present, or some other good reason. Those who do not kneel ought to make a profound bow when the priest genuflects after the consecration. The faithful kneel after the Agnus Dei unless the diocesan bishop determines otherwise. (GIRM 43, emphasis added)

In 2002, Bishop Pilla directed the faithful of the Diocese of Cleveland to STAND. Bishop Lennon, who was known for being very conservative, did not opt to change Bp. Pilla's directive.

Why does the GIRM offer the bishop the option of standing or kneeling? We stand out of respect for Christ (which is precisely what we do as He speaks to us in the Gospel and why standing is also appropriate after the Lamb of God). We kneel when we're offering intercessory prayer (which is what one is doing when they say: Lord, I am not worthy that You should enter under my roof, but only say the word and my soul will be healed.) BUT making the choice to stand or kneel is not left to the congregation or the pastor; it's made by the Bishop for all the faithful of that diocese. That's why in some Dioceses they kneel and in some dioceses they stand after the Lamb of God.

In 2003, when Rome was asked to clarify the issue, the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments (CDW) upheld the right of the Diocesan Bishop to make this choice.

At both St. Patrick and Sacred Heart we follow Bishop Pilla's implementation – for the most part. What we fail to do is follow it through to the completion of the distribution of communion. Presently, at both parishes, we remain standing until we've individually received communion; what Bp. Perez is reminding us is that we should remain standing until all have received communion. The communion rite is not about "me" receiving Jesus ... but about the Body of Christ (the community gathered) being nourished by the Body of Christ (the Eucharist). By retaining the same posture, as we all sing the same song and are nourished by the Eucharist, we bespeak our Oneness in the Lord.

But what about my "private time of thanksgiving with the Lord?" I was always taught to return and pray privately. You will have private time for thanksgiving – at the proper time. But immediately upon your return from communion is NOT the proper time.

Growing up, we were never excused from the table until everyone had finished their meal. The same is true for Communion. The time for private thanksgiving is after everyone has been fed. This is precisely what Bp. Perez is calling us to embrace.

When is the distribution of communion over, and everyone fed? When the last person has received from the chalice. As a good visual for everyone at both Sacred Heart & St. Patrick parishes, we will use the reposition of the Eucharist in the tabernacle and the closing of the tabernacle door as our cue to sit or kneel and take time for personal prayers of thanksgiving for the gift of Jesus in the Eucharist; there will be an extended period of silence at this time for personal prayer (and only occasionally, as the solemnity/feast might warrant, a communion reflection).

Hopefully these words of explanation help you to understand the appropriateness of this posture modification that our Bishop, the chief liturgist of our diocese and successor to the Apostles, is stipulating.

An online blogger, who preferred kneeling to standing, wrote: I will ignore my personal preference and do what the Church says. To do otherwise would be disobedience to the bishop and the Church in a matter over which only they have jurisdiction.

Today is the day of Easter Joy! The Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the foundation belief of the whole Christian Church. From the first moment of the discovery of the empty tomb, the first disciples began an emotional and spiritual journey. The despair of Good Friday, when they witnessed the death of Jesus on Calvary, gave way to great uncertainty and doubt. They asked themselves "how could this be?" Their fears were totally allayed, when they personally encountered the risen Jesus. In today's Gospel from St. John, it is a woman, Mary Magdalene, who first discovers the absence of Jesus' body from the grave. The Gospel of John presents Mary as the witness who leads Peter and the "other disciple whom Jesus loved" to see the open tomb for themselves. Their disbelief had first to be overcome, before they could fearlessly live what they had experienced - both the forsaken, crucified Lord and the living, glorified Jesus Christ.

The belief on Resurrection makes us, the Christian community everywhere, the wellspring and reservoir of confident hope in a fearful world. As people of Easter faith, we must communicate to an often bleak and darkened world that our faith in the Risen Christ has dramatically changed and transformed us. Our Easter faith must witness to a deep trust on the power of God - a power which overcomes the cruelty and inhumanity of much of what we witness in the world today. It is our faith that the Risen Christ is always present to us on our everyday challenges and difficulties.

From all who serve you at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, be assured of our prayerful support hoping that you and your families may experience the fullness of Easter Joy throughout this season of Easter.

A face that you've occasionally seen over the past year will become a face you will see on a more regular basis – probably once-a-month, depending on what time(s) you come to Mass. Fr. Bob Kraig, pastor emeritus of St. John Neumann Parish in Strongsville, has graciously offered to preside at a weekend Mass – and will rotate through the weekend schedule at both St. Patrick and Sacred Heart Parishes.

While I have been comfortable with celebrating four Sunday Masses each weekend (two Saturday vigil Masses and two Sunday morning Masses), church law stipulates that a priest should celebrate no more than three Sunday Masses – except in situations of pastoral need. As I believe that each parish should have a Saturday vigil Mass as well as a Sunday morning Mass, celebrating four Sunday Masses is a responsibility I've embraced because I believe it has been meeting a genuine pastoral need. With Fr. Kraig's presence, although we will not expand the weekend Mass schedule, it will help bring us into proper conformity with church protocol.

