


If the two shortly. Although the company that

empties the bins is making money off our recycling efforts, the checks that they're supposed to send Sacred Heart do not get issued. Since September I've made regular requests of the company for compensation – and gave them a deadline for action or removal. After 4 months of phone calls, I've directed that the company remove the bins; it's apparent that the fundraising the recycling bins are intended to provide isn't a reality.

The City of Oberlin is extremely forward thinking in the recycling endeavor, and every resident has a city-issued recycle bin – into which paper and other recyclables may be placed. This means that the removal of the paper recycling bins from the Sacred Heart lot should have absolutely no negative impact on resident's ability to recycle; the city itself is promoting the endeavor!

If you'd prefer to deposit your paper and cardboard products in a "fundraiser" bin, rather than in the city-issued recycle containers, there is a paper recycling bin at Prospect School here in Oberlin.



On Oct 2, 1998, Pope A note John Paul II spoke to the Bishops of California, Nevada, and Hawaii on rom our Pastor the defense of life, and the building of "a genuine culture life." of

Addressing them he said: "society must learn to embrace once more the great gift of life." He told them that as bishops they must "stand firmly on the side of life, encouraging those who defend it and building with them a genuine culture of life."

He said that as bishops they must "find the right language and imagery to present" the Church's teaching on life, married love and the dignity of women "in a comprehensible and compelling way." He said: "Despite the generous efforts by so many ... the idea that elective abortion is a 'right' continues to be asserted." And, he said, there is "an unimaginable insensitivity to the reality of what actually happens during an abortion. A society with a diminished sense of the value of human life has already opened the door to a culture of death."

The Pope pointed out the need to make alternatives to supporting women in available: pregnancies; providing counseling services; opening hearts and homes to "'unwanted' and abandoned children, young people in difficulty, to the handicapped, and to those who have no one to care for them." He then addressed "the morally objectionable nature of campaigns for the legalization of physician-assisted suicide and euthanasia. Euthanasia and suicide are grave violations of God's law." He cited the need "to clarify the substantial moral difference between discontinuing medical procedures that may be burdensome, dangerous or disproportionate to the expected outcome - and taking away the ordinary means of preserving life, such as feeding, hydration and normal medical care. The omission of nutrition and hydration intended to cause a patient's death must be rejected and the presumption should be in favor of providing medically assisted nutrition and hydration to all patients who need them."

In concluding remarks, Pope John Paul told the bishops that "an essential feature of support for the inalienable right to life, from conception to natural death, is the effort to provide legal protection for the unborn, the handicapped, the elderly, and those suffering from terminal illness. Catholics, and especially Catholic legislators, must continue to make their voices heard. America must become, again, a hospitable society, in which every unborn child and every handicapped or terminally ill person is cherished and enjoys the protection of the law."

As we get ever-closer to the sad anniversary of Roe v. Wade, please pray that we, as a nation, may show a greater respect for all life: the unborn, the aged, the physically or developmentally disabled, those on death row, etc. It is the Lord who gives us life, and as giver of that gift, He is the only one who may rightly call us to that which lies beyond life in this realm.

The general discussion resolved that the needs of the parish would be better met by moving the Thursday Mass to 8:45am – which we'll do when we embark upon the season of Lent.



Also discussed was the best time to offer the Sacrament of Confession, which is also presently scheduled for Thursday evenings before Mass. As of Lent, confessions will follow the 10:30 Sunday morning Mass - except on Christmas, Easter, and the Advent/Lenten Sundays on which we have our Advent/Lent Communal Penance Service at 1pm. Hopefully this opportunity to share in the Lord's forgiveness, at a time when you are already at the parish, will encourage regular reception of the Lord's merciful forgiveness.



It was not too many years A note ago that Wednesday and Friday were Ember Days and we all from our Pastor struggled to remember not to eat meat at all or only once a day.

Today, we have only two days of Fast and 8 days of Abstinence, all falling in the Lenten Season. Many of us breathed a sigh of relief when the rules were changed, but the reason we had them was to remind us and help us to sacrifice and take time to pray for world and personal renewal. When the rules governing fast and abstinence were changed for Fridays and Wednesdays, the Pope urged all Catholics to practice some other type of self-denial.

Lent is the time when we are invited to join in the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and do some of the things which He did to improve His relationship with the Father. Jesus often took time to fast and abstain. It cleared His mind and the physical hunger led Him into a deeper prayer life and helped Him to feel compassion to those in need. This is the example we are to follow during the Lenten Season.

We often hear of people giving up something during Lent, only to go back to it when Lent is over. While often commendable, this is not really in the spirit of Lenten denial. Lent invites us to make a permanent commitment to an ongoing and deepening relationship with the Trinity and with others. Fasting and Abstaining, not only on the days appointed, but often during the year will help us to be more appreciative of what we do have and through prayer help us to be more aware of the presence of God in our daily lives. Remember Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of Fast and Abstinence, all Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, all Catholics ages 18 to 59 are obliged to observe a sacred fast, that is, taking only one full meal during the day and not eating in between meals.

Likewise, on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, all Catholics 14 years of age and older are obliged to abstain from eating meat. All the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence and hence Catholics 14 years of age and older are obliged to refrain from eating meat.

While Ash Wednesday is NOT a holy day, and Catholics are NOT required to begin Lent by going to Mass, many do opt to do so.

We're not quite a full week into A note Lent, but now is as good a time From our Pastor as any to ask: "How are you doing with vour Lenten penances? Did you remember

to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and this past Friday? And, what should you do if you mistakenly eat meat on a day of abstinence or break your resolution?"

In 2012, Cardinal George (the then Archbishop of Chicago) was asked that very question at a gathering of youth and young adults; his response (captured in a 32-second YouTube video) was simple: "If it was accidental, it's not a sin! Simply tell God you're sorry you forgot – and do a different penance that day."

Thirty-some years ago I was at a USAF gathering of base chaplains on a Lenten Friday; I was the only Catholic in the group of 6. We went out for lunch and, forgetting it was a Friday of Lent, I ordered a chicken sandwich. On my second bite I realized I'd forgotten it was Lent - and commented that I should've ordered fish. One of the Protestant Chaplains asked: "Are you going to order something else instead?' I replied: "It would be more sinful for me to discard this sandwich and order fish than it would be for me to finish this sandwich." I believe I opted to pray a rosary as an alternate penance that day.







I am grateful the Catholic Bishops of Ohio have come together with regard to Sunday Mass attendance in the midst of the novel

corona virus pandemic; that they've dispensed Catholics from the obligation to attend Mass for specific weekends in the midst of his pandemic is significant. By reducing or eliminating close-interaction with others, we can reduce the strain put upon available medical resources.

You may wonder: How can the bishops dispense us from attending Mass when it was God Himself who gave us the commandment to keep holy His Day? The fact is, there are two issues in operation here: Attending Mass, and; Keeping Holy the Lord's day. While the Bishops can dispense us from the obligation to attend Mass on Sunday, which is the normative way that we Catholics keep holy the Lord's Day, they cannot and do not dispense us from the divine mandate to keep holy the Lord's Day.

What all this means is that, although you may not have to attend Mass on a particular Sunday (or a series of Sundays), you must still keep that day holy! A suitable way to do so, when personal attendance at Mass is unwise or not possible, is to participate in a Mass is that streamed; while not as good as being there in person, it's also better than nothing at all! And several streaming options are available:

- Every Sunday morning at 6am on WJW TV8 (celebrated by a priest of the Diocese of Cleveland);
- Every day at 8AM and at Noon on https://www.ewtn.com/tv/watch-live.or
- On-demand at Catholictv.com

And, as you participate in Mass in any of these online options, please remember Sacred Heart Parish – both prayerfully and financially.

At present (Tuesday, 17 March) we're looking at options to make Eucharist available on a weekly basis. IF we're able to make that a reality, it will have to take place OUTSIDE—and everyone would need to stay at least 10-feet away from other families or individuals. (Why that concern? Because of the ease with which the virus is spread—we can't promote any close gatherings of individuals.) Please watch the parish website (SacredHeartOberlin.org for options on receiving Eucharist outside of Mass—and outside of any building).

St. Roch (aka St. Rocco) is the patron saint of contagious diseases. As we find ourselves in the midst of a COVID-19 epidemic, it couldn't hurt to invoke the prayerful

intercession of St. Roch: "St. Roch, pray for us!"

St. Roch, also known as St. Rocco (c. 1295-1324), was a nobleman from Montpellier, France, the only son of the

wealthy governor of the city. When his parents died he became a Third Order Franciscan. On his pilgrimage, he entered the town of Acquapendente which was badly struck by the black plague. He stayed there to care for the sick. He cured many people by simply making the Sign of the Cross over them. Once the disease was no longer spreading there, he resumed his pilgrimage. He continued to cure people in every town he passed through. Eventually, he contracted the disease. With the help of a count, his health was restored so he returned to his native Montpellier. Accused of being a spy, he was thrown into prison.

As told by a Franciscan hagiographer, Marion A. Habig, O.F.M.:

"When he felt that his end was drawing near, St. Roch asked that a priest might come and administer the last sacraments. The priest, on entering the prison, beheld it supernaturally lighted up and the poor captive surrounded with special radiance. As death claimed its victim, a tablet appeared on the wall on which an angelic hand wrote in golden letters the name of Roch, and the prediction that all who would invoke his intercession would be delivered from the plague."

St. Roch is often depicted as a pilgrim with a walking staff and seashell (the symbol of a pilgrim), an open sore on his leg, and angel by his side, and a dog at his feet.

Life in Christ

Gospel Reflection based on John 11:1-45

I am the resurrection and the life, says the Lord. An innocent man mounts the steps to the guillotine. He hasn't led the best of lives. He has seen in himself nothing worthy of honor. But he has exchanged places in prison with the young husband of the woman he loves. He had promised to do anything to protect her and hers. He has saved the man at the cost of his own life.

You may recognize the scene from Charles Dickens' *A Tale of Two Cities*. As Sydney Carton goes to meet his death, the words of Jesus echo in his mind, what Jesus said to Martha, grieving over the death of her brother Lazarus: *I am the resurrection and the life*.

When my father died, I wasn't overcome by grief. That came later. I thought about the promise of Jesus to Mary and Martha. My father, even though he should die, would live. It wasn't just Jesus that would give him life, but that Jesus *was* life. It wasn't just that Jesus would raise him up as he raised Lazarus, only to die once more, but that Jesus *was* the Resurrection. If you are in Jesus, you are in the Resurrection and the Life. It's what Sydney Carton learned at last, and what all Christians, even in the deepest sorrow, must remember.







