

Epiphany is a Greek A note word that means manifestation or revelation. Today we celebrate the manifestation of the divinity of baby Jesus to the nations

(as opposed to just the Jews). Until the 19th Century this feast day was as significant to Christians as Christmas; in many countries around the world it still is.

"Epiphany originally celebrated four different events, in the following order of importance: the Baptism of the Lord; Christ's first miracle, the changing of water into wine at the wedding in Cana; the Nativity of Christ, and; the visitation of the Wise Men or Magi. Each of these is a revelation of God to man:

- At Christ's Baptism, the Holy Spirit descended and the voice of God the Father is heard, declaring that Jesus is His Son.
- At the wedding in Cana, the miracle reveals Christ's divinity.
- At the Nativity, the angels bore witness to Christ, and the shepherds, representing the people of Israel, bowed down before Him.
- At the visitation of the Magi, Christ's divinity was revealed to the Gentiles – "the other nations of the earth".

The key difference between these four different manifestations of Christ is that the visitation of the Magi is the only one that happens for non-Jews, i.e. Gentiles. Thus all four of these manifestation feasts could be called Epiphanies, and in many nations to separate it from the others, it is called "Theophany", "Three King's Day", or "The Visitation of the Magi".

Dennis Bratcher, in his book The Season of Epiphany, wrote: "As with most aspects of the Christian liturgical calendar, Epiphany has theological significance as a teaching tool in the church. The Wise Men, or Magi, who brought gifts to the child Jesus were the first Gentiles to acknowledge Jesus as King, and so were the first to show or reveal Jesus to a wider world as the incarnate Christ. This act of worship by the Magi, which corresponded to Simeon's blessing that this child Jesus would be 'a light for revelation to the Gentiles' (Luke 2:32), was one of the first indications that Jesus came for all people, of all

nations, of all races, and that the work of God in the world would not be limited to only a few."

Historically, Epiphany has been celebrated on January 6th. In recent times in the USA, it has been moved to the Sunday between January 2 - 8. For many nations, it remains the day in the Christmas season in which gifts are exchanged; instead of Santa Claus bringing gifts on Christmas, it's the Three Kings bringing gifts on Epiphany. This tradition puts the focus of Christmas on the birth of Jesus, and away from secular Santa Claus; the Three Kings (Wise Men or Magi) are real, whereas Santa Claus, well . . .

Finally: Wise men still seek Him. Instead of always expecting Jesus (God) to seek and serve us, let us imitate the Magi and seek after Jesus. Let us make 2022 a year in which we make a special effort to follow the star of the Church to Jesus.



Today the Church the the from our Pastor Baptism of Our Lord. This brings

to an end the season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the Jordan. Jesus descended into the River to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes.

In the Eastern Church this feast is called Theophany because at the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan God appeared in three persons. The baptism of John was sort of sacramental preparatory for the Baptism of Christ. It moved men to sentiments of repentance and induced them to confess their sins. Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like ourselves", He was absolutely sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world".

Many of the incidents which accompanied Christ's baptism symbolical of what happened at our Baptism. At Christ's baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our Baptism the Trinity took its abode in our soul. At His baptism Christ was proclaimed the "Beloved Son" of the Father; at our Baptism we become the adopted sons of God. At Christ's baptism the heavens were opened; at our Baptism heaven was opened to us. At His baptism Jesus prayed; after our Baptism we must pray to avoid actual sin.

Items collected for composting include (but are not limited to): baked goods, bones, bread, butter, cardboard, cheese, coffee grounds & paper coffee filters, dairy, eggs & paper egg cartons, fish/seafood, flowers, fruits & veggies, grains & pasta, meat/ poultry, paper cartons, paper towels & napkins, pizza boxes, tea & paper packaging, wax paper, wood, and much more.

Participation in this FWCP is open to residents of the City of Oberlin, as well as anyone who receives their power through the OMLPS (Oberlin Municipal Light and Power System).

The Sacred Heart Peace & Justice Committee is working to make enrollment in the Oberlin FWCP easy for parishioners who meet eligibility requirements! Simply complete the form below and bring it with you to Mass next weekend (January 22/23). After Mass, simply hand in the enrollment form as you leave and obtain your 2.5 gallon countertop recycling container at the same time! Should you forget your form next weekend, extras will be available – but it will need to be completed prior to receiving your recycling container).



On Tuesday, Jan 25th, we celebrate the Conversion of St. Paul, the Apostle to the gentiles.