An additional benefit to Fr. Kraig's presence is that there will be weekends when I won't have to run-out immediately after one Mass so that I can celebrate a Mass at the other parish. When Sacred Heart has a Saturday dinner after Mass, it may well be possible for me (or Fr. Kraig) to stay for the meal; that's something I've not been able to do during this past year. Similarly, when St. Pat's has their pancake breakfast after 8:15 Mass, it will also be possible (on occasion) to enjoy breakfast instead of rushing over to Sacred Heart for the 10:30 Mass.

While I know you're aware that I need to rush to the other parish for Mass, my inability to join in the after-Mass social events is something I miss – because it limits our ability to interact. While Fr. Kraig's weekend presence won't fully eliminate the rush – it will reduce it at times, and I feel it will be beneficial to us all.

And St. Patrick as well as Sacred Heart are not the only beneficiaries of Fr. Kraig's presence. A parish priest highly treasures his parish family. But retired priests can all too easily become itinerant preachers, traveling from parish to parish to help on weekends ... celebrating Mass everywhere, but without any parish that is truly his "home and family." By being a regular presence at both Sacred Heart and St. Patrick, Fr. Kraig will also benefit because he'll once again have a "home and family."

Just about everywhere we go today, there are security cameras. Porch pirates are often highlighted by video doorbells; most stores have an array of video cameras. There are even cameras along our highways. Some cameras are placed for security purposes; others are placed for informational purposes (like along the interstates – so we can see traffic flow).

Here at Sacred Heart a few cameras have been placed for informational purposes only. What might be an "informational need" you ask? On several occasions the alarm company has called Deacon Tom and me to inquire whether or not they should call the Oberlin PD. As we've had no way of viewing the premises and environs of Sacred Heart, we've had to make blind judgement calls; gratefully, all alarms thus far triggered have been false ... but that might not always be the case in the future.

Aware of the need to make a quick off-site assessment of premise security, the security company inquired about the option of installing a few cameras – so that we'd be able to take quick glance at Sacred Heart and immediately assess the situation. Rather than an expensive install, we've opted to place a few \$25 Wyze cameras so that we'll be able to view select areas of the property while speaking with the alarm company. These cameras will allow Deacon Tom or me to give the alarm company an informed decision on whether: to assure them that all-is-okay, or; to dispatch the Oberlin PD.

This Sunday our country celebrates our mothers—and rightly so. For the care and love which our mothers have given us is beyond price or measure. Of course, our earthly parents are not perfect. Sometimes they are quite far from perfect. But any love we have known from them is a likeness of the love God has for us. A religious icon is made of mere wood and paint, but it can be a window to heavenly realities. In the same way, we can see through our parents' love a glimpse of God Himself.

Most of us have more memories about our mothers than we could possibly count, but today, I would like to take you back to a time and place about which you have no clear memories—to the time in your mother's womb. In the Bible, the number forty denotes times of waiting and preparation: For instance, Noah spent 40 days and nights in the ark. The Hebrews wandered with Moses for 40 years in the desert. Before His ministry, Jesus fasted 40 days in the wilderness, and after His death, He rested 40 hours in the tomb. Similarly, you remained 40 weeks, more or less, within your mother's womb, being prepared for a new life.

Attached to your mother's vine you grew into the mature fruit of her womb. You were nourished and matured within her. You were never far from her heart or mind. You existed within her, connected to her at the center of your being. She fed you with her very self. She provided for all your needs. Apart from her, you could do nothing. You remained in her and found rest within her.

In the womb, at the earliest stages of our lives, our minds did not comprehend very much, but what if you could have understood everything that your mother was doing for you at the time? Surely you would have directed your thoughts to her often. And certainly, from time to time, you would have turned to her with the eyes of your heart to bask in her love for you. What if you could have talked with your mom from the womb? Would you not have taken the opportunity to speak with her every day? Would you not have thanked her daily out of a deep gratitude? Would you not have let her know each day how much you love her? Whoever would refuse or neglect to express such love and thanks would continue to live, at least functionally or biologically, but they would not be fully alive without this relationship with their mother.

As you and your mother would continue to talk, as the days and months of pregnancy passed by, she would eventually present you with a most-frightening prospect: She might put it this way, "My child, soon, in a little while, you are going to begin a new stage of your life. You will be departing from the life you know, and then you will experience a whole world of people and things you have never known before." You might say, "I'm scared! I don't want to go—not now, not ever!" But she would answer, "I realize this concept is scary for you, but trust me when I say that it is better that you go. In fact, someday soon you will look back and think it a silly thought to be again as you are now. This transition is going to hurt a little bit... trust me, I know... but when the

appointed time comes, I will be right here with you. Do not be afraid. It's going to be alright!"