Life Entrusted to the Father

Gospel Reflection based on Matthew 26:14-27:66

In 1997, Hector Mendez was with his daughter visiting the top of the Empire State Building when a gunman began shooting randomly. When the shots began, Hector saw that his daughter was about to run to him, a normal thing for a nine-year-old to do at a terrifying moment. But running to her father would put her in the line of fire. Hector yelled to her to go through a nearby exit door. He firmly and passionately commanded his daughter to do the opposite of what every fiber of her being wanted to do, i.e., rush into her father's protecting arms.

She paused for what must have seemed like an eternity to Hector and, ultimately, turned and went through the exit. She and her father lived.

What enabled her to stop in her tracks and go through a door where she would find panicking strangers instead of the face of her father? She so trusted her father's love that she obeyed his voice at a most difficult moment. She trusted her father more than her immediate instinct.

That loving father and his terrified daughter help us understand Jesus' obedience to his Father, from the garden to the cross... to the Resurrection.

Psalm 22 which begins *My God*, *My God*, *why have you forsaken me?* leads to the exultant affirmation, *I will live for the Lord*.

Two Meditations on the Passion of Our Lord

Let us think about the passion of Christ, his sufferings. The point of such meditation is not just to have our feelings roused. Rather, our meditation should lead us to change as we cooperate with God's grace in real sacrifices of self.

And we can't quit searching until it's in our hand.

But, their pursuit is not the only one afoot. For, before they ever set out, the Lord was already in pursuit of them. Indeed, he has pursued them to the very depths of hell and back.

In his Resurrection, Christ shows that he has left no stone unturned—no ruin unredeemed. He has suffered *all loss* for love of us. Though we have strayed, he has anguished in search of us. For he loves our destiny even more than we do, and he has gone before us to seek it out. So, while our search for him continues, we rest assured that he has found us.

Thomas Believes Because He Sees Jesus

Gospel Reflection based on John 20:19-31

The Gospels tell us that Jesus appeared to the disciples on several occasions after they discovered that his tomb was empty. Part of the mystery of Jesus' Resurrection is that he appeared to his disciples not as a spirit but in bodily form. The bodily form was not one that the disciples recognized though. In John's Gospel, Mary of Magdala does not recognize that the figure standing before her is Jesus until he speaks to her. In Luke's Gospel the disciples who meet Jesus on the road to Emmaus do not recognize him until he breaks bread with them. The resurrected Jesus had a physical presence, but the disciples couldn't recognize Jesus unless he allowed them to. His resurrected body, nonetheless, showed the marks of his crucifixion.

From readings such as today's Gospel, we also see that in his resurrected body, Jesus seems to be free of physical constraints. He appears to the disciples despite the fact that the doors were locked.

Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace and the gift of the Holy Spirit. In doing so, Jesus commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun: "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." During the meeting, Jesus also shows the integral connection between forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The story of Thomas illustrates our Christian experience today: We are called to believe without seeing. In fact, all Christians after the first witnesses have been called to believe without seeing. Thomas's doubt is hardly surprising; the news of Jesus' appearance was incredible to the disciples who had seen him crucified and buried. Thomas's human nature compelled him to want hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to the disciples after his death was indeed the same Jesus who had been crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to act on that desire. He is our witness that Jesus is really risen.

Our faith is based on the witness of the Church that has preceded us, beginning with Thomas and the first disciples. Through Baptism we receive the same Holy Spirit that Jesus brought to the first disciples. We are among those who are "blessed" because we believe without having seen.

The Divine Mercy Message and Devotion

The message of The Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us – all of us. And, He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy.

The Divine Mercy message is one we can call to mind simply by remembering *ABC*:

- A Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.
- B Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us.
- C Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that the graces of His mercy are dependent upon our trust. The more we trust in Jesus, the more we will receive.

This message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread.





Pope Francis: The Secret of the Road to Emmaus

Gospel Reflection Based on Luke 24:13-35

Two men are walking; disappointed, sad, convinced that they are leaving behind them the bitterness of an event which ended badly. Before that Easter, they had been full of enthusiasm, convinced that those days would be decisive: their expectations met as well as the hopes of all the people. Jesus, to whom they had entrusted their lives, had seemed to arrive at the final battle. He would now manifest his power, after a long period of preparation and concealment. This is what they were expecting. And it was not to be.

Jesus' encounter with those two disciples appears to be completely fortuitous. It seems to be one of those chance meetings that happen in life. The two disciples are walking, deep in thought, and a stranger comes up alongside them. It is Jesus, but their eyes are not able to recognize him.

Jesus' encounter with the two disciples of Emmaus is a fleeting one. But the entire destiny of the Church is contained within it. It tells us that the Christian community is not enclosed within a fortified citadel, but rather journeys along its most essential environment, which is the road. And there, it encounters people with their hopes and disappointments, burdensome at times. The Church listens to everyone's stories as they emerge from the treasure chest of personal conscience, in order to then offer the Word of Life, the witness of love, a love that is faithful until the end. And thus, the hearts of people reignite with hope.

We have all had difficult moments in life, dark moments in which we walked in sadness, pensive, without horizons, with only a wall before us. And Jesus is always beside us to give us hope, to warm our hearts and to say: "Go ahead, I am with you. Go ahead". The secret of the road that leads to Emmaus is simply this: despite appearances to the contrary, we continue to be loved and God will never stop loving us. God will walk with us always, always, even in the most painful moments, even in the worst moments, even in moments of defeat. That is where the Lord is. And this is our hope. Let us go forward with this hope! Because he is beside us and walks with us. Always!



The Shepherd Knows His Sheep

Gospel Reflection Based on John 10:1-10

Introducing himself as the Good Shepherd of his flock, Jesus makes three claims in today's Gospel.

- 1. He knows his sheep and his sheep hear his voice. Just as the Palestinian shepherds knew each sheep of their flock by name, and the sheep knew their shepherd and his voice, so Jesus knows each one of us, our needs, our merits and our faults. He loves us as we are, with all our limitations, and he expects us to return his love by keeping his words. He speaks to us at every Mass, through the Bible, through our pastors, through our parents, through our friends and through the events of our lives. "God whispers to us in our pleasures, He speaks to us in our consciences, and He shouts to us in our pain!" (C.S. Lewis).
- 2. He gives eternal life to us, his sheep by receiving us into his sheepfold and giving us Faith through Baptism, and then he strengthens that Faith in Confirmation. He supplies food for our souls in the Holy Eucharist and in the Divine words of the Holy Bible. He makes our society holy by the Sacraments of Matrimony and the priesthood (Holy Orders).
- 3. He protects his sheep by placing them in the loving hands of his Almighty Father. Without him to guide us and protect us, we are an easy prey for the spiritual wolves of this world, including Satan and his minions.

Through today's Gospel, Jesus teaches one of the central aspects of the ministerial priesthood: the priest as shepherd. It means that a priest is one who, by his consecration, lives for others. The title, "Father", like the title, "Shepherd," expresses a relation of loving service to others in everything, from the most sacred ministries to the most trivial chores... Let us pray for vocations to the priesthood, the diaconate and the consecrated life so that we may have more good shepherds to lead, feed and protect the Catholic community. Let us remember that the duty of fostering vocations is the concern of the whole believing community, and we discharge that responsibility primarily by living exemplary Christian lives.

"Master, show us the Father"

Gospel Reflection Based on John 14:1-12

The readings for the last few Sundays have been about the Resurrection, but today's Gospel takes us back in time to an event in Jesus' life before his Passion. Jesus tells his disciples that he is going to prepare a place for them in his Father's house. He promises that where he is going, his disciples will be able to follow. Thomas, who will later doubt the disciples' reports that they have seen the Risen Lord, contradicts Jesus by saying that the disciples don't know where Jesus is going or how to get there. Jesus explains that he himself is the way, the truth, and the life. In knowing and loving Jesus, the disciples now love God the Father.

Philip then makes a request that challenges Jesus' words. Philip wants Jesus to show the Father to the disciples. Recall that Jesus has just told his disciples, "If you know me, then you will also know my Father. From now on you do know him and have seen him." As a good teacher, Jesus responds to Philip by repeating and elaborating on what he has just told the disciples: they have seen and known Jesus, so they have seen and known the Father. Then Jesus offers another reassurance about his departure: because of faith in God and in Jesus, the disciples will do the work that Jesus has done and more.

The connection between Jesus and his Father, between Jesus' work and the work of the Father, is made clear in today's Gospel. Jesus is in the Father, and God the Father is in Jesus. As God spoke his name to Moses, "I am," so too Jesus speaks his name to his disciples: "I am the way and the truth and the life."

The revelation of the Trinity is completed in the passage that follows today's reading, and it is the Gospel for next Sunday. Because Jesus goes away, the Father will send in Jesus' name the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, who will continue the work of the Father and of Jesus.



Our Lady of Fatima

Feast Day: May 13

Between May 13 and October 13, 1917, three Portuguese children–Francisco and Jacinta Marto and their cousin Lucia dos Santos–received apparitions of Our Lady at Cova da Iria near Fatima, a city 110 miles north of Lisbon. Mary asked the children to pray the rosary for world peace, for the end of World War I, for sinners, and for the conversion of Russia. Mary gave the children three secrets. Following the deaths of Francisco and Jacinta in 1919 and 1920 respectively, Lucia revealed the first secret in 1927. It concerned devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The second secret was a vision of hell. When Lucia grew up she became a Carmelite nun and died in 2005 at the age of 97. Pope John Paul II directed the Holy See's Secretary of State to reveal the third secret in 2000; it spoke of a "bishop in white" who was shot by a group of soldiers who fired bullets and arrows into him. Many people linked this vision to the assassination attempt against Pope John Paul II in St. Peter's Square on May 13, 1981. The feast of Our Lady of Fatima was approved by the local bishop in 1930; it was added to the Church's worldwide calendar in 2002.

"If You Love Me..."

Gospel Reflection Based on John 14:15-21


We have just heard the words of Jesus: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will pray the Father, and he will give you another Counsellor, to be with you for ever, the Spirit of truth" (Jn 14:15-17a). With these words Jesus reveals the profound link between faith and the profession of Divine Truth, between faith and dedication to Jesus Christ in love, between faith and the practice of a life inspired by the commandments. All three dimensions of faith are the fruit of the action of the Holy Spirit. This action is manifested as an inner force that harmonizes the hearts of the disciples with the Heart of Christ and makes them capable of loving as he loved them. Hence faith is a gift, but at the same time it is a task.

Christ says: "If you love me ..." Faith does not just mean accepting a certain number of abstract truths about the mysteries of God, of man, of life and death, of future realities. Faith consists in an intimate relationship with Christ, a relationship based on love of him who loved us first (cf. 1 Jn 4:11), even to the total offering of himself. "God shows his love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us" (Rom 5:8). What other response can we give to a love so great, if not that of a heart that is open and ready to love?

But what does it mean to love Christ? It means trusting him even in times of trial, following him faithfully even on the Via Crucis, in the hope that soon the morning of the Resurrection will come. Entrusting ourselves to Christ, we lose nothing, we gain everything. In his hands our life acquires its true meaning.