St. Paul the Apostle was the greatest of the early Christian missionaries. He first appears in the Acts of the Apostles under the name of Saul. Saul was raised in the Jewish faith as a Pharisee trained in the strict observance of God's Law. He believed the Law should be obeyed by himself and all Jews. Saul was upset by the early Christian Church, believing that the early Christians had broken away from their Jewish traditions. He actively persecuted the Church in Jerusalem. As the first Christian martyr Stephen was being stoned to death, Saul watched the cloaks of the persecutors (Acts 7:58).

Paul then traveled to Damascus to further persecute early Christians. On the road to Damascus Saul had an encounter with the Risen Jesus Christ (Acts of the Apostles 9:1–19, Galatians 1: 13-14). Jesus asked, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" Paul replied, "Who are you, sir?" Jesus responded, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9: 4-5). Jesus then sent Saul into Damascus to wait for further instructions. Saul was shaken and blinded by the experience. When a Christian named Ananias came and baptized Saul, his blindness went away. As a result of this encounter Saul became a follower of Christ. He was now convinced that fellowship with the risen Jesus Christ, not the observance of the Law, was all that was needed to receive God's promise of salvation. (Galatians 1:11–12; 3:1–5)


Saul, whose name now became Paul, went to Jerusalem to consult with Peter (Galatians 1: 18). After his first missionary journeys, Paul was called by Jesus to proclaim the Gospel to the Gentiles. He spent the rest of his life journeying on his missions, establishing local churches, and writing to them when he heard of their accomplishments and failures. Paul's letters are the earliest records of the life and history of the early Church. As inspired by the Holy Spirit Paul's letters are part of the Canon of the New Testament. As a record of the happenings in the early Church they are in invaluable record of the expansion of the Christianity.

All together, there are 13 epistles that bear Paul's name as the author. However, scholars do


not believe that he wrote them all. Paul himself was the author of first and second Thessalonians, Galatians,

Philippians, first and second Corinthians, Romans, and Philemon. The epistles to the Ephesians,

Colossians, Titus, and first and second Timothy bear Paul's



name, but it is believed that they were written after his death. The writers of these letters were disciples of Paul who wanted to continue his teaching. Whoever the authors of these epistles were, these writings have been accepted into the New Testament as inspired by the Holy Spirit.

This Wednesday is the celebration of The A note Presentation of the From our Pastor Lord in the temple (Lk 2:22-40). With Christmas decorations

having been down for several weeks and three Sundays of Ordinary Time have passed during which the adult Jesus has been baptized, begun His public ministry, and called His first disciples, this Wednesday's celebration may seem a bit out-of-place. But the Law of Moses called for a 40-day period of purification after the birth of a male child - and this Wednesday marks 40 days, inclusive, after Christmas.

The rite of purification that took place on this holy day in ancient times included a burnt offering to the Lord – for the wealthy parents this offering was a one-year-old lamb or goat; or for the poor, two turtle doves or young pigeons. As a firstborn son, Jesus is consecrated to the Lord, and while this does not have to take place in the Temple, Mary and Joseph took Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem for this purpose. This child (Jesus) who is offered to God in the Temple of Jerusalem, will one day die on a cross outside the walls of this same city, offering himself for the forgiveness of sins and the salvation of all.

Simeon and Anna, just and pious people, were also present in the Temple. Their hearts were full of expectant hope in the fulfillment of the promises God had made to Israel about her redemption. Together, Simeon and Anna represent everyone who ever longed for the coming of the Messiah and for the redemption of humanity. As Simeon says, this child is the revelation of God's glory. Jesus fulfills the title given to Him in an earlier part of Luke's Gospel, where He is described as "Son of the Most High and the Lord God will give him the throne of David

his father" (Luke 1:32).

Jesus is the very gift of God to us, promised long through the words of Malachi (3:1-4); the One who will Temple the with the very presence of God.



But this is not just any divine revelation, for Jesus shares with us our human condition, with all its trials and temptations, making Him a true light and hope for all of humanity. While Christians are no longer dedicated according to the Law of Moses, we are presented at Baptism by name, and, through the grace of that Sacrament, conformed to the very identity and sacrifice of Christ. The life we have been given by God, is therefore best lived by our own loving, thankful, and obedient service to Him. With God's help, may we always do so.





If you called the parish over the last week, you've likely noticed that things sound a bit different—and they do so for a reason: we've transitioned to a fully cloud-based phone system (rather than the hybrid [landline & VOIP] system we've been using). Hopefully you will find this system friendly and a bit more personable. A few features of the system are:

- Your chances of speaking to a real person are highly increased!
- You're able to contact me through the parish phone tree rather than only via my cell phone.
- Calls to the custodian, music director, or PSR director will be automatically forwarded to the cell phones via the phone system.