Today, we reflect on this time in the womb because our life, in our mothers, is like our life in Christ. As it was with our mothers, so it is, in our life with Christ. You are attached to Him as to a vine; you mature as a child of God. You are nourished and grow within Him. You are never far from His heart or mind. You exist within Him, connected to Him at the center of your being. He feeds you with His very self. He provides for all your needs. Apart from Him, you can do nothing. You remain in Him and find rest in Him.

Knowing and believing this, should not we direct our thoughts to Him often? Should not we, from time to time, turn to Him with the eyes of our hearts to bask in His love for us? We have the ability to talk with Jesus Christ, in prayer, whenever we wish. Who would not take the opportunity to speak with Him every day? Who would not thank Him daily out of deepest gratitude? And who would not let Him know each day how much we love Him? Whoever would refuse or neglect to speak with Him, would continue to live, at least functionally or biologically, but they will not be fully alive without this relationship with Christ. We need to pray every day if we want to remain in Him and bear much fruit.

We do not want to die and that is perfectly natural. But Jesus says to us, "Soon, in a little while, you are going to begin a new stage of life. You will be departing from the life you know, and then you will experience a whole world of people and things you have never known before. I realize this concept is scary for you, but trust me when I say that it is better that you go. In fact, someday soon you will look back and think it a silly thought to be as you are now once again. This transition is going to hurt a little bit... trust me, I know... but when the appointed time comes, I will be right there with you. Do not be afraid. It's going to be alright!"

Today, let us thank God for the life, love, and tender care we have received from our mothers and through Jesus Christ. God bless our mothers and praised be Jesus Christ, now and forever, Amen!

# Over the last year I've noticed that many candles are burning on Sunday, but the shrine is dark by midweek. And those who stop by on Thursday or Friday to light a candle will occasionally have difficulty finding a "light." In the coming weeks you'll notice a change to our candle rack beneath the Sacred Heart; we'll be shifting from 3-day to 7-day candles.

The tradition of lighting candles is several-fold. One symbol of the candle is that we present our prayers to Christ, the Light of the World. And as the candle burns we're reminded to place our trust in the Lord. Much like the presence of our petition book, an assortment of burning candles reminds us to pray, not just for our own needs—but for the many needs of others. Hopefully the longer burning candles will offer us a visible reminder of the importance of lifting up everyone's needs to the Lord.

While on the subject of prayer, I'd like to touch upon prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. For the last year there's been various discussion at the Spiritual Life Commission (SLC) to determine the best time to nurture a monthly holy hour before the Sacred Heart; it had formerly been done once a month on a Tuesday evening, but attendance was small. I even told SLC I'd look through the keycard access logs to see if there might be a trend that would identify an ideal day/time for adoration—but everything was inconclusive.

What did become very apparent was that people are using their keycards for church entry. Many stop in and spend 15 minutes or more (some are even there for an hour or longer). Even many of those who bring communion to the sick/homebound will spend time in prayer before leaving for their ministry.

In our May SLC meeting it was suggested we not set a specific time, but that we ask parishioners to consider spending time before the Eucharist (tabernacle) in prayer—at least monthly, but perhaps even more frequently. This *flexible* time of adoration is possible because of the sacristy door lock. Our keycard system allows cardholders access from 7AM to 9PM daily. And so that no one will be walking into a darkened church, the back shrine and tabernacle lights are programmed to turn on at dusk and remain on until 9PM daily.

If you would like a keycard, simply drop me a note with your name and cell number (or home # if you don't have a cell); I'll get one programmed for you and have it ready for you by the following weekend.

As we celebrate Father's Day this year, one could wish for no greater gift of remembrance than the profound revelation of what it truly means to be a father. Today, it is my hope that each man blessed by the miracle of a child will spend a few precious moments in sincere contemplation of his glorious state in life. Fatherhood, in many ways, is in dire need of this realization, not only by fathers themselves, but also by society as a whole. Pope John Paul II, wrote about fatherhood early in his pontificate. Looking at the vocation of each father as being of "unique and irreplaceable importance," he warned that, "as experience teaches, the absence of a father causes psychological and moral difficulties imbalance notable and in family relationships" (Familiaris Consortio, 25).

We have been blessed with many great examples of inspirational fatherhood throughout history. No father, however, is a better role model than St. Joseph, the foster father of our Savior. St. Joseph teaches us the art of devotion and the perception of commitment as no other father could. His total submission to the will of God nurtured within him the indispensable virtues of faith, wisdom and self-sacrifice. He embraced simplicity and poverty so as to renounce worldliness. In material terms, he was a man of very little means, yet in spiritual terms he was, and is, a veritable wellspring of guidance for every father who has followed in his footsteps.