Love for Christ expresses itself in the will to harmonize our own life with the thoughts and sentiments of his Heart. This is achieved through interior union based on the grace of the Sacraments, strengthened by continuous prayer, praise, thanksgiving and penance. We have to listen attentively to the inspirations that he evokes through his Word, through the people we meet, through the situations of daily life. To love him is to remain in dialogue with him, in order to know his will and to put it into effect promptly.

On the Mystery of the Most Holy Trinity

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them. It is the most fundamental and essential teaching in the "hierarchy of the truths of faith". The whole history of salvation is identical with the history of the way and the means by which the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, reveals himself to men "and reconciles and unites with himself those who turn away from sin". To (CCC, 234)

The Trinity is a mystery of faith in the strict sense, one of the "mysteries that are hidden in God, which can never be known unless they are revealed by God". To be sure, God has left traces of his Trinitarian being in his work of creation and in his Revelation throughout the Old Testament. But his inmost Being as Holy Trinity is a mystery that is inaccessible to reason alone or even to Israel's faith before the Incarnation of God's Son and the sending of the Holy Spirit. (CCC, 237)

"O blessed light, O Trinity and first Unity!" God is eternal blessedness, undying life, unfading light. God is love: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God freely wills to communicate the glory of his blessed life. Such is the "plan of his loving kindness", conceived by the Father before the foundation of the world, in his beloved Son: "He destined us in love to be his sons" and "to be conformed to the image of his Son", through "the spirit of sonship". Has plan is a "grace [which] was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began", stemming immediately from Trinitarian love. It unfolds in the work of creation, the whole history of salvation after the fall, and the missions of the Son and the Spirit, which are continued in the mission of the Church. (CCC, 257)

Jesus Took His Place

Gospel Reflection by Pope John Paul II on the Ascension of Our Lord

With joy then and fresh resolves for the future, let us reflect briefly on the great mystery of today's liturgy. In the Scripture readings the whole significance of Christ's Ascension is summarized for us. The richness of this mystery is spelled out in two statements: Jesus gave instructions, and then Jesus took his place.

In the providence of God – in the eternal design of the Father – the hour had come for Christ to go away. He would leave his Apostles behind, with his Mother Mary, but only after he had given them his instructions. The Apostles now had a mission to perform according to the instructions that Jesus left, and these instructions were in turn the faithful expression of the Father's will.

The instructions indicated, above all, that the Apostles were to wait for the Holy Spirit, who was the gift of the Father. From the beginning, it had to be crystal-clear that the source of the Apostles' strength is the Holy Spirit. It is the Holy Spirit who guides the Church in the way of truth; the Gospel is to spread through the power of God, and not by means of human wisdom or strength.

The Apostles, moreover, were instructed to teach – to proclaim the Good News to the whole world. And they were to baptize in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Like Jesus, they were to speak explicitly about the Kingdom of God and about salvation. The Apostles were to give witness to Christ to the ends of the earth. The early Church clearly understood these instructions and the missionary era began. And everybody knew that this missionary era could never end until the same Jesus, who went up to heaven, would come back again.

The words of Jesus became a treasure for the Church to guard and to proclaim, to meditate on and to rive. And at the same time, the Holy Spirit implanted in the Church an apostolic charism, in order to keep this revelation intact. Through his words Jesus was to live on in his Church: I am with you always. And so the whole ecclesial community became conscious of the need for fidelity to the instructions of Jesus, to the deposit of faith. This solicitude was to pass from generation to generation – down to our own day.

And the second reflection on the meaning of the Ascension is found in this phrase: Jesus took his place. After having undergone the humiliation of his passion and death, Jesus took his place at the right-hand of God; he took his place with his eternal Father. But he also entered heaven as our Head. Whereupon, in the expression of Leo the Great, the glory of the Head became the hope of the body. For all eternity Christ takes his place as the firstborn among many brethren: our nature is with God in Christ. And as man, the Lord Jesus lives for ever to intercede for us with Father. At the same time, from his throne of glory, Jesus sends out to the whole Church a message of hope and a call to holiness.

St. Philip Neri


The Patron Saint of Joy & Humor

St. Philip Neri was a Christian missionary and founder of the Congregation of the Oratory, a community of Catholic priests and lay brothers. From a very young age, Philip was known for being cheerful and obedient. A mystical vision at the age of 18 led to his Christian conversion, and this encounter with the Lord dramatically changed his life and led him to serve Jesus Christ and His Church. Philip was an evangelist. He had a knack for starting up conversations and leading his listeners to consider a new and better way of life, the Christian Way. He easily caught others' attention with his warm personality and incredible sense of humor. He encouraged groups of people to gather for discussions, studies, prayer and the enjoyment of music. His customary question was always, "Well, brothers, when shall we begin to do good?" [He lost] no time in converting good conversation to good actions, [and] would lead his followers to hospitals to wait on the sick or to the Church, to pray to and encounter Jesus Christ. In the words of one of his biographers, Philip was "all things to all men.... When he was called upon to be merry, he was so; if there was a demand upon his sympathy, he was equally ready..." Philip was respected and loved throughout Rome; he became a trusted advisor to popes, kings, cardinals and equally as important to the poor. He whole-heartedly desired the reform of the Catholic Church and worked toward that with a sense of gentleness and friendship, rather than criticism and harshness.

If your soul feels weighed down by the anxieties of the world, or if you desire to see the joy of the Gospel in a new way, pray to St. Philip Neri.

O holy St. Philip Neri, patron saint of joy, you who trusted Scripture's promise that the Lord is always at hand and that we need not have anxiety about anything, in your compassion heal our worries and sorrows and lift the burdens from our hearts. We come to you as one whose heart swells with abundant love for God and all creation. Hear us, we pray, especially in this need (make your request here). Keep us safe through your loving intercession, and may the joy of the Holy Spirit which filled your heart, St. Philip, transform our lives and bring us peace. Amen.

It's amazing how much has transpired

over the last 10 weeks since the pandemic hit in mid-March. Hopefully you've taken the time to allow the Lord to feed and nourish you as you've remained close to Him and His Church – albeit from a distance.

As we return to gathering for Mass, you'll notice all the precautions we've instituted to help us maintain social distancing. Given the ease with which the coronavirus is spread, it's hard to be too careful. That said, if you have any concerns about gathering together or about embracing the protocols, the Bishops of Ohio have continued their dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on the weekend. Thus, watching Mass on TV (or other streaming medium) or coming to one of the weekday Masses more than suffices in helping to keep the Lord's Day holy.

Before we can accept any new Mass intentions, the secretary is working diligently to reschedule the intentions of Masses that were scheduled to have been celebrated during the period of our stay-at-home directive. Once rescheduled, we'll be able to accept new requests for intentioned Masses.

Although we are returning to Mass, the weekly confession schedule is still on temporary hiatus. Because the confessional is an enclosed space without adequate ventilation, confession will continue to be celebrated by appointment in the out-of-doors and while wearing a mask. Hopefully, as they find ways to control and defeat the virus, we'll be able to return to confession in a smaller space and behind a screen.

You will notice a change in our bulletin format – starting this week. Ordinarily the bulletin spans information covering a full weeks' worth of events. Well, from this point forward it'll cover 10-12 days' worth of events/happenings/material. Thus, those opting to attend a weekday Mass (instead of a Sunday Mass) will still be able to obtain a bulletin that will take them a full 7-days into the future.

Did you receive the email updates that I sent out every Friday during the lock-down? If you received and read them I hope you found them informative, helpful, and insightful; if you have email but did not receive them – then it would seem that we don't have your up-to-date contact info.

The first time I sent out the weekly email, 40-50 of them bounced — with a message indicating that the account longer exists or the account is invalid. Even after removing all the invalid addresses, I was routinely sending out ~ 250 emails to parishioners of each parish ... more than 500 weekly emails in total.

Not only did we find that many email addresses were out-of-date, but so too were many phone numbers. Because many have chosen to drop their land line, in favor of a cell phone, there were times when I found I couldn't contact parishioners.

If anything in your contact info has changed in the last 10 years, and if you did NOT have your picture taken for our parish pictorial directory (as we had everyone verify their info at the time of their picture), it would be most helpful if you'd take a few minutes to complete and return the parish information update form. I've included a copy with today's bulletin – or you may download, print, and complete it by visiting update.sacredheartoberlin.org ... or ... updated.stpatrick.us.

As you noticed, we did NOT pass out hymnals as you entered Mass today even though, in one of my Friday emails I indicated that we would. The reason for the change is scientific data and the request of the diocese. Studies have show that we project with greater force when singing than when speaking. Hence, whereas a 6' social distance is required when speaking – a 12' social distance is required when singing.

While our Judeo-Christian tradition has always highlighted the importance of praising God in song, hymn, and inspired-song, the diocese (along with the scientific community) is asking that we temporarily suspend singing so as to further hinder the spread of the virus.

Our return to Mass has only been possible with the commitment to thoroughly sanitize the space between Masses. To that end, our custodian (Jim Maziarz) will be working Thursday and Friday mornings (to sanitize following morning Mass), Saturday evenings (to help sanitize following the Saturday 4pm Mass), and Monday morning (to sanitize from the Sunday 10:30am Mass). Anyone wishing to assist Jim in helping to clean the church is most welcome.

Because the church will not be immediately sanitized following the Sunday 10:30 Mass, it will not be a hygienically safe environment to visit. To forestall any potential COVID-19 transmission from an un-sanitized space, keycard access to the church will be disabled following the Sunday morning Mass; keycard access will resume after the church has been properly cleaned and sanitized on Monday morning ... and will remain active throughout the remainder of the week.

Although we have returned to church, access to the Ed Building will remain restricted. At present, we are not able to afford the Ed Building the same sanitizing priority that we've giving to the worship space. So, at least for the time being, our focus will remain our worship space. Those groups who've been meeting over Zoom are encouraged to continue that practice. On days when weather permits, socially distant gatherings are welcome in the picnic area (just east of the Ed Building).

It has been refreshing to see everyone after so many weeks of extreme

distancing. Yet, despite the fact that we're once

again able to worship together, the distancing is still part of the new norm. And I was grateful to all who were overly cautious with regard to distance. In fact, as I looked at everyone in the pews, most left more than the requisite 6' between themselves and others.

For those who are curious about the numbers attending, most of the weekend Masses averages ~50 people; there was no need to turn anyone away because capacity had been reached. As for the weekday Masses, attendance averaged ~25 people.

Just a reminder that the Bishops of Ohio have continued to dispense Catholics from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass. Thus, you are still keeping holy the Lord's Day by participating at Mass on one of the streaming mediums available to you. That said, may also do so by attending a weekday Mass—should you feel comfortable being in the midst of a smaller congregation.