One feature I appreciate in the new system is its ability to get the caller to a real person. From 8am to 8pm calls to the parish office will:

- first ring through to the Sacred Heart parish secretary;
- if there's no answer after 18 seconds of ringing, my office phone and the phone at the desk of the St. Patrick parish secretary will begin ringing.
- Only after exhausting all possibilities of speaking to a "real live person" will your call be forwarded to Sacred Heart voicemail.
- Similarly, anyone calling St. Patrick will first be directed there—with unanswered calls forwarded to the secretary's and my phones at Sacred Heart—followed by the St. Patrick voicemail box.

Throughout the evening hours, all non-emergency calls will be directed to voicemail. That said, I may still be contacted 24/7 through the parish phone system in cases of life-and-death emergencies—with the option to simply leave me a voicemail for non-emergency calls.

Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins this Wednesday (3/2) and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of

preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ.

Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: "Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2446).

Fr. Daniel Merz offers the following reflection on Lenten fasting (found on the usccb.org website):

In the early Church and, to a lesser extent still today, there were two fasts. There was the "total fast" that preceded all major feasts or sacramental events. The ancient name for this fast was "statio" from the verb "sto, stare" to stand watch, on guard or in vigil. The second fast was a fast of abstinence from certain foods. e.g., meats or fats. This was more an act of selfdiscipline and self-control. The statio fast was total and a means of watching and waiting...i.e. something. The fast of abstinence was more general and personal, to help oneself be more disciplined or self -controlled. The total fast is still kept today prior to reception of Holy Communion. Following Holy Communion, the total fast ceases because Jesus had explicitly stated that we don't fast when the bridegroom is here, in other words, what we're keeping vigil for has arrived, the wait is over. On the other hand, the fast of abstinence was allowed on Sundays because the continuity of abstinence can be important for it to be effective.

These initial observations, then, teach us that the Eucharist is always the end of a preparation. It is always the fulfillment of an expectation. In the Orthodox Church during Lent, they have Eucharist only on Saturday and Sunday. But because Wednesdays and Fridays are total fast days, those two days are also days for the Communion service (Liturgy of the

PreSanctified) which are held in the evening, i.e., after the day of preparation. Fasting is always preparatory.

But how did fasting become such an important means of preparing for the Eucharist and of learning virtue through self-discipline? Christian fasting is revealed in an interdependence between two events in the Bible: the "breaking of the fast" by Adam and Eve; and the "keeping of the fast" by Christ at the beginning of his ministry.

Humanity's "Fall" away from God and into sin began with eating. God had proclaimed a fast from the fruit of only one tree, the tree of knowledge of good and evil (Gen. 2:17), and Adam and Eve broke it. Fasting is here connected with the very mystery of life and death, of salvation and damnation. Food perpetuates life in this physical world, which is subject to decay and death. But God "created no death." (Wis. 1:13) Humanity, in Adam and Eve, rejected a life dependent on God alone for one that was dependent rather on "bread alone." (Dt. 8:3; Mt. 4:4; Lk. 4:4) The whole world was given to man as a kind of food, as a means to life, but "life" is meant as communion with God, not as food. ("Their god is their belly." Phil. 3:19) The tragedy is not so much that Adam ate food, but that he ate the food for its own sake, "apart" from God and to be independent of Him. Believing that food had life in itself and thus he And he put his faith in could be "like God." food. This kind of existence seems to be built on the principle that man does indeed live "by bread alone."

Christ, however, is the new Adam. At the beginning of his ministry in the Gospel of Matthew, we read, "When He had fasted 40 days and 40 nights, He became hungry." Hunger is that state in which we realize our dependence on something else—when we face the ultimate question: "on what does my life depend?" Satan tempted both Adam and Christ, saying: Eat, for your hunger is proof that you depend entirely on food, that your life is in food. believed and ate. Christ said, "Man does NOT live by bread alone." (Mt. 4:4; Lk. 4:4) This liberates us from total dependence on food, on matter, on the Thus, for the Christian, fasting is the only means by which man recovers his true spiritual nature. In order for fasting to be effective, then, the spirit must be a part of it. Christian fasting is not concerned with losing weight. It is a matter of prayer and the spirit. And because of that, because it is truly a place of the spirit, true fasting may well lead to temptation, and weakness and doubt and irritation. In other words, it will be a real fight between good and evil, and very likely we shall fail many times in these battles. But the very discovery of the Christian life as "fight" and "effort" is an essential aspect of fasting.