St. Joseph's mission, more than raising his foster Son (who in His perfection already possessed every good virtue), was to be the personification of the covenant of fatherhood, a covenant of two parts. The first covenant is between God and every father: that each man who is granted the purity of a child's soul will discover perfect fulfillment upon the promise that, first and foremost, he will dedicate his life to the spiritual well-being of that soul entrusted unto him. The second covenant is between a father and his child: a relationship tempered with patience and forgiveness whose sole purpose is mutual salvation, for inasmuch as a father holds the salvation of his children as his most sincere desire in life, so he ensures his own. This is the legacy of St. Joseph, a poignant and timeless declaration of God's love between father and child.

May this Father's Day, then, evoke a true celebration of fatherhood, not within the confines of a secular holiday but for the miraculous calling that it truly is. When you look at your children, look beyond the mere responsibilities of feeding, clothing, and educating. Whether in the finest or most impoverished circumstances, these are but fleeting — it is their souls which live forever. Through the intercession of St. Joseph, the great Patron of the Universal Church, may we see holier and better men and fathers cultivated within our parish family. With more men like St. Joseph in our midst, we will truly be blessed!

As Catholics our strength comes from regularly focusing on Christ in the Eucharist. And while God hears all prayers, there's no question that environment can impact the quality of our prayer – both constructively as well as destructively. Prayer in a tranquil environment is always more focused than prayer in a frenzied or noisy environment

For the last year, the Spiritual Life Committee has attempted to identify the "best time" for Sacred Heart to do a monthly Holy Hour. What we've discovered is that there's no time that is good for everyone. But we've also come to realize that, given modern technology, there's no real reason that everyone needs to be tied to a particular hour each month.

On this Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi), I would ask everyone to consider making a *monthly holy hour* before Christ in the tabernacle; do it on a day and at a time of your choosing → from 7AM to 9PM daily. These extended hours of prayer are possible because Sacred Heart has a keycard access system that will enable you entry into the church, even when the building is locked and the alarm is on. And should you choose to pray before dawn or after sunset, the back shrine and the tabernacle lights will be on − so you'll never be walking into a dark building.

If you'd like a keycard so that you can pray before the tabernacle, simply shoot me an email (fr.trask@sacredheartoberlin.org) or send me a text (440.987.9873) and I'll make sure to get you one.

Also, just a reminder that the size of the candles beneath the Sacred Heart statue will soon be changing; we're switching from 3-day to 7-day candles (and, yes, the price will be adjusted because the larger candles are more expensive).

Burning candles serve to remind us of many things; first and foremost: Christ is the Light of the World! Additionally, lighting a candle reminds us that we've place our intention before the Lord. Seeing numerous other candles burning reminds us to pray for ALL the needs members of our parish have placed before the Lord ... not just our own particular needs.

In 2010, Timothy Cardinal Dolan shared the following reflection. As we celebrate July 4<sup>th</sup> this week, the Cardinal's reflections are worth pondering:

"My friend Cardinal Francis George, the Archbishop of Chicago, comments that perhaps the most revolutionary statement we can make these days is the opening line of the creed, "We believe in God, the Father Almighty..." as we pray at every Sunday Mass.

We look forward to all the festivities of our national holiday, the Fourth of July, this weekend.

We call it Independence Day, celebrating our independence from England, sealed on July 4, 1776, won at the cost of the blood of brave patriots during the Revolutionary War.

However, to profess our faith that "We believe in God, the Father Almighty..." is actually an act of dependence: we admit that every breath we take, each day we have, every opportunity we are given, come from an omnipotent God, and we bask in the fact that we are totally dependent upon Him. He is sovereign, He is Lord, He has power and dominion. "Without Him, we can do nothing; with Him, nothing is impossible."

Yes, this spiritual Declaration of Dependence is downright revolutionary. For today, it is chic to throw off—not the shackles of allegiance to King George, as our brave patriots gallantly did—but any sense of obedience to God, His revelation and the basic code of right and wrong He has engraved upon the human heart.

Oh, it's not that we do not believe in God; it's just that we consider ourselves to be gods: we claim dominion over life itself, as we accept abortion, euthanasia, destruction of embryonic stem cells, capital punishment and destructive poverty that causes starvation and plagues in the world.

We presume to tamper with the basic institution of a civil society, marriage and family, re-defining it to suit the spirit of the age.

We revel in violence on TV, in movies, in the rap lyrics our young people sing, independent of the decency and respect God has instilled in us.

Creatures resort to war, and terrorism, feeling themselves above the moral limits of conflict that a civilized society has always tried to heed.

We defend freedom as the right to do whatever we want, whenever we want, wherever we want, however we want, with whomever we want, instead of believing that freedom is really the liberty to do what we ought.

The Ten Commandments become a list of suggestions, the Eight Beatitudes a set of nice ideas, the Bible mere literature, the Church unnecessary,

religion a crutch for the unenlightened, objective truth an outmoded oppression.

Because, you see, we are independent. We are self-made, and we worship our creator—ourselves!