Both St. Pat's and Sacred Heart are sanitized following each Mass. The only Mass where sanitization doesn't immediately follow Mass is the 10:30AM at Sacred Heart; that space is sanitized Monday morning ... which is why keycard access has been disabled for the remainder of Sunday afternoon/evening.

A gracious *thank you* to all who have donated PPE – or who have donned PPE to help sanitize after the various Masses.

On the first Sunday after Pentecost we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, a feast day on which we affirm our faith in the triune God, who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. For Eastern Orthodox Christians, Pentecost Sunday itself is called Trinity Sunday and is the start of a three-day feast celebrating the one God in three persons. The concept of the triune God is essential to Christianity, so it is natural that a feast day would be dedicated to honoring God explicitly as the Holy Trinity.

While the idea that God is a Trinity is agreed upon by mainline Christian traditions, the understanding of the nature of the Trinity has been a contentious issue for centuries. The original version of the Nicene Creed stated that the Holy Spirit is, "the Lord, the Giver of Life, who proceeds from the

Father, Who together with the Father and the Son, is worshiped and glorified, Who was spoke by the prophets." God the Father was understood to be the sole source of the Holy Spirit. In the Latin Church, the phrase "and the Son" came to be added to the Nicene Creed when referring to the procession of the Holy Spirit and was admitted into the liturgy of the western Church between the 8th and 11th centuries. The addition of this new clause into the Creed did not go over very well with the Churches in the East, who maintained the more ancient understanding.

The Creed had been written in the 4th century at the Councils of Nicaea and Constantinople to express the essential beliefs of the Christian faith and to combat the heresy of Arius, who had gained a following over his claims that the Son was subordinate to the Father and not co-eternal with Him. The Filioque (Latin for "and the Son") clause was probably added to the Latin liturgy because of survivals of Arian beliefs and other heretical Christologies, but as far as the eastern traditions were concerned, the Latin Church did not have the authority to add to the Creed without convening a council and obtaining the consent of the eastern bishops. Along with the medieval rise of the papacy in which the Bishop of Rome began to assume universal jurisdiction over the entire Church, the Filioque clause contributed to growing tension that led to the 11th century schism which split east and

The Filioque clause is often understood by the Roman Catholic Church to mean that the Holy Spirit proceeds through the Son from God the Father, not that the Spirit originates from both Father and Son. This does not contradict the Eastern Orthodox view that God the Father is the source of the Spirit and the Spirit is sent by the Son.

Whether or not the Filioque is included in the Creed, and however it is interpreted, Christians of all denominations acknowledge the importance of the understanding of God as triune, as three distinct persons who are of one substance and who are, at the same time, one God.

The Trinity teaches us the importance of relationship, as the three persons of God share in a communion of love that offers us a model for our own Christian life. The teaching of the Scripture Sacrament of Eucharist is very Christ. having promised

his disciples to give them his own flesh as food and his own blood as drink, at the Last Supper took bread and gave it to the disciples telling them that it was his body. Then he took wine and gave it to them, telling them that it was his blood. The Scripture's accounts regarding the promise of the institution of the Eucharist do not indicate that Christ spoke figuratively. On the contrary, the circumstances, the power and wisdom of Christ himself, the manner in which his words were understood by his hearers, all point to the literal meaning of those words as the only possible interpretation.

This interpretation is confirmed by the manner in which St. Paul speaks of the Eucharist and which appears in the constant teaching of the Church from the earliest times. St. Cyril of Jerusalem (4th century) writes: "When the Lord has said of the bread 'this is my body', who shall dare to doubt? And when he has asserted and said, 'this is my blood,' who shall ever doubt that it is indeed his blood?"

It is impossible to convey in this small space the entire teaching of the Fathers of the first three or four centuries on the Sacrament of the Eucharist. References to the Eucharist we find in great abundance, but very rarely treatises on the subject. The Eucharistic doctrine was well known among Christians, requiring no explanation. So accustomed were the early Christians frequenting the Holy Sacrifice and to receiving Communion, so intimately did the Eucharist enter into their daily lives, that their pastors did not deem it necessary to write books to teach them what must have been so familiar to them from their daily practice.

Many passages might be quoted from the writings of the Fathers of the Church. We already find St. Ignatius of Antioch (110AD) arguing: "See, that you use one Eucharist, for one is the flesh of our Lord Jesus Christ, and one is the chalice unto the communion of his blood; one is

the altar, and one the bishop together with the priests and deacons." The argument for unity among Christians loses all its force unless the Eucharist is really and truly the one body and blood of Christ. Still more clearly is belief in the real presence implied in St. Ignatius' letter to the Smyrnaeans, where he says: "They abstain from the Eucharist and prayer because they do not believe that the Eucharist is the flesh of our Savior Jesus Christ which suffered for our sins and which the Father in his bounty raised up again."

Very explicitly does St. Justin (+165) state the doctrine of the Real Presence when he presents his account of the celebration of the Eucharist in his work "The Eucharistic Sacrifice." St. Irenaeus (203AD) writes: "The bread that is taken from the earth, perceiving the invocation of God, is no longer ordinary bread, but the Eucharist, consisting of two things: an earthly and a heavenly.'

St. Cyprian (258AD), while he praises the fortitude of the many confessors of the faith, laments at the same time that many of those who had fallen into idolatry expected immediately, without having done penance, to be allowed to receive Communion: "Violence is done to the body and blood of the Lord, and greater violence now with their hands and with their lips than when they denied the Lord."

Most Holy Body Blood of Christ



Happy Father's Day to All Fathers, Including Our Father in Heaven!

As we celebrate Father's Day today in the United

States, we include Our Father in heaven and we honor and thank Him for all He has done for us in sending Christ to show us the Father, His mercy and His love.

Jesus taught His disciples the "Our Father" prayer when they asked Him to teach them how to pray. This prayer is a model for us and a sure guide to living the Christian life. As Saint Cyprian taught in a treatise on the Lord's Prayer:

How merciful the Lord is to us, how kind and richly compassionate! He wished us to repeat this prayer in God's sight, to call the Lord our Father and, as Christ is God's Son, be called in turn sons [and daughters] of God! None of us would ever have dared to utter this name unless he himself had allowed us to pray in this way. And therefore, dear friends, we should bear in mind and realize that when we call God our Father we ought also to act like sons [and daughters]. If we are pleased to call him Father, let him in turn be pleased to call us sons [and daughters].

We should live like the temples of God we are, so that it can be seen that God lives in us. No act of ours should be unworthy of the spirit. Now that we have begun to live in heaven and in spirit, all our thoughts and actions should be heavenly and spiritual; for, as the Lord God himself has said: Those who honor me I will honor, and those who despise me shall be despised [cf 1 Samuel 2:30]. And the blessed Apostle wrote in his letter: You are not your own; you were bought with a great price. So glorify and bear God in your body [1 Corinthians 6:19-20].

So, taking St. Cyprian's words to heart, for those who have not seen this, here is a popular description of some things implicit in the Our Father which call us to conversion and call us to account.* Food for thought!

- Don't say: "Our" if you live a life isolated in your own big fat ego.
- Don't say "Father"—if you don't behave as a child of God.

- Don't say: "who art in heaven"—if you are focused on earthly things.
- Don't say: "hallowed be thy name"—if you curse, swear or otherwise do not honor God's name (and His person).
- Don't say: "thy kingdom come"—if you think being successful in the world equates to the Kingdom of God.
- Don't say: "thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven"—if you do not accept God's will when it's painful, and if you do not believe in heaven.
- Don't say: "give us this day our daily bread" if you're not concerned about—and doing something to help—the hungry and those without the necessities of life.
- Don't say: "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us"—if you hold grudges against others or bear resentment against them.
- Don't say: "lead us not into temptation"—if you intend to continue sinning.
- Don't say: "deliver us from evil"—if you do not take a stand against evil.
- Don't say: "Amen"—if you do not believe in the words of the Our Father.





I don't know about celebration of Mass

and can once again gather at a social-distance, there's no question that the celebration is different than anything I've ever experienced. As one who enjoys singing, it seems a bit anti-climactic to hear some beautiful music – and yet not be able to join together in song. While I call the lyrics to mindit's just not the same as singing aloud those words of praise.

The changes we've had to make to be able to once again gather for Mass have given me pause to consider what is the real purpose behind our gathering together, week-after-week, at Mass.

If you were to ask many Catholics what the Mass is, what might you hear? Perhaps you might hear some of the following words: community event, meal, fellowship, celebration, among others. Certainly, the Mass involves all of these things. But more than anything else, the Mass is a sacrifice. It is a prayer. This is a truth that can readily be forgotten, or set aside, in our Catholic culture.

There was a study that came out maybe twenty years ago or so that asked what brings people to church on any given Sunday in any given Christian community. The three most common answers by far (including for Catholics) were:

- a) the music,
- b) the preaching, and;
- c) the community.

When it comes to the Mass, however, all three of these things are non-essential. What do I mean? I mean that even if we are missing all three, we still have the essential sacrifice of the Mass - the sacrifice of Calvary, made present on the altar.

There is also a danger when we make any one of these our primary reasons for going to Mass - because it tends to make Mass all about us and what we can get out of it. It puts the emphasis on our feelings. The truth is, the Mass is about what we have to give to God. We have a moral obligation to worship God, but God is the one who has given us the worship - in the Mass. The Mass is how He desires to be adored. When we participate in Mass, we "render unto God what is God's" (Mt. 22:21). How do we do this? First, by offering Him His Son. Second, by offering Him ourselves.

If we understand this, it will radically change the way we see the Mass and our participation in it. We will no longer evaluate Mass by how entertained we are, or by what we "get out of it." We will start to understand the Mass for what it truly is, which can change everything.

"History In Reflection for 4th A note of July: How American Independence" Fr.

Stephen Lynch, states, "Prayer played an important role in the American struggle for independence." He goes on to relate a request that the meetings of the Continental Congress be with prayer. After considerable disagreement, the Congress agreed to have the Rev. Mr. Duche read a prayer. John Adams describes what transpired:

"Accordingly, next morning the Rev. Duche appeared with his Episcopal vestments and read the 85th Psalm. I never saw a greater effect produced upon an audience. It seemed as if heaven had ordained that psalm to be read on that morning."

"George Washington was kneeling there, alongside him Patrick Henry, James Madison, and John Hancock. By their side there stood, bowed in reverence, the Puritan patriots of New England, who at that moment had reason to believe that an armed soldiery was wasting their humble households. They prayed fervently for America, for Congress, for the Province of Massachusetts Bay, and especially for the town of Boston [whose port had been closed and in which British troops were being quartered."

Lynch concludes by saying, "The First Continental Congress proved to be an inspiring example of the fraternal unity that can come through devout prayer."

In reflecting on the importance of prayer in our nation's beginning, we are reminded of the words of Jesus Christ who declared, "Men ought always to pray and not to faint." As never before, we need to continue to pray for our nation.