As an advance opportunity to prepare for the *EOC*, the following partial *Examination of Conscience* help you in preparing to receive Christ's merciful forgiveness:

- ◆Do I love God above everything else? Do I live as a child of God, confident in the Father's mercy? Am I humble? Do I depend on God as I should?
- ◆Am I prideful? Do I try to make the world revolve around me? Do I live out a sense of self -sufficiency, imposing my will on others, acting as if I were the cause of good in my life? Am I presumptuous? Do I think I can do whatever I want and that it will not matter to God?
- ◆Do I yearn to know God's will and do I abandon myself to divine Providence day by day and moment by moment? Do I pray every day? Do I go to Mass every Sunday and Holy Day? Do I devote myself to growing in faith?
- ♦ Am I thankful? Do I express my gratitude sincerely and outwardly, especially in works of mercy? Do I make excuses for my faults, blame others, or rationalize my actions? Am I self-righteous?
- ◆Am I forgiving? Do I harbor grudges, resentments do I take delight in the misfortunes of others? Do I judge others, label others, exclude others, and condemn others? Is my life ruled by anger, jealousy, envy, or impatience?

SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT



For many years now, our diocese has hosted an *Evening of Confession* (*EOC*) two weeks after Ash Wednesday from 5-8pm; this year, the *EOC* will be

Weds, Mar 16→AT ST PATRICK in Wellington.

As an advance opportunity to prepare for the EOC, the following Examination of Conscience is a conclusion of the reflection offered in last week's bulletin.

- ◆Do I make gods of money, power, prestige, accomplishment, materialism, sensuality, vanity, pleasure, comfort, leisure, complacency, apathy, or anything else? Do I put myself first through self-centeredness, or egoism?
- ◆ Do I dedicate myself to knowing, loving, and living the Truth as it is taught by the Catholic Church? Do I live in the Truth and do I tell the truth, always and without compromise? Do I misuse speech through cheating, gossiping, backbiting, profanity, blasphemy, complaining, being silent when I should speak, etc.? Am I true to my vows, my commitments, my contracts, and my word?
- ♦ Is my mind filled with thoughts that are lustful, viscous, carnal, mean-spirited, prejudicial, venal, and worldly?
- ♦ Do I waste time? Am I generous with my time? Am I lazy? Do the priorities in my life reflect and serve the precious gift of faith God has given me? Do I love more for myself than for God and others?
- ◆ Do I live by faith or by current fads, by popular ideologies, by the pressures and deceptions of media and culture? Do I recognize how God is present and active in every moment of my life?

In the past I've spoken with people who fear confession because they've forgotten the Act of Contrition; others are fearful about not knowing what to say. The most important step to making a good confession is to walk into the confessional; from there, any priest will gladly guide you through the Sacrament of Confession.

For anyone who might be fearful of having forgotten the words, I always have printed copies of the Act of Contrition in the confessional. If you'd like to refresh your memory, or learn a new Act of Contrition, here are two different ones:

- ♦ Lord, be merciful to me, a sinner.
- ♦ My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin.

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

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT



All of a sudden, we find ourselves more than halfway through Lent. How did that happen? Of course we have seen other examples of

how time keeps moving right along whether we want it to or not, but somehow we convince ourselves that we will always have more time. Do you suppose there's a lesson to be learned here? Lent is a good time to think about these things and, as is always hoped, to learn something.

So how's your Lent going? If we just take a few steps ahead, then we're making good use of this Lenten time. We may never accomplish perfection, but perfection is not what we're about. It is perseverance that is all important and is really the proof of what a truly Christian person is all about.

If, by change, you haven't been able to do much about Lent so far, don't be discouraged; remember that discouragement is the devil's most powerful weapon! It is better to make a late start rather than to make no start at all, so make better use of the time that is left to us and enjoy the gift of Lent—a season when we tend to our spiritual lives, which can always use a bit of tending-to!

I realize this is a "week early" — as we don't celebrate Palm Sunday until next weekend, but I felt it apropos to allow

this as an opportunity to enlighten before we celebrate. Besides, next week I'll be talking about the Triduum celebrations.

There is both great joy and terrible sorrow associated with this Palm (or Passion) Sunday. The very people who applaud Jesus' entry into Jerusalem that morning, shouting out "Hosanna" and words of adoration will, within a week, be crying, "Crucify Him"; they will first praise, and then mock Him. Even friends entering Jerusalem at His side will desert Jesus.

As we read in the Gospels, Jesus went to Jerusalem to join with many other Jews to celebrate the Passover feast. As was the custom, pilgrims that had already arrived in the city went out to greet newly arriving pilgrims; some had never seen Jesus but had heard about the miracles attributed to Him and were caught up in the excitement. "When the great crowd ... heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, they took palm branches and went out to meet Him, and cried out: 'Hosanna! / Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, [even] the King of Israel" (12:12-13).