This is sure curious. For one, we are terribly dependent—not, regrettably, upon God—but upon money, insurance, gas, weapons, security systems or even upon alcohol, pornography, lust, gambling and drugs, in a culture of consumption and convenience.

Two, it is curious because the patriots who won independence for us in 1776 had no trouble at all acknowledging their total dependence upon God. In fact, the normative documents of our beloved country presume the existence of a providential God, objective truth, moral duty and the right to life itself.

The real invitation this Fourth of July is to be independent of earthly and selfish tyranny, whether that be King George, Osama bin Laden, or a slavery to the passions, while at the same time confessing an utter dependence upon God and His eternal law.

"The Truth shall make you free," as Jesus taught. Happy Fourth of July! God bless America!

It's hard to believe that, as of July 1st, it's been a year of a shared pastorate. I must say: the ability to reside at either and both parishes has definitely made it significantly easier. Spending 3 days-per-week at each parish, with a few mid-week commutes between parishes, seems to have worked well for me and hopefully for you, the parishioners as well.

I am immensely grateful that each parish has a rectory because it allows me to live in both locations and to be present to you in ways, and at times, that might not otherwise be an option.

The staff of each parish has been exceptional - The Parish & Finance Councils and the various organizations have continued to operate well; for that I'm impressed and But I would be remiss if I didn't mention this: I truly appreciate how individual parishioners in both parishes have done their part to both "step in" and "step-up" - and that has allowed this shared pastorate to work so well. It's not been uncommon for me to hear about individuals who've seen something that needed to be done - whether pastorally or operationally – and simply taken care of it. It truly is because of what all of you have done, and are willing to do, that I am able to pastor two parishes.

I know these last 12 months have been an adjustment for you, too. You'd grown to know and love Fr. Cole, and now you were tasked with "breaking in" another pastor – your 36th in the history of Sacred Heart. And, as was the case in the early 1900's, you were once again called to share your pastor with St. Patrick Parish.

The most immediate adjustment you needed to make pertained to the Mass schedule. Weekend Mass times adjusted, and the options for weekday Mass were cut in half: instead of four weekday Masses at Sacred Heart - sharing a pastor brought with it the necessity of sharing weekday Mass options as well. I've always been a firm believer in the importance of daily Mass, and regret that this shared pastorate has significantly altered the availability of weekday Mass. Of the current two weekday Mass options at Sacred Heart, I can't help but wonder if the choice of Thursday evening Mass was appropriate to your needs; I intend to re-evaluate the Thursday evening Mass

the shared When first speaking of pastorate I couldn't help but be reminded of a "blended family." I was entering into a new phase of pastoring: I already had a family at St. Patrick Parish that I'd come to know and love - and I was being asked to embrace and love you with the same fervor, passion, and intensity. Yes, there are weeks when I spend more time at St. Pat's than I do at Sacred Heart, and other weeks where it's the exact opposite. But that's no different than it is with you and your family: there are times when one child needs more attention, and so you do what you need to do when you need to do it.

I thank God for the blessing that it is to be shepherd of two parishes and am grateful for the ways we have all grown over the last year. May God, who has begun His good work in us, bring it to completion!

Back in 2004, Pope St John Paul II declared the "Year of the Eucharist" – with the objective of promoting a more active and faith-filled participation in the dominical (Sunday) Eucharist. The Sunday Mass is the church's primary moment of public prayer (liturgy) and proclamation of the Lord's death and resurrection.

From ancient times, Christians have felt so strongly the obligation to participate in the Lord's supper that they would only absent themselves from the Sunday Eucharistic assembly for the most serious reasons. This is attested to in the writings of early church fathers. Why is the Sunday Eucharist so important?

Christian tradition tells us that every Sunday is a "little Easter," a term popularized by Saint Augustine of Hippo. Sunday is the "first day," when the church witnesses to Jesus' victory — and ours — over sin, death, and evil. It is truly the "Lord's day." In Spanish, the name for Sunday, domingo, affirms this fact.

Sunday is also the day of the church, the dies ecclesiae. Especially in an age like ours, when we live our everyday life in isolation from other believers and are confronted with worldly values and thinking, it is vitally important that we come together regularly with those who share our commitment to Christ and to a Gospel way of living. Otherwise, we can feel like branches cut off from the vine, from the Lord himself.

On Sunday, then, we gather to give thanks to God for the "knowledge and faith and immortality" which is ours in Jesus Christ.

Thursday is the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary into heaven, and it's a holy day of obligation. Here are a few reflections on the history of this celebration, and it's long history/tradition.

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names – Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption – from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's Assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testaments, her Assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven.

In the light of the Assumption of Mary, it is easy to pray her Magnificat (Luke 1:46–55) with new meaning. In her glory she *proclaims the greatness of the Lord* and *finds joy in God* her savior. *God has done marvels* to her and she leads others to recognize God's holiness. She is the lowly handmaid who deeply reverenced her God and has been raised to the heights. From her position of strength she will help the lowly and the poor find justice on earth, and she will challenge the rich and powerful to distrust wealth and power as a source of happiness.