As we're a parish under the patronage of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, I share with you a synopsis of an article on the topic that is available at

catholicexchange.com:

Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, 1647-1690, had heavy burdens from her earliest years. She lost her father to pneumonia when she was only eight years old. After her father died she was sent to the Urbanist sisters where the order and peace of soul ushered in by the convent life swept her up into her devotions. From early on she took great comfort and consolation in the Blessed Sacrament. She impressed her order of nuns by her faithfulness so much that she was invited to make her First Holy Communion when she was nine years old.

When Saint Mary Margaret was eleven years old she suffered paralysis from rheumatic fever. She embraced her suffering by way of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. She began to be gifted with visions for her faithful devotion. She was healed from her rheumatic fever and the accompanying infirmities by a vision of Holy Mother Mary, who impelled her to devote her life to God, which she did with unusual fervor.

As an additional consolation for her devotion to Christ's Sacred Heart, Saint Mary Margret received visions from the Savior, one of which was of His scourging. Christ revealed more to Mary Margaret during her devotions by saying to her: "Look at this heart which has loved people so much, and yet they do not want to love me in return. Through you, My divine Heart wishes to spread its love everywhere on earth." Jesus proceeded to make many promises to her and to those who honor His Sacred Heart as she had. From the writings of St. Mary Margaret Alacoque we have twelve of the most powerful promises that Christ revealed to her through private revelation.

This list of twelve promises does not comprise all of the promises Christ made to Saint Mary Margaret concerning the devotion to His Sacred Heart. These are the twelve promises most likely to draw faithful souls to this most worthy devotion. But still, they are only a few of the many graces promised to those willing to offer up their broken hearts to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

- 1. Christ promises: "I will give them all the graces necessary for their state in life." Our particular challenges carry with them different needs for different graces; Christ promises to give us what we need when we need it.
- 2. Christ promises: "I will give peace in their families." Who would not greatly prize bringing the graces of peace to their family in the hopes of more faithfully imitating the Holy Family?

- 3. Christ promises: "I will console them in all their troubles." Though our troubles will never vanish on this side of Paradise, Christ's consolations make all things bearable. Further, by Christ's grace, our troubles become the means to further the conversion of our heart by the fruits of redemptive suffering.
- 4. Christ promises: "They shall find in my heart a refuge during life and especially at the hour of death." At what precise moment are we in the greatest need of Christ's grace? At the hour of our death. By daily growing in our awareness of Christ's presence, we will surely be consoled by that presence at the hour of our death.
- 5. Christ promises: "I will pour abundant blessings on all their undertakings." May God sanctify our every action so that we may amass treasure in heaven while we live in this world, all the while trying not to be of it
- 6. Christ promises: "Sinners shall find in my heart the source and infinite Ocean of mercy." As Pope Francis has often said, Christ's Church is *a hospital for sinners*. May we offer our broken hearts to our Father in heaven.
- 7. Christ promises: "Tepid souls shall become fervent." By pondering the fervent love of Christ's heart our hearts will be transformed and set aflame!
- 8. Christ promises: "Fervent souls shall speedily rise to great perfection." Once the tepid heart is set aflame in love, it wants to grow evermore in love.
- 9. Christ promises: "I will bless the homes in which the image of my Sacred Heart shall be exposed and honored." While images of Jesus' Sacred Heart may serve as good reminders, Christ calls us to let his love shine brightest amongst those whom we sometimes take for granted.
- 10. Christ promises: "I will give to priests the power to touch the most hardened hearts." At our baptism we were anointed as priest, prophet, and king! As sharers in the priesthood of believers, Christ gives us the power to touch & soften the hardest-of-hearts.
- 11. Christ promises: "Those who further this devotion shall have their name written in my heart." As with any relationship, the more deeply you fall in love with another the deeper the imprint upon your heart!
- 12. Christ Promises: "The all-powerful love of my Heart will grant to all who regularly receive communion the grace of final repentance; they shall not die under my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; my heart shall be their assured refuge at the last hour." Simply summarized: if we make it a point to always live in a state-of-grace ... there's no doubt that we'll die in a state-of-grace!

A University professor at a well-known institution of higher learning challenged his students with this



While some might think we are going overboard on our distancing and sanitization practices at the

parish, I would like to think that we've simply been prudent in our approach. But, proactive as we've been, I've recently realized that an additional prudent step would be in order – and, gratefully, that step involves no additional effort on anyone's part!

A bit over a year ago I installed a couple \$25 Wyze cams to help Deacon Tom and me assess the situation when the security company calls to report an alarm. The ability to glance at the worship space or the parking lot, while simultaneously speaking with the security company, has enabled us to assess the situation. Little did I realize that what was once installed to help prevent unnecessary calls to the local police department for assistance could play a vital role in the midst of the current pandemic; that role: CONTACT TRACING!

When the cameras were first installed, we only ever used their live feed option; memory cards were deemed superfluous because archival images seemed to serve no purpose. But more-and-more we're hearing about the importance of being able to identify anyone with whom a covid-positive person has been in contact ... which brought upon an "ah-ha" moment and a significant reason for having archival imagery.

Whereas at St. Patrick Parish there is a camera directed toward each nave (focusing on both sanctuary and congregation), the only cameras at Sacred Heart face the sanctuary – and everyone's backside. Thus, for the sake of the ability to trace contacts (should we ever be notified that someone who tested covid-positive had attended Mass), a camera is now located in the choir area facing the congregation. That said, contact tracing

would seem to be the only foreseeable reason for retaining any temporarily-archived images captured by any camera. (The cameras overwrite the oldest images as disk space begins to run low.)

Just as we wear masks, not to protect ourselves from others but to protect others from whatever it is we may have — it's also probably important to be proactive in advising others, should our wearing of masks not prove 100% effective. To that end, if you are, or if a family member is, diagnosed with the coronavirus and have recently been to Mass, I encourage you to let me know. I'll attempt to reach out to anyone who might've been sitting near you to encourage them to follow whatever CDC guidelines that might be appropriate to the situation.

May we never be faced with the necessity of notifying someone that they sitting in proximity to a covid-positive individual ... but having the ability to do so is but a step in the process of eradicating this virus.


With the unknown future of the schooling in the fall, our PSR program is also undecided how to continue. Therefore, we are going to be having a survey to see how our

While we, in the USA, face our

pandemic, other areas of our

world are being impacted even more than are we. The people of Belize, for example, whose economy is solely based on tourism, are without income altogether.

Why would I highlight the hardships of the people of Belize over those suffering in other parts of our world? This mission to Belize was first started by Fr. Bob Hass, when he was stationed at St. Mary's in Wakeman. And several parishioners from Sacred Heart Parish in Oberlin have gone hands-on with this effort for the past 6 years. Additionally, parishioners from St. Joe's (Amherst), St. Mary's (Wakeman), Our Lady of Lourdes (New London), and St. Paul's (Norwalk) have also participated in this mission. In January they've ventured to Belize "on their own dime," (as do all volunteers) to assist the Belize Children's Food Foundation in their efforts to help the poor youth of Belize; this year they repaired tattered buildings and installed indoor plumbing in a



school. And the parish in Belize that they've worked through is Sacred Heart Parish!

The Belize Children's Food Foundation was established as a 501(c)3 Corporation in 2009. This Foundation is specifically designed to provide hot lunch meals, school tuition, school supplies and refurbish educational facilities for the impoverished children of Belize.

As a non-profit organization, the Foundation raises proceeds only through the generosity of individuals and corporations who understand the plight of these children.

Furthermore, 100% of all these donations go directly to the purchase of food, supplies, tuition and construction materials.

In Belize, there is no government assistance. There are no programs that regulate the educational system, provide school lunches, or delegate maintenance teams to assess the classroom structure stability. Each year, a group of volunteers with the Foundation travel to Belize to help with each of these issues to ensure the well-being of the children.

This year we are focusing on two Catholic schools (St. Francis Xavier and Sacred Heart Primary), located in the Cayo district. Each of these schools needs electrical and plumbing updates, chalkboards. structural repairs, and concrete sidewalks.

The Foundation could not exist without the endless efforts and countless hours spent from all those involved to provide for these children. Please help us to continue our quest in providing food and education for each of these deprived children. Any amount can make a huge difference in a child's life and provide him or her with an opportunity for a healthy, productive and successful future.

As part of our ongoing Community Outreach and Needs collections, I'd like to designate our August receipts to help with the education and feeding of the poorest-of-the-poor in Belize. As Saturday, August 15th is the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary into heaven, I thought I'd share the following reflection,

which may be found on the franciscanmedia.org website (see link at end).

And while the Solemnity is a Holy Day of obligation when it falls Tuesday thru Friday, it is not obligatory in 2020 because it falls this coming Saturday.

The Story of the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names—Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption—from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's Assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testaments, her Assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.


Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven.

Reflection

In the light of the Assumption of Mary, it is easy to pray her Magnificat (Luke 1:46–55) with new meaning. In her glory she proclaims the greatness of the Lord and finds joy in God her savior. God has done marvels to her and she leads others to recognize God's holiness. She is the lowly handmaid who deeply reverenced her God and has been raised to the heights. From her position of strength she will help the lowly and the poor find justice on earth, and she will challenge the rich and powerful to distrust wealth and power as a source of happiness.

In recent weeks I've had a variety of conversations with a healthy cross-section of individuals. When I asked one person how they've been





This past
Monday the Office
for Worship of the
Diocese of
Cleveland offered a
webinar for parish
music directors, as

well as for pastors, to talk about the topic of singing at Mass while in the midst a pandemic. The short take-away from the 75-minute meeting was: don't sing!

Studies have demonstrated that: singing at a normal volume projects moisture particles nearly twice as far as those projected when speaking. (I must say that I had to chuckle, as well as simultaneously be a bit disgusted, when the speaker referred to the projected particulate as a "spit cloud" - but, essentially, that's what it is). When a group sings, whether chorally or congregationally, the space should be occupied for no more than 30minutes. The practice that we've embodied (at both St. Pat's and Sacred Heart), namely the recitation of normally sung parts (Gloria, Holy Holy, Memorial Acclamation, Great Amen, and Lamb of God) is the preferred and recommended practice. Although allowing a cantor sing the normally sung parts of Mass using an unfamiliar setting (to keep us from singing along) might sound nice, it would further reduce congregational participation. And, because Mass not being a spectator-sport but, rather, a participative event during which we encounter our God in Word and Sacrament, it is better that we remain active participants at Mass – even if that means we have to recite what, heretofore, we've always enjoyed singing.

In the Q&A that followed the presenter, one of the best suggestions of the webinar was raised. One person asked: "If we're not supposed to sing because of the particulate-cloud that's formed by the singing, would it not be acceptable to sing a verse of the final hymn and then immediately vacate the space?" The panel of presenters felt this would be an acceptable option – because the space would be vacated immediately thereafter.