On prior situations, Jesus deliberately avoided popular acclaim; but not today. Yet His actions are different than the people expected. He didn't present Himself as a rival to Caesar; He

is not the political messiah or the warrior king the crowds desired. Instead of entering Jerusalem on a war horse or chariot, He entered on a donkey, a sign of peace.

St. Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153) offered a homily about Christ's entry into Jerusalem: "How different the cries, 'Away with Him, away with Him, crucify Him,' and then, 'Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord, hosanna, in the highest!' How different the cries are that now are calling Him 'King

of Israel' and then in a few days' time will be saying, 'We have no king but Caesar!' What a contrast between the green branches and the cross, between the flowers and the thorns! Before they were offering their own clothes for Him to walk upon, and so soon afterwards they are stripping Him of His, and casting lots upon them."

SACRED HEART OF JESUS CATHOLIC CHURCH PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD APRIL 10, 2022





Bp Donald J. Hying, Bishop of the Diocese of Madison, Wisconsin, is masterful in his ability to summarize Holy week. In a reflection of his on

simplycatholic.com he shares:

During the Sacred Triduum — the days of Holy Thursday through Easter Sunday — the strangest thing will occur. Millions of Christians throughout the world will gather to honor the humiliation, torture and crucifixion of Jesus Christ. In a global culture that usually celebrates power, strength and beauty, this public veneration of something so horrible is always a little shocking. Could it be that what people find so absolutely compelling about the Passion narrative is the vulnerability of God?

In the Christ event, God leaves the safety and glory of heaven, in a certain sense, and embraces the limitations of our human condition, coming to know in the flesh both the glory and tragedy of our nature without ever having sinned. In the last week of His life, Jesus completely hands Himself over to us. In the foot washing and the Eucharist, in the scourging and the crucifixion, the Son of God loves us completely without restrictions, conditions or limits. Whether we accept, reject or ignore this Divine Love, Jesus never changes His fundamental stance toward us.

In Roman and Greek mythology, the gods are always conspiring to manipulate humanity to serve their oftenselfish ends and egotistical schemes. In Christ, we encounter the surprising subversion of this oppressive game. God serves us! In absolute humility, availability, vulnerability and mercy, God has come to love, pardon and save us.

If God could become that poor, humble and vulnerable to love me, how can I ever stand on my own self-importance? This week, we celebrate the strangest

things: weakness becomes strength, love conquers fear, miserable despair transforms into resurrected hope and perpetual death gives way to eternal life, and it's all because a naked criminal was thrown down on a cross 2,000 years ago, and He embraced it as if it were His marriage bed.

We should let the Lord love us during Holy Week.

- The Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening is an opportunity to taste the surprising grace of the Eucharist and surrender to the consolation of the foot washing.
- Listening to the Passion and venerating the cross on Good Friday gives us the opportunity to embrace the cross in our own lives, no matter what form it may take. Know that the mystery of suffering in our lives is the sacred ladder by which we will ascend to the beauty of the Kingdom of heaven.
- Gathering around the Easter fire at the Vigil, we call to mind how we began the Lenten journey marked with the ashes of sin, failure and defeat, but now you have become filled with fire the mighty force of the risen Christ and the courageous strength of the Holy Spirit. As we proclaim the resurrection of Christ as the beautiful truth and transformative meaning of human history, know that the Lord walks with you, loves you and is leading you to the fullness of joy and peace.

The shocking, strange and powerful events of Holy Week should lead us to tears and laughter, gratitude and praise, humble awareness of our weakness and joyful acclamation of God's victory. The Triduum is a time for God to break open our hearts, so that the gracious torrent of Divine Mercy that flows from the side of the crucified Christ will wash us clean, forgive our sins and fashion us ever more deeply in the new creation of the Lord's saving death and resurrection.

In one family, it is A note a Good Friday. A job has been lost. from our Pastor career derailed. A serious illness has

been diagnosed. A once-loving relationship has unraveled. But the other members of the family put aside their own lives and come together at the foot of their loved one's cross; their love moves mountains and changes the course of whatever river is in their way. Together, mom and dad, sister and brother bear one another's crosses to bring hope, healing, forgiveness - and resurrection - to every aspect of their life together as a family. The love of our families transforms every tragic and desperate Good Friday into Easter hope.

At corporate, it is a Good Friday. A single mother has lost all accrued vacation and leave time to care for her seriously ill child. She is about to lose her job - and the important medical benefits critical to her family's survival. Her coworkers devise a plan to pool some of their vacation time and cover responsibilities so that she can keep her job and benefits while caring for her son. A Good Friday of desperation is transformed into an Easter of possibility.