A recent Pew Research Study (pewresearch.com) showed that, while the Catholic church has always taught & believed that the Eucharist is the actual Body & Blood of Christ, only one-third of present-day Catholics embrace that belief. The following, an excerpt of an article "Is the Eucharist Really Christ's Body & Blood" written by Abp. Michael J. Sheehan in May of 1995.

### **Scripture and Tradition**

Our Catholic teaching that the Eucharist is the Body and Blood of Jesus, not bread and wine, is clearly taught in the Bible and throughout the 2,000 -year tradition of the Church. The teaching of Jesus in the sixth chapter of John's Gospel is very clear: "Amen, amen I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood you do not have life within you. Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life and I will raise him up on the last day. For My flesh is true food and My blood is true drink. Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood remains in Me and I in him." (John 6:53-56).

John goes on to say that, even though many disciples would not accept this teaching and went away, Jesus did not attempt to bring them back by saying He was only speaking symbolically.

The early Church took this teaching seriously. In the first letter to the Corinthians, Saint Paul says, "Therefore whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the Body and Blood of the Lord... for anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgment on himself." (1 Corinthians 11:27, 29) Paul's statement makes sense only if the bread and wine have become the real Body and Blood of Christ.

How does this change take place? It happens during the Eucharistic prayer of the Mass. At that time, the bread and wine are changed into the Body and Blood of Christ, as the Church has always taught. Although they still look like bread and wine, they have, by divine power, actually changed into His Body and Blood. How can we know this? It requires faith. It is a mystery which, like love, we will never fully understand. The Trinity, the divinity of Jesus, His death and Resurrection are

other mysteries which, along with the Eucharist, we will never fully comprehend in this life.

For several more days the Oberlin Heritage Center will be hosting an exhibit highlighting Our Lady of *Guadalupe*—who is the *patroness of the Americas*.

Since I wear it on Marian feasts, you've seen my Our Lady of Guadalupe stole—that also depicts St. Juan Diego; the man to whom Our lady appeared in 1531.

Until recently, very little was known about Blessed that Our Juan Diego except Lady appeared to him in December 1531. The apparitions occurred at Tepeyac, a small hill and a former sanctuary to the Aztec goddess Tonanzin. Mary asked Juan Diego to request that the local bishop build a church on that site. There she could be present with all her love and compassion for "all the inhabitants of this land."

Not believing Juan Diego at first, Bishop Juan Zumarraga asked for a heavenly sign. On the day Mary promised that Juan Diego would receive this sign, his uncle Juan Bernardino was dying of a disease introduced by the Europeans. Instead of going to the Lady for this sign, Juan Diego took another route, seeking a priest to hear his uncle's confession.

The Lady appeared to him, assuring him that his uncle had been healed, and that on the top of Tepeyac hill Juan Diego would find what the bishop requested. Juan climbed the hill and found its summit covered with beautiful flowers of all colors. He cut the flowers; the Lady arranged them on his cloak of very coarse fiber, known as a tilma, and sent him off to the bishop.

When Juan unfolded the tilma before the bishop and his assistants, the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared on it. A visit to Juan Bernardino revealed that she had appeared to him, healed him and called herself "Our Lady of Guadalupe."

This was the first of many miracles worked to this day through her intercession.

How come we always refer to God as Father? Why don't we speak about him equally as mother or parent? These are questions that people ask and the answers are not as difficult as the questions seem. Our faith makes it clear - God transcends both male and female; he is neither one nor the other. Language about God can only describe, not define who God is. God is too big for us, too much more than we can imagine. And yet, we have to talk about God.

When Jesus came and walked among us, he could have chosen many different images for God, but he chose one above all others that best described who God really is - Father. Sure, Jesus used other images for God - a mother hen, a poor widow, etc. But there is only one image that he used consistently and it changed the way people thought about God. He called God "Father." And what he meant by that is rather easy to figure out. God as Father is Lord of all, Creator of everything that is. Authority personified. Tenderness made visible. All the characteristics that we most often associate with fathers, Jesus used to describe God. Calling God "Father" doesn't mean that's all we can say about God. It just means "Father" is the main image for God, the one Jesus used. Can we use other images for God? Sure. But the one image we can never do without is "Abba," that's Hebrew for "Father" or "Daddy." It is Jesus' word, given to us by the eternal Son of the everlasting Father.

#### Ohio police make over 100 arrests in massive human trafficking and child sex sting

More than 100 are arrested in Ohio on charges linked to human trafficking and attempted unlawful sexual conduct with a minor. The arrests were made during a four-part simultaneous operation involving more than 30 law enforcement agencies. Over 40 women were also arrested for prostitution, with some being placed in a human trafficking rehabilitation program.

In 2017 local news reporting identified Ohio as fifth in the nation for human trafficking, a hub of prostitution because of the high volume of traffic through the state.