I probably like singing more than most and it's been a challenge to celebrate Mass without being able to "sing unto the Lord" in a manner to which I've become accustomed. I know you feel the same way, because I've heard from many of you about how the lack of singing changes the whole tenor of Mass. I couldn't agree with you more! But, hopefully a verse of a final hymn will help bring a

bit of "normalcy" back to a way-of-life (and worship) that is anything but normal. BTW, we'll only sing a single verse of well known hymns—so no books or lyrics should ever be needed.

Speaking of hymnals: it is unlikely that we will be able to use hymnals at Mass anytime soon, we'll be distributing the current hymnals after Mass FOR USE ONLY AT HOME (whether you choose to prayerfully reflect on the weekend readings or sing a joyful song to the Lord). PLEASE DO NOT BRING THEM TO CHURCH WITH YOU, however; they're too easily forgotten in the pew. Furthermore, if you and a person sitting nearby you should happen to both bring hymnals and errantly pick up the wrong one after communion, you've potentially cross-contaminated one another.



A year ago, when Deacon Tom spoke with Bp. Perez about retiring from active ministry, his 1 June 2020 retirement date

seemed so-far-in-the-future ... and we were grateful that we'd have many months to prepare for his less-frequent presence at the parish. Well, those months flew by – and so did 1 June 2020 – and Deacon Tom is still with us. Why? He chose to postpone his retirement because COVID had caused the postponement of so many sacramental events (including First Communions, Confirmation, and receiving new Catholics into the faith) and he didn't want to step-back until he'd been a part of those celebrations!

That Deacon Tom wanted to delay his retirement didn't surprise me; he embraces his Diaconal ministry with the mindset of: "Love what you do, and do what you love." And, since his assignment at Sacred Heart began in December of 2010, he has been selfless in his love for, and the ministry he has shared with, the Sacred Heart parish family.

Over the last 3 years I have come to appreciate the experiences and insights Deacon Tom has brought to Sacred Heart. Nearly a year before Fr. Cole's retirement, Fr. Cole, Deacon Tom, and I sat in the living room of the Sacred Heart rectory to talk about how to start building the foundation that would allow for a smooth transition to retirement for Fr. Cole. Deacon Tom's analytical approach, organizational abilities and out-of-the-box thinking, were extremely helpful. After our meetings, it was not uncommon for me to find (by the time I'd returned to St. Patrick Parish) an email in my box that offered a concise synthesis of our discussion – as well as a listing of working points that we'd need to refine and hone before our next gathering; Deacon Tom surely never learned the meaning of procrastination! And, because of that, we have all reaped the benefit.

This "retirement weekend" is a weekend of mixed emotions. I've come to appreciate the friendship and ministry that Deacon Tom and I share. I also have witness not just how deeply everyone loves Deacon Tom – but his depth of love and concern for everyone at Sacred Heart. So, to speak of this weekend as his "retirement weekend" would seem to indicate that things are ending. But that's where the other emotion kicks in: it's not

over! Not only have I extended to Deacon Tom an open-door invitation to return, but he has also spoken of his desire to periodically return – and even to preach. So, the thrust of this "retirement weekend" is to connote a transition: instead of seeing Deacon Tom at both Masses almost every weekend, he'll only occasionally be joining us for Mass.

For my next statement, please make sure to read this entire paragraph for the full perspective. There's no doubt that Deacon Tom's reduced presence among us is a great loss, but I am also elated by a great gain that will result from his reduced presence. When a man is ordained to the permanent diaconate, the Bishop reminds him that his first vocation is to his spouse and family – because he embarked upon the Sacrament of Marriage long before he was ordained a deacon. For the last 2+ years that I've been at Sacred Heart, every time his wife Margee has been at Mass, Deacon Tom has been sitting alongside me - instead of alongside her. But, more often than not, only Deacon Tom has been at Sacred Heart – and Margee has been by herself (or with their family) at their local parish of St. Peter and/or St. Julie Billiart. 



As believers, we A note do not read the Bible from our Pastor about its content or to be inspired by its religious message. We

read the Scripture in order to be transformed, to be shaped and reshaped by that message so that we can reveal it in new and authentic ways in live. our the manner

Whether we realize or not, we are always involved in complex of reinterpretation. We do not simply read the Bible in order to discover what it meant to the original community. We are interested in what the Bible might say to us today, and in some ways it might say something quite different than it said to those who first heard it. This calls for reinterpretation.

The reason the Bible might be interpreted differently lies in changes that take place in our human history. Let us take, for example, the understanding of family. It has changed dramatically not only over the centuries but even in our own lifetime. We may have grown up thinking that a family consisted of Father, Mother, Jack and Jill, Spot the dog and Whiskers the cat. Today we have nuclear extended families, single-parent families. families and multiple-marriage families to name but a few examples. We now realize that when we read the word "family," we cannot automatically presume that we know what is meant by the term. The same is true with various expressions found in the Bible. contemporary awareness of racial or gender bias makes us sensitive to the way characters in the biblical stories relate to people of different races or to the status accorded to women in the society described. There are times that we cannot simply take the words of the Bible and apply them to our lives. Most of us knows that reinterpretation is rather difficult to do and that the customs of a distant culture do not fit the experience of our own. What should we do? It is neither necessary nor wise to reject the biblical message outright. Using the right commentary we might be able to come to new insights into how we can be faithful to the meaning of the biblical message in our times.

As we read some of the teaching found in the Scripture, we can see the need for such reinterpretation. For example, when the authors refer to the neighboring Edomites, Philistines and Samaritans with loathing. Certainly the summons of Jesus to love even one's enemies requires that we do more than loathe those who are different than we are. Interpretation will help us to see that these ancient political enemies frequently also posed a religious threat to the people of Israel. Reinterpretation will encourage us to discover what in our own lives challenges our religious integrity. Sometimes the biblical message does not challenge contemporary experience so much as contemporary insight challenges the biblical community.

We believe that God was revealed in the lives of our religious ancestors. We also believe that the traditions that they developed to describe and to explain this divine selfrevelation, traditions that are contained within the Bible, also reveal God. What we must also remember is that God is revealed in our lives as well. We face the same challenge that was faced by believers down the centuries. We are called to bring the experience of our own lives into creative dialogue with our religious tradition in order to discover anew the God who is with us. We are called to transform our lives in accord with this new discovery.

Two weeks ago I was at a diaconate ordination in Youngstown, and the following day I was at

the young transitional-deacon's Mass of Thanksgiving in Canton (also part of the Youngstown Diocese). At the Cathedral church on Saturday, as well as at the parish church on Sunday, there was a LOT of singing — Opening, Offertory, Communion, Recessional, as well as ALL the acclamations.

My experience in the Diocese of Youngstown is not dissimilar to what I've heard about parishes west of us. As we live on the doorstep of the Diocese of Toledo, I have had individuals ask me why they're singing and we're not. Additionally, in the Diocese of Greensburg (from where our new bishop, Bp. Malesic hails) they have chosen to sing at Mass.

So, with everyone else singing, why aren't we singing at St. Patrick or Sacred Heart (with the exception of a final him)? Simply put, we don't belong to either the Diocese of Youngstown or the Diocese of Toledo.

The directive of the Diocese of Cleveland (DOC) is that we should avoid singing at Mass because you sing with greater force than you speak. Studies have demonstrated that the micro-droplets we expel when singing travel farther than those we expel while speaking. Granted, we're all wearing masks – but the DOC felt it is better to suspend singing (and help forestall further spread of the virus) than it is to sing (and, potentially, spread the virus to other members of the congregation; succinctly put: erring on the side of caution.

I'll be the first to admit that I really liked being able to sing again at Mass. But I must also say I was very apprehensive about the experience as well – since I didn't feel the social -distancing or practices are as disciplined as

they are within the DOC. And so, over the last two weeks, I've been even more diligent with mask-wearing and taking my temperature; having been a part of an environment that I didn't feel was as safe as what we're promoting within the DOC, I wanted to do my duediligence to ensure my health wasn't compromised.

When the DOC changes its COVID guidelines and believes it is appropriate to sing at Mass without risking further spread of the virus, I'll be the second one in line for singing; I say that because I know Carl Lee is already standing in that line!



A message on the upcoming election from Bishop Edward Malesic

Once again, we find ourselves in a very polarized election cycle with candidates that do not reflect the complete breadth of Catholic moral

teaching. Yet, it is our solemn duty as citizens of our republic to cast a vote for the candidate who best supports the greatest ideals and moral teachings of our Catholic faith, the faith that we hold and practice as the means of our personal salvation and as a benefit for the common good of the pluralistic society in which we live.

In casting our ballot, whether for those already proposed by a particular party or for those we choose to write in, we must have properly formed consciences. A properly formed conscience comes through prayer, Scripture and studying the teaching of the Church that is promoted and protected by the apostles and their successors, the bishops. This well-formed conscience seeks to understand the truth and allows itself to be guided by the Holy Spirit. A well-formed conscience is devoted to doing God's will more than it is to supporting any particular political party.

As such, I wanted to write this letter to help you in forming your conscience in preparation for the vote that you will soon cast.

Our bishops have said, and I agree with them, that "the threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family and because of the number of lives destroyed." (See the new introductory letter found in Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship: A Call to Political Responsibility from the Catholic Bishops of the United States, which can be found online at www.usccb.org.)

The consistent teaching of the Church regarding the intrinsic evil of abortion seeks to secure all other rights as well. We are not a "single issue" Church; there are other extremely important rights that we must defend, to be sure; but these additional rights flow from and are rooted in the fundamental right to life itself.

St. Pope John Paul II stated, "Above all, the common outcry, which is justly made on behalf of human rights – for example, the right to health, to home, to work, to family, to culture – is false and

illusory if the right to life, the most basic and fundamental right and the condition for all other personal rights, is not defended with maximum determination." (Christifideles laici, No. 38)

Our bishops noted in Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, "A Catholic voter cannot vote for a candidate who favors a policy promoting an intrinsically evil act, such as abortion, euthanasia, assisted suicide, subjecting workers or the poor to subhuman living conditions, redefining marriage in ways that violate its essential meaning, or racist behavior, if the voter's intent is to support that position. . . At the same time, a voter should not use a candidate's opposition to an intrinsic evil to justify indifference or inattentiveness to other important moral issues involving human life and dignity." (#34)

When we cast our vote, we must not remain indifferent to those positions and policies that would negatively impact religious freedoms, erode the traditional family, or make it difficult for the poor to access adequate education, housing and healthcare. We must carefully consider how to fix our broken immigration system, address the worldwide refugee crisis, preserve our natural resources, protect the environment and strive for humane solutions to global conflict and terrorism.

But, to be clear, although there are many causes our Church stands for and is vocal about, the right to life itself must be given our paramount consideration so that people can have the chance to secure all the other benefits that life can afford.