We sometimes find ourselves stuck in a Good Friday world - our problems batter us, overwhelm us, strain our ability to cope and make it all work. Our Alleluias are tempered by reality; we approach this Easter Day with "Christ is risen, BUT..." But in raising Jesus from the dead, God vindicates the Gospel of Christ: that good conquers evil, that love transforms hatred, that light shatters the darkness.

The story of Jesus does not end in the cold hopelessness of the cross ... but reaches ultimate fulfillment in the Resurrection. Easter calls us to embrace the Risen Jesus' compassion and openness of heart and spirit,

enabling us to transform the Good Fridays of our lives into Easter mornings.

May the light of Christ be with you this day and throughout the fifty-days of this Easter Season. Please be assured of my prayers for you and your families and please keep me in your prayers.

A note of the Second Sunday of Easter Detay to a close—and we now continue

our journey through the Easter season.

The term octave derives from the Latin word for "eighth" (in music, the eighth note). Octave has two meanings in Catholic liturgy: the eighth day after a feast, reckoning inclusively, or the whole period of these eight days. Today's Easter Octave is thus the eight days that begin with Easter and continue through the following Sunday.

Initially, the octava dies was associated with the weekly celebration of Christ's resurrection every "eighth day," that is, Sunday. The practice of other liturgical octaves was first introduced in the fourth century under the Roman Emperor Constantine for the dedication festivals of two new Christian basilicas. These were one-time events, but eventually certain annual liturgical feasts came to be dignified with an octave. The first such octaves, established in the fourth century, were Easter, Pentecost, and, in the East, Epiphany.

In the following centuries, octaves were multiplied; Christmas, the dedication of churches, and many saints feasts all developed octaves. In more recent times, Church calendar reforms have removed all octaves except Christmas and Easter. The eight days of the Easter Octave are celebrated as solemnities of the Lord, with special readings and prayers for each day. In the Eastern rites, an octave is called an *Afterfeast*.

THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER



We are slowly navigating back to a prepandemic normalcy — with an emphasis on slowly. At this point in time, we're looking to rejuvenate and restore

our funeral ministries, specifically: servers, lectors, luncheons, and bakers.

The ministry of lectors is regularly requested at funerals. When a family is going through the death of a loved one, especially when that death is unexpected, emotions run high. To have the expectation that a grieving family member might be sufficiently composed to proclaim the Scriptures well is not always realistic; often times, the comment will be made that: "We wish we could read, but no one feels up to it; could you have someone read?" At present, we have several parishioners who've indicated that they're available to proclaim the Scriptures at funerals, but a larger pool of volunteers who are willing to minister to grieving families would be immensely helpful.

Similarly, we have only two individuals who are willing to serve at funerals – and there may come a time when neither has been available and we'll have to do without servers. However, "making do without servers" isn't an ideal option, and has the potential to be negatively interpreted by those who are grieving. Long story short, always having at least one server for a Mass of Christian Burial is always preferred.

Offering hospitality, and helping to serve food, at a funeral luncheon that might be held in our Church Hall is an important ministry to a grieving family. Families wishing to gather in Church Hall following a funeral are welcome to order party trays or other foods for a luncheon; having someone to be available to receive any deliveries and/or to serve the meal is an expression of the parish coming together to assist those going through a difficult loss.

In addition to the ministry of hospitality, a cadre of bakers who are willing to provide desserts (cookies, brownies, cakes, etc.) help to round out the funeral ministry. Your willingness to occasionally provide baked goods for a funeral luncheon is yet another expression of how family-helps-family through difficult times.

If you would like more information on any of these funeral ministries (server, lector, hospitality, or baker), please contact the parish office at 440.707.6707, ext. 3.

Christine Toth, who has heretofore been our Monday & Tuesday secretary, will now be working two days a week at St. Patrick Parish, as well. To accommodate the




needs of both parishes, Christine will henceforth be at Sacred Heart on Mondays and Thursdays. This shift in days necessitates a slight shift in office hours.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER



Being that this is Mother's Day, I wanted to share some reflections from Pope Francis – who shared the crux of the following back in

2016. He reminisced that: The Church is mother; Our Holy Mother Church.

The Church's liturgy sets before our eyes the icon of the Virgin Mary, Mother of God. The Evangelist Matthew, on the feast of the Epiphany, writes about the Magi: "going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him" (Mt 2:11). It is the mother who, after giving birth to Jesus, presents the son to the world. She gives us Jesus, she shows us Jesus, she lets us see Jesus.

In the family there is the mother. Every human person owes his or her life to a mother, and almost always owes much of what follows in life, both human and spiritual formation, to her. The mother is not always listened to or helped in daily life, and the readiness of mothers to make sacrifices for their children is taken advantage of too often.