Each year, near the feast of St. Luke (whom St. Paul, in his Epistle to the Colossians, describes as a physician), we share the Sacrament of the Sick with those in need of healing. In the era before Vatican II, one needed to be on death's doorstep before summoning the priest for what was known as the Last Rites; gratefully, in light of Vatican II and a renewed understanding of the Lord's healing touch, the Sacrament of the Sick is freely shared with those in need of healing.

So, who exactly is eligible to receive the Sacrament of the Sick? The Second Vatican Council encouraged that the merciful & healing touch of Christ should be available to many people - not just the dying. As a result of those reforms, the sacrament is available to anyone in need of healing, such as:

- If you're a caregiver and struggle with mental fatigue or emotional exhaustion, the Church would encourage you to participate in the Sacrament.
- If you've been diagnosed with a health issue or if you're advance in years, it's appropriate that you receive the Sacrament.
- If arthritis, rheumatism, or a fading memory are part of your life experience, you may wish to receive the strength of the Sacrament.

After prayerful consideration, if you feel you'd like to share in this Sacrament, Fr. Trask will anoint your forehead and the palms of both hands; it's appropriate, as you return to your pew after receiving the sacrament, that you rub the oil into your hands/skin.

Anyone wishing to schedule a Mass intention during 2020 is welcome to contact the parish office; the suggested donation is \$10.

The history of requesting that the priest keep a particular intention in mind during Mass originated in the very early Church. Inscriptions discovered on tombs in Roman catacombs of the second century evidence this practice: for example, the epitaph on the tomb of Abercius (d. 180), Bishop of Hieropolis in Phrygia, begs for prayers for the repose of his soul. Tertullian (c. 200) attested to observing the anniversary of a spouse with prayers and sacrifices.

The Canons of Hippolytus (c. 235) explicitly mention the offering of prayers for the dead during the Mass. St. Cyril of Jerusalem (d. 386), in one of his many catechetical discourses, explained how at Mass both the living and dead are remembered, and how the Eucharistic Sacrifice of our Lord is of benefit to sinners, living and dead. St. Ambrose (d. 397) preached, "We have loved them during life; let us not abandon them in death, until we have conducted them by our prayers into the house of the Lord." St. John Chrysostom (d. 407) stated, "Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them." St. Augustine (d. 430) recorded the dying wishes of his mother, St. Monica in his Confessions: "One thing only I ask you, that you remember me at the altar of the Lord wherever you may be." Finally, Pope St. Gregory (d. 604) said, "Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them."

In his encyclical "Ecclesia de Eucharistia," Pope Saint John Paul II, taught, In the celebration of the Eucharistic Sacrifice, the Church prays that God, the Father of mercies, will grant His children the fullness of the Holy Spirit so that they may become one body and one spirit in Christ. In raising this prayer to the Father of lights, from whom comes every good endowment and every perfect gift, the Church believes that she will be heard, for she prays in union with Christ her Head and Spouse, who takes up this plea of His Bride and joins it to His own redemptive sacrifice. (No. 43)

While the Mass intention is often voiced at Mass, the only individual obligated to remember that particular intention in prayer is the celebrant. Though there may be occasion when a reader mis-pronounces

I've made it a point, in those instances, to insert the name of the deceased in the Eucharistic Prayer; while that's not obligatory, it's the way I've tried to retain mention of the requested intention.)

And when it comes to the printed word, I'm the first to tell people (oftentimes brides) that any liturgical aide may print neither music nor scripture without first securing the proper copyright permissions; not only are the lyrics copyrighted, but so too is the translation of the Revised New American Bible that we read at Mass. With all the various copyrighted verbiage and melodies, you can see why parishes opt for a preprinted hymnal or missalette.

It was recently brought to the attention of all pastors that many graphics on the internet are copyrighted – and their usage on a parish website and/ or in the parish bulletin without proper permissions can bring about a hefty fine. (They didn't cover this in the seminary!)

In any case, you may notice some changes in our bulletin ... as well on the website. We're working to ensure that any graphic or image we use in print or online is from an pixabay.com – a royalty free website endorsed by the diocese.

And, yes, there are ripples of this copyright issue that may well impact you! If you'd like an article in the bulletin, any graphic you submit must come from pixabay.com. The same is true for anything you'd like us to post on the parish website or Facebook page.

The word "advent" A note means "coming". The Church teaches us that during Advent we wait from our Pastor for two comings of Christ: we prepare to celebrate Christmas.

when Christ first came into the world; and, we wait for Christ's second coming at the end of time. (See General Norms for the Liturgical Year and Calendar, Paragraph 39, from Documents on the Liturgy, 1963-1979, Conciliar, Papal and Curial Texts © 1982, ICEL.)

Advent begins at sundown the eve of the fourth Sunday before Christmas and concludes at sundown on Christmas Eve. The First Sunday of Advent also heralds the beginning of the new Church Year, or Liturgical Year.