I humbly ask that you take my thoughts into consideration as you prepare to cast your ballot in the near future. Please ask the Holy Spirit to guide your decision, having before all else the desire to secure the common good for our nation and to do God's will in all things. I will pray for you and ask that you pray for me as we make our choice of civil leadership, hopefully with well-formed consciences. And, let us all pray for those who are running for election this cycle. May the Lord inspire them to be the best that they can be for all of us, for our nation and for our world.

A note acts of charity is to pray for the living and the dead.

The greatest and most powerful prayer we have is

the Mass, since the fruits of the Mass are the very fruits of Jesus' redemption. For that reason, all are encouraged to have Mass offered for loved ones who have died, or even for the living who have some need. This is an ancient Catholic practice, and all are encouraged to take it up.

If you're wondering why we've waited until October to open the 2021 Mass book, it's because Canon Law requires that we take intentions for no more than a year in advance. By waiting until October, it allows us the opportunity to fill the remaining requests for 2020 – while also keeping us within the spirit of canonical regulations.

A Mass intention may be requested for a Mass for: a deceased loved one; a living person who is sick or suffering; a living person who is celebrating a birthday, anniversary or other special moment in their life; in thanksgiving to God (or to a particular person of the Blessed Trinity); in thanksgiving for an answered prayer from a Blessed or a Saint; or for a prayer intention (so long as the intention does not contradict Church teaching).

Please be mindful that there are some days throughout the year for which we do not accept intentions (eg. Holy Thursday, Easter, All Saints, and Christmas).

If you're wondering whether it's possible to intention a Mass on a particular date, you can always peruse the parish calendar at http://calendar.shoj.cc . You will find two entries for each Mass: one indicating that a Mass is scheduled, and; one indicating the intention of the particular Mass. As long as the intention entry reads "unintentioned,"

then you're 99.9% assured that (as of the moment you're perusing the web) the Mass is actually unintentioned. (I say 99.9% because there's always the possibility that I, or one of the parish secretaries, forgot to update the web at the time we put the intention into the Mass book). When visiting the online page, be mindful that Masses and intentions that are green will be celebrated at St. Patrick Parish, and Masses and intentions that are red will be celebrated at Sacred Heart Catholic Church. From either parish website you can see the Masses and intentions for both parishes.

Mass intention requests will be honored on a first-come-first-served basis. The Diocese of Cleveland suggests a donation of \$10 per Mass – checks should be made payable to the parish.

We're exactly two months away from Christmas Eve/Day—and there's no doubt it'll be a celebration unlike any we've known before.

Because Christmas Masses have always drawn a significant crowd, and because everyone's health and safety require that we maintain social-distancing, open-seating at Christmas Masses will not be an option this year; those coming to Mass on Christmas Eve/Day will need to reserve a seat for a particular Mass. [Let me be the first to say that I dislike the idea of reserved-only seating. When I mentioned to two priest-friends from Chicago, IL that we'll have to reserve seats for Christmas, they told me: "The Archbishop mandated reserved seating ever since churches reopened in June." So, although I dislike the idea of needing to reserve seats for Christmas, I'm also grateful it hasn't been a weekly necessity!]

With reserved Christmas seating a necessity, I'd like to make sure our Christmas Mass schedule is configured in such a way as to meet the needs of as many families as possible. And because 4PM Mass has always been the 'sweet-spot' of Christmas Eve Mass times, I'm suggesting that both St. Pat's and Sacred Heart have a 4PM Christmas Eve Mass; this is only possible because of Fr. Kraig's availability to assist.

As for the Christmas Night Mass. I wonder about the feasibility of retaining the 10PM time-frame. While 10PM Mass has had a comfortable attendance, it's been far from a full church. Would having a slightly earlier Mass (perhaps 8 or 9PM) allow families to attend—perhaps after a small-group gathering instead of before.

The following survey offers several options for your prayerful consideration. And while I know that no single schedule can accommodate everyone's wishes/desires, my preference is for a schedule that would focus on meeting the greatest needs.

Our parish Healing Prayer Team is willing to pray with parishioners for their needs during this time of Covid-19 and social distancing by telephone upon request. 

On this Solemnity of All Saints we honor faith and have done so in a glorious way.

As we honor these great champions of faith, let's reflect upon who they are and what role they continue to play in the life of the Church. The following excerpt is from Chapter 8 of My Catholic Faith! (by John Paul Thomas - ISBN: 978-0692511596):

Those who have gone before us and now share in the glories of Heaven, in the Beatific Vision, are not gone. Sure, we do not see them and we cannot necessarily hear them speak to us in the physical way they did while on Earth. But they are not gone at all. Moral Guidance regarding Vaccines and COVID-19 (23 Nov 2020)

(Prepared by Rev. Joseph Koopman, Moral Theologian- St. Mary Seminary)

With the prospect of the FDA approving one (or more) COVID-19 vaccines within the next few weeks, many questions have been raised regarding the ethical status of these vaccines (particularly questioning whether embryonic stem cells or tissue from aborted fetuses were used in their creation, and whether Catholics can morally receive such vaccines). The following is a brief moral analysis to help provide you some guidance when these questions arise. *Be mindful that this analysis is dependent on current information, and therefore could change once more information is released.* It has only been within the last few days that the findings of some of the vaccines have been submitted to the FDA for approval, so more information will be forthcoming in the upcoming weeks as the government and independent researchers have access to data.

- •At this point, it appears as if the vaccine created by **Pfizer/Biontech**, along with the vaccine created by **Moderna** have <u>not</u> been created using material of illicit origin (i.e., embryonic stem cells and/or the tissue of aborted children.) For Catholics, this is great news. Theologically speaking, there are no moral or religious grounds that would restrict the consciences of Catholics from receiving these vaccines.
- •There have been articles and press releases that affirm that, while these above vaccines were not *created* with material of illicit origin, there is good reason to believe that these vaccines may have been *tested* (post production) utilizing the tissue of aborted fetuses. These articles and statements, therefore, conclude that it is immoral to use them. This sweeping conclusion is *inconsistent with Catholic moral teaching*.

A critical question is: "Are Catholics <u>always</u> forbidden to perform an action if it touches upon evil, or cooperates, somehow, with the evil action of another?" The answer is 'no'. There *certainly* are instances when Catholics *must* refrain from immoral cooperation. However, Catholic teaching on moral cooperation makes critical distinctions (mediate/immediate, proximate/remote, etc) to determine the *degree or level to which* one cooperates in evil. In some cases, some forms of cooperation, while unfortunate, can be allowed in certain circumstances.

Unfortunately, we live in a fallen world. Dig deep enough, and one finds that many of our actions somehow touch upon evil and the evil actions of others. While the Church draws a firm line in delineating certain acts of cooperation as immoral, it does not condemn *all* actions of cooperation as such. It challenges us to be aware of evil around us, to *always* choose the option that involves less evil (or no evil), and to speak and challenge others to desist from evil. It is for this reason that the Church, in the early months of vaccine development for COVID 19, boldly challenged (and continues to challenge) researchers and the medical industry to seek moral means of vaccine

production (and to reject the use of material of illicit origin that involved the destruction of unborn life).

Regarding the previous statement regarding the immorality of taking the vaccine because of immoral post-production testing, or even statements from some bishops that have forbidden vaccines derived from material of illicit origin, the following paragraph from Dignitas Personae, issued from the CDF under Pope Benedict XVI, offers critical (and perhaps surprising) conclusions. In speaking of the use of embryonic stem cell lines or the tissue of aborted children, the document states in no. 35: "Grave reasons may be morally proportionate to justify the use of such 'biological material'. Thus, for example, danger to the health of children could permit parents to use a vaccine which was developed using cell lines of illicit origin, while keeping in mind that everyone has the duty to make known their disagreement and to ask that their healthcare system make other types of vaccines available." While the statement uses the example of the danger to the health of children, the dangers of COVID-19 particularly to our vulnerable elderly or those with compromised health could reasonably be presumed as grave reason for vaccination. While the Church unequivocally condemns researchers and the medical industry for the creation, production, and distribution of vaccines produced from embryonic stem cells and from the tissue of aborted children, the *receiving* of these vaccines is in another moral category.

•In conclusion, at this point there appears to be no moral issues to prohibit a Catholic from receiving vaccines produced by Pfizer or Moderna. If other vaccines are released which do have recourse to material of illicit origin, Catholic moral teaching would direct Catholics to utilize the option that is least morally problematic (i.e., the vaccines that were *not* created via such immoral means). Providentially, these two listed vaccines satisfy that criteria.

With the end of the Liturgical Year coming with the Feast of Christ the King on November 22nd, the Church proposes us reflection on the Last Things - that is the end of life

and the end of times issues. The Church reminds us to be vigilant and prepared for our own death, and for the Second Coming of Christ. The crystallization of the faith in regard to last things is revealed to us through the Old and New Testament. Jesus proclaims this teaching by words, deeds and by His own life, death and resurrection. The last things are: death, judgment, heaven and hell.

Death is the separation of man's mortal body and immortal soul. It comes to all men as a result of original sin. It is a temporary state, for at the end of the world, all men shall rise again to be judged by Christ. Thus the whole man, body and soul, will be rewarded for the good or evil that he/she has done, body and soul, in this life.

At the moment of death, each of us is judged by God based on his/her conduct in this life, and goes immediately to his/her reward or punishment. Moreover, at the end of the world, Jesus Christ will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead. At that time, God's whole plan for the world shall be revealed, and His mercy and justice demonstrated.

Heaven is the eternal state of perfect happiness resulting from the face to face vision of God, which is the reward of those who have served Him in this life.

Hell is the eternal state of torment and despair which awaits those who, in this life, have freely rejected God and the happiness which He offers.

Before the end of the world, there will be an intermediate state called purgatory. There, those who are bound for heaven, but whose love for God is still marred by some imperfection, undergo a temporary period of purifying suffering. When this purification is complete, they are fit to enter God's presence and are admitted to the joys of heaven.

Then there will be the resurrection of the body; it is meant that at the end of the world the bodies of all men will rise from the earth and be united again to their souls, nevermore to be separated. No man knows when the world will end. The signs preceding the destruction of the world, as given in Scripture, are: wars, famine, pestilence, the coming of Antichrist, the darkening of the sun and moon, and the appearance of the cross in heaven.

Considering this teaching, we realize that Jesus gave His life for it without hesitation. He surrendered His life for our sake and salvation, to give us His example of how much He wants us to be with Him in heaven. But we can see how difficult it was to teach and transmit that faith, to the point, that Jesus and many believers who followed Him did offer their lives for it. Any martyr, starting with Jesus gave their life for the truth of the Gospel, that is for the truth of God's love and mercy and the truth of eternal

life. In heaven we will be consumed or absorbed by our personal relationship with God, being able to see God's glory in everything.