The center of the life of the church is the mother of Jesus. Perhaps mothers, ready to sacrifice so much for their children and often for others as well, ought to be listened to more. We should understand more about their daily struggle to be efficient at work and attentive and affectionate in the family. A mother with her children always has challenges, and always has work; mothers give us so much. Mothers "divide" themselves, from the moment they bear a child to give him to the world and help him grow.

Being a mother doesn't only mean bringing a child to the world, but it is also a life choice. What does a mother choose, what is the life choice of a mother? The life choice of a mother is the choice to give life. And this is great, this is beautiful.

A society without mothers would be a dehumanized society, for mothers are always, even in the worst moments, witnesses of tenderness, dedication, and moral strength. Mothers often pass on the deepest sense of religious practice: in a human being's life, the

value of faith is inscribed in the first prayers, the first acts of devotion that a child learns. It is a message that believing mothers are able to pass on without much explanation: these come later, but the seed of faith is those early precious moments. Without mothers, not only would there be no new faithful, but the faith would lose a good part of its simple and profound warmth. And the Church is mother, with all of this, she is our mother! We are not orphans, we have a mother! Our Lady, Mother Church, is our mom. We are not orphans: we are children of the Church; we are children of Our Lady, and we are children of our mothers.

Dearest mothers, you are appreciated for what you are in your family and for what you give to the Church and the world. And to you, beloved Church, thank you for being Mother. And to you, Mary, Mother of God, thank you for letting us see Jesus.

FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER



May has traditionally been called the Marian month in the Church. Behind all Marian devotions is the doctrine that Mary, being the Mother of Jesus is also

then the Mother of God. And because Jesus from the Cross gave Mary over to John to behold Her as his mother, Jesus gave Her to all of us as well. As our Blessed Mother, She is eternally caring for Her beloved children with not just a maternal love, but a maternal love that is heavenly

Ronald Rolheiser once made a reflection on Mary where he made an interesting distinction between the Mary of Devotion and the Mary of Scripture. The Mary of Devotion is held fondly in the hearts of Catholics, and She is the one who we show love to in the recitation of the rosary, in the installation of Her statues in our churches, homes and in the different types of novena devotions that are extant. She is the one who prays with us while we are still 'mourning and weeping in the valley of tears', a phrase many of us are familiar with when we pray the Hail Holy Queen prayer. It is always interesting to see how every time there is a Marian apparition, it is always to those who are meek, humble, lowly and nobodies in Mary has never appeared to a bigwig investment banker, a captain of industry or a leader of a country. She has never been documented to have appeared before a Hollywood A-lister or anyone remotely famous. Her choice has always been for children, many of whom were uneducated (at least theologically), and those who had trouble in conveying Her messages to the authorities.

It is to the Mary of Scripture that we need to seek to always get our grounding right. The writers of the gospels give us good reason to maintain our healthy Marian devotion and She helps us to become true and proper disciples of Jesus, and we see in Mary the model disciple. But we have to be very attentive to how Her character reveals Her ideal discipleship qualities in the gospels, as these are subtle. For example, this is revealed when Jesus says that those who listen to God's word and obey it are His mother, brother and sister. Mary never took umbrage at these words, which any earthly mother easily would. Marian theologians have always called Her the second Eve whose pure and unconditional 'yes' contrasts so clearly against the 'yes' of the first Eve when she chose to eat of the fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil. The first Eve didn't want to live in mystery, whilst the second Eve welcomed mystery and showed a readiness to live in an unknowing.

Mary's model discipleship is shown by Her willingness to carry Her cross with great love all Her life. And the way She carried Her cross mirrors the way Her Son carried His. Neither of them was bitter about it, and neither of them sought remuneration for it either. Mary's stance at the foot of the cross exemplifies humility; we don't see Her shaking Her fist to heaven, or screaming out for vengeance for Her innocent son's death. Her agony at Calvary mirrors Her Son's. Her Son's agony opened heaven's gate for us, and I see this agony as Her labor pains, akin to a mother's pains when she undergoes the incredible pain of childbirth. Calvary needs to be seen as humanity's labor ward, where the result of the pain resulted in Her being the Mother of all humanity.

It is this Mary that May's devotions honors, and it is this Mary who is crowned as Queen of Heaven and Earth.

SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER



Nearly every A note liturgical calendar, including the one the parish, lists this coming Thursday as

"Ascension Thursday" – with much smaller print indicating that the feast "in several dioceses" is transferred to Sunday, May 29th. Actually, the Solemnity is transferred to Sunday May 29th in almost every diocese of the country!