Advent is a time of preparation and waiting. Violet, which expresses penance and/or waiting, is the primary liturgical color during this season. Rose, however, is the color for the third Sunday of Advent, Gaudete Sunday.

As Catholics, we are called to reject the secular, commercial culture of already celebrating Christmas, and to faithfully keep the season of Advent until sundown Christmas Eve, when the Christmas Season begins. We keep Advent in many ways in our homes: the family Advent Wreath, the Jesse Tree, the O Antiphons (December 17-23). We celebrate special Advent Feast Days, such as the feast of Saint Nicholas (December 6), the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception (December 8 → transferred to December 9, 2019), the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe (December 12), and the feast of St. Lucy (December 13).

It is only in keeping Advent and not rushing the Christmas Season that we will be ready for the Lord when He comes!

Today (Sunday) is our annual Advent Communal Penance Service at 1pm here at Sacred Heart; an opportunity for each of us to compare ourselves to Christ, and to confess to the Lord the ways

we have distorted (rather than reflected) His image.

Give yourself, and those you love, the best possible Advent gift ever: the gift of a renewed heart!

Ordinarily December 8<sup>th</sup> is the day on which we celebrate the patroness of the United States: Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception. And because she is our national patroness, her feast day is always a Holy Day of Obligation.

Every couple of years, though, December 8th falls on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Advent and things get adjusted. Because the Advent Sundays have a higher liturgical priority than the celebration of the Immaculate Conception, the December 8<sup>th</sup> feast is transferred to December 9<sup>th</sup>. But while the feast is moved to the next day, the Obligation to attend Mass does NOT transfer. This means that, although you are welcome to attend Mass on Monday, December 9th to celebrate Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception, there is NO OBLIGATION to do so.



The closer we other the

preparations we do for Christmas like putting up the Christmas tree, decorating the house, baking cookies the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of Advent adds three more things to our "to do" list: we are called to: rejoice, be patient, and be a messenger.

If we are to be ready for Christmas, the prophet Isaiah tells us that we should rejoice, because God is coming to save his people. We are to rejoice because our salvation is nearer, the time of Advent waiting is nearly over, as the celebration of the birth of Christ draws near. St. James in his letter tells us to be patient as we wait for the coming of the Lord. Part of being patient is to avoid complaining about others. Bearing our share of hardships is another part, one that can be a real test of patience. The prophets of old while proclaiming God's message were patient, they had to face many hardships yet they did their task with persistence. The third week of Advent also calls us to be messengers. In the Gospel Jesus indirectly claims to be the Messiah. He points to the actions that exemplify the presence of the Messianic age. He praises John as a prophet and one even greater than a prophet, a person who prepared the way of the Lord. Each one of us is the messenger and so we too have a very important role to play but before telling others to prepare a way for the Lord we need to set an example. Jesus through his Eucharistic meal nourishes and strengthens us so that we will be able to carry out our task with patience and with joy.



On this Feast of the Holy Family, I thought I'd share a reflections

On Dec. 2001, Pope St. John

Paul II reflected on the Holy Family, how it sanctifies families, and what we can learn from meditating upon the life that Jesus, Mary and Joseph shared together in Nazareth. "For every believer, and especially for Christian families, the humble dwelling place in Nazareth is an authentic school of the Gospel. Here we admire, put into practice, the divine plan to make the family an intimate community of life and love; here we learn that every Christian family is called to be a small "domestic church" that must shine with the Gospel virtues," said St. John Paul II to the crowd. "Recollection and prayer, mutual understanding and respect, personal discipline and community asceticism and a spirit of sacrifice, work and solidarity are typical features that make the family of Nazareth a model for every home."

On the feast in 2014, Pope Francis said: "In the family life of Mary and Joseph, God is truly at the center, and He is so in the Person of Jesus. This is why the Family of Nazareth is holy. Why? Because it is centered on Jesus. When parents and children together breathe in this climate of faith, they have an energy that allows them to face even difficult trials, as the experience of the Holy Family shows, for example, in the dramatic event of their flight to Egypt: a difficult ordeal," said Pope Francis. "The Baby Jesus with his Mother Mary and with St Joseph are a simple but so luminous icon of the family. The light it casts is the light of mercy and salvation for all the world, the light of truth for every man, for the human family and for individual families. This light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth in those family situations in which, for various reasons, peace is lacking, harmony is lacking, and forgiveness is lacking."

St. Therese of Lisieux, who is also known as The Little Flower, once talked with her fellow Carmelite sisters. She said "What does me a lot of good when I think of the Holy Family is to imagine a life that was very ordinary. It wasn't everything that they have told us or imagined. Everything in their life was done just as in our own. How many troubles, disappointments! How many times did others make complaints to good St. Joseph! How many times did they refuse to pay him for his work! Oh! How astonished we would be if we only knew how much they had to suffer!"