This is why especially in November the Church invites everyone to pray for all of our faithful departed, if necessary helping them to arrive in heaven. The best we can do for our departed, is to offer a Mass for them, let the sacrifice of Jesus speed their purgatory if they were in need of God's mercy at the time of their death. The gift of flowers for the dead lasts for few days, the gift of Mass is eternal. Then all other prayers and sacrifices are of real help in getting the Souls from purgatory to the joy of heaven. May the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God Rest In Peace!!! Amen!!!



While I thoroughly dislike the idea of needing to reserve a seat at most weekend Masses, I'm elated that we have the problem of having too many people at Mass! I've spoken with several priest friends who've lamented their extremely low attendance at weekend Mass; that we need to be cautious about having too many people at Mass is a testimony to your depth of faith and your burning desire to praise God!

Out of fairness to all, reserving a seat at Mass will be a weekly routine; there are no perpetual reservations. The option to reserve a seat at Mass for the upcoming weekend will "go live" around 1PM every Sunday afternoon.

Thank you for your understanding and your willingness to make sure that the only thing we take with us as we depart weekend Mass is the

nourishment we've received from God's Word and the Eucharist.

Those with cable TV need only to check their local cable system listings to determine where WUAB is located on their local channel line-up.

The televised Mass has been a staple of religious programming on Northeast Ohio airwaves for decades, cultivating a dedicated and faithful following. It is hoped that viewers will continue to tune in on this new station at this new, more convenient time.

Happy New Year! As A note we enter into Advent, we also embark upon a new liturgical year. Last year (referred to as Cycle A) had us reading from the

Gospel of Matthew; this year (Cycle B) we'll be primarily reading from the Gospel of Mark.

As we're a bit less than a month away from Christmas, and because family plans often center around participating at Mass on Christmas, I thought it would be helpful to publish the Christmas Mass schedule—as well as a list of FAQs about Christmas in the midst of a pandemic.

Due to COVID-19, admission to Masses on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day will be BY RESERVATION ONLY - and MASKS ARE REOUIRED. As reserved-seating at Christmas Masses will be on a "first-come, first-reserved" basis please be understanding if the Mass time or seat location you desire has already been reserved by someone else.

WHY must we have reserved seating for Masses on Christmas?

While the standing-room-only crowds of prior years has powerfully demonstrated the centrality and the importance of the Incarnation in our lives it is neither safe, prudent, or legal to gather in that manner in the midst of this pandemic.

What is the Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Mass Schedule?

The initial Christmas schedule (more Masses will be added if these four fill up) is:

- Christmas Eve 4PM at St. Patrick
- Christmas Eve 4PM at Sacred
- Christmas Eve 9PM at St. Patrick
- Christmas Morning 9AM at Sacred Heart

When can I sign up for a seat at Christmas Eve/ Day Mass?

The option to reserve seating for Christmas Masses will go live in early-to-mid-December 2020 ... so please check back at a later date to secure your reservation. When reservations go "live," there will be:

- 1. announcements made at Mass;
- 2. info in my weekly email (join the mailing list at http://lists.shoj.cc);
- 3. details in the weekly bulletin, and;
- 4. a clickable link on the home page of our website.

When is the "children's" Mass?

All Masses on Christmas (both Eve or Day) will be parish Masses intended for the entire family. Especially in the midst of a boomingpandemic, it would be inappropriate and irresponsible to suggest or encourage those with children to flock to a particular Mass because it had a unique focus. All Christmas Masses will focus on the Incarnation → Christ being born into our world - our families, and - our lives.

What happens if ALL the Christmas Masses FILL -UP?

If the available spots at all the initially scheduled Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Masses fill up, Fr. Trask will add an additional Mass (or, perhaps two, if the first added Mass also fills up). There are contingency plans for up to six (6) Masses, should the need present itself.

Do I have to attend Mass on Christmas?

Because of the pandemic and the ease with which the coronavirus can be transmitted, the Bishops of Ohio have continued to dispense Catholics from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days. That said, those choosing not to attend Mass should still keep the Lord's Day holy by prayerfully participating at a streamed Mass (whether on TV or over the internet).

What are my options if I wish to participate in a live-streamed Mass on Christmas?

The Diocese of Cleveland will live-stream the 4pm Christmas Eve Mass on the diocesan website https://www.dioceseofcleveland.org/offices/ communications/mass. You are welcome to gather your family around a computer, tablet, or screen and pray along with the live-streamed Christmas Eve Mass.



Even if you don't itemize your taxes, because of the new stimulus package passed by Congress, qualified charitable donations up to \$300 for individuals may be deductible. The CARES Act legislation also temporarily suspended the limitation on qualified charitable contributions of cash, allowing for a current year deduction (for those who itemize) up to 100% of AGI. This provision is in effect only for the 2020 tax year. And, if you are 70 ½ or older, you may be able to make a gift of a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA that will help us in our ministry and reduce your taxable income. to your advisors and IRA Talk administrator for more information and to be sure that your IRA Qualified Charitable Distribution gift is made directly from an IRA to a qualified charity such as our parish. When we can once-again gather in the Ed Building, you may notice a difference in the quality of lighting throughout the building. Through a grant from Efficiency Smart, we are in the process of retrofitting all our fluorescent light fixtures with energy-efficient LED tubes at negligible cost to the parish; for the classrooms, kitchen, and restrooms, the cost of the 4' LED bulbs is 100% covered by The savings we realize from the efficiency of these new bulbs should more than offset our costs in purchasing the U-shaped bulbs used in the hallway fixtures. (The cost of these tubes is higher than the maximum \$7 rebate/bulb.)

This past Tuesday (12/8) A note we celebrated the Blessed Virgin Mary's being conceived without the stain of Original Sin.

From our Pastor On August 15th we remembered that fact she was bodily assumed into Heaven

without undergoing the physical corruption of death. When we pray the Hail Mary we venerate her as the, "Mother of God."

Because of Mary's miraculous conception and death and her unique role in Salvation history I think we tend to think of her life on earth as being easier than it really was. We may assume that she sailed through life in the comfort of knowing God's plan in its entirety.

This was not the case, however. We have to remember that Gospels were not written as the events happened but afterwards. They were written after the Resurrection, after Jesus eternal triumph over Death and Sin.

Unlike us, Mary did not have the advantage of reading the Gospels during her time on earth. She did not have the New Testament or 2,000 years of Church tradition and teaching to buttress her faith. Yet her faith was so complete, so strong that she never once in her life sinned.

She maintained this faith in the face of incredible challenges and adversity. Mary was living quietly and devoutly in Nazareth when the Angel of the Lord announced to her that she was to "conceive and bear a son and give him the name Jesus." (Luke 1:31)

Mary was betrothed to Joseph. Under Jewish law Joseph would have been within his rights to renounce the child and expose Mary to the punishment for adultery, death by stoning. Faced with all of this Mary's response speaks for itself," I am the servant of the Lord. Let it be done to me as you say."

Mary was forced to give birth in a stable lacking even the most rudimentary comforts to ease the pain of labor and delivery, but she did not complain. When Jesus was brought to the Temple to be presented to the Lord, Simeon told Mary, "This child is destined to be the downfall and the rise of many in Israel, a sign the will be opposed - and you yourself shall be pierced with a sword - so that the thoughts of many hearts may be laid bare." (Luke 2:32-33)

Simeon's words were indeed prophetic. It is impossible for us who view Jesus life through two thousand years of Christian Scripture and teaching to fully understand how radical Jesus appeared to most in the Jewish community.

Jesus performed cures on the Sabbath. Instead of marveling at the miracles, the pillars of Jewish society, the scribes and Pharisees condemned Him. Jesus associated with taxpayers and others who were literally considered the scum of the earth by "proper" Jewish society. He even cured the daughter of a Roman soldier, in effect giving comfort to the enemy who oppressed the Jews.

In short Jesus led, what was considered by most of His contemporaries, a scandalous life. Yet, Mary's faith did not waver.

Finally, Jesus was condemned to death by crucifixion. Unlike our society, capital punishment in Jesus time was commonplace. Crucifixion was reserved, however, for the most hated criminals. It was the most, brutal, painful death, the Romans could conceive of, and they were masters of delivering death.

So, Mary saw her Son who had cured countless others, who had even raised the dead, accept this excruciatingly painful, this unbelievably humiliating death, without even lifting a finger to save Himself. God who had sent angels to announce Jesus conception and birth sent no one to save her Son from this terrible ordeal.

We know that Jesus would rise from the dead on the following Sunday. As Mary watched her Son die a slow agonizing death on the Cross, she did not have any Easter accounts to comfort her. Yet, her faith did not waver.

By the way she lived her life Mary has given us a model of Faith to help light the way as we strive to stay on the path that will lead to eternal Life.



SACRED HEART OF JESUS CATHOLIC CHURCH



It was the Christmas Europe 1914. was in the throes The war. German soldiers on one side and French. the British, Belgian

on the other were in their trenches ready to unleash their destructive powers. Pope Benedict XV, who had taken over in September called for a Christmas truce. The idea seemed preposterous and the call was officially rejected.

And then, a miracle happened. It was the night of Christmas. As Pvt. Albert Moren recalls, it was "a beautiful moonlit night, frost on the ground, white almost everywhere." Graham Williams of the Fifth London Rifle Brigade later wrote in his diary: "First the Germans would sing one of their carols and then we would sing one of ours, until when we started up '0 Come, All Ye Faithful' the Germans immediately joined in singing the same hymn to the Latin words Adeste Fideles. And I thought, well, this is really a most extraordinary thing -- two nations both singing the same carol in the middle of a war."

The Christmas spirit spread. Next morning, soldiers from both sides emerged from their trenches calling out "Merry Christmas" in each other's languages. Soldiers displayed "You no shoot, we no shoot" signs to each other. They exchanged gifts of cigarettes, food, buttons and hats. They also buried their dead comrades whose bodies lay where no one could access them.

The truce was short lived. Hostilities returned, and some 15 million people were killed in the most gruesome war the world had even seen until then. Nevertheless, on that day, there was a Christmas miracle.

We live in a time of great divisiveness. Never has our nation been so polarized. Some wear a mask to help protect others from the coronavirus, while others see masks as an infringement upon personal freedom. Some focus on particular lives that matter; others view all human life from the perspective of Christ, and; the actions of still others seem to indicate they place no value on any human life. In the midst of all the politics and divisiveness of the last many months, tonight/ today a little child is calling out to us. Could we recreate the Christmas miracle?

The little child, we call the Christmas miracle, later grew up and lit up the world with love. Even though He Himself became a victim of hatred and violence, He showed us the way to peace and harmony, love and forgiveness, compassion and generosity. This Christmas, let us not merely seek a truce. Rather, let us join the angels at Christ's birth who announced. "Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to people of goodwill" (Lk 2:14). Let us be people of "goodwill." Let us make the Christmas miracle last the year-round.

May you have a blessed Christmas and peacefilled New Year!







Let us rejoice in His life and believe in His love and celebrate His promise this Christmas. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!