So why the change? Transferring the Ascension to Sunday is part of a trend of transferring holy days of obligation and other solemnities to the following Sunday. Doing so allows greater exposure and more solemn celebration of the holy day among the faithful. For the Ascension in the United States, this started on the west coast in the late 1990s and eventually spread. Other parts of the world have also transferred this solemnity to Sunday including Australia, Canada, and some countries in Europe. With the approval of the Holy See, the episcopal conference (the body of bishops in a country) can transfer solemnities and change some of the holy days of obligation (Canon 1246).

There are two additional solemnities that are usually transferred in the United States for the same reason. The Epiphany is moved from January 6 (twelve days after Christmas) to the Sunday between January 2-8. Corpus Christi is also moved from the Thursday after Trinity Sunday to the following Sunday.

Long story short: while you're welcome, and encouraged, to participate at weekday Mass whenever your schedule permits, there is no obligation to do so this Thursday; our celebration of the Lord's Ascension into heaven will be celebrated next Sunday!

THE ASCENSION OF OUR LORD

As we slowly A note move back to a greater sense of normalcy in com our Pastor life, so too as a parish are we doing the same.

One annual aspect of parish life is the missionary appeal—which will be taking place NEXT WEEKEND.

Fr. Fortunatus, a resident of the Diocese of Rockville Center, NY, will make an appeal on behalf of the Diocese of Kabale in Uganda.

The Kabale Diocese is one of the 19 Uganda located dioceses in southwestern corner of the country—about 280 miles from the capital city of Kampala. We serve a population of about 1.8 million people, and 800,000 are Roman Catholic. The vast majority of the people we serve are located in rural, underserved, and mostly remote areas of the country. Most critical among the challenges they face is healthcare. Leading causes of death in Uganda include neonatal disorders, tuberculosis, malaria, infections, respiratory diarrheal diseases, congenial defects, heart disease, stroke, road injury and malnutrition.

In his appeal Fr. Fortunatus will ask our financial support toward the development of a hospital for the rural poor—Our Lady of Good Health Hospital Rushoroza. Through the gracious generosity of many, we have managed to complete the initial phase-outpatient department, minor operating room, medical/surgical ward and small delivery/ maternity unit. We are transitioning into the next phase for which we are seeking assistance, a phase that comprises ward, dental, children's ophthalmology, radiology, medical laboratory units, and expansion on emergency room, operating room, maternity unit, and ambulance services. Our one and only ambulance is 15 years old and almost beyond repair.

Your generosity, to whatever extent you can contribute, is most appreciated. remember that the most important thing any of us can do is PRAY—so regardless of whatever financial support you can afford, make sure to include your intense prayerful support!

As a remind about how the diocesan missionary appeal works. There are 185 parishes in the Diocese, but far more than 185 missionaries ask to make appeals within the diocese. To be as generous as possible, your donations will be shared as follows: 90¢ of every dollar donated will go to the Diocese of Kabale; the remaining 10¢ of every dollar will be shared with missionary efforts who could not be accommodated at one of our 185 diocesan parishes. That said, 100% of every dollar you donate will go to the missions!

LASTLY, please make any payable to Sacred Heart Parish. because we need to channel the funds through the diocese—who'll do the 90/10 forwarding of the funds as described above.








Welcome Fr. Fortunatus! As you may recall from last week's reflection, we're participating in the annual missionary appeal; this year, we'll be supporting the efforts

The feast of the Most Holy Trinity was introduced in the ninth century and was only inserted in the general

calendar of the Church in the fourteenth century by Pope John XXII. Constantly the Church causes us to praise and adore the thrice-holy God who has so shown His mercy towards us and has given us to share in His life.

The dogma of faith which forms the object of the feast is this: There is one God and in this one God there are three Divine Persons: the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God. Yet there are not three Gods, but one, eternal, incomprehensible God! The Father is not more God than the Son, neither is the Son more God than the Holy Spirit. The Father is the first Divine Person; the Son is the second Divine Person, begotten from the nature of the Father from eternity; the Holy Spirit is the third Divine Person, proceeding from the Father and the Son. No mortal can fully fathom this sublime truth. But I submit humbly and say: Lord, I believe, help my weak faith.

Why is this feast celebrated at this particular time? It may be interpreted as a finale to all the preceding feasts. All three Persons contributed to and shared in the work of redemption. The Father sent His Son to earth, for "God so loved the world as to give His only-begotten Son." The Father called us to the faith. The Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, became man and died for us. He redeemed us and made us children of God. He ever remains the liturgist par excellence to whom we are united in all sacred functions. After Christ's ascension the Holy Spirit, however, became our Teacher, our Leader, our Guide, our Consoler. On solemn occasions a thanksgiving Te Deum rises spontaneously from Christian hearts.

The feast of the Most Holy Trinity may well be regarded as the Church's *Te Deum* of gratitude over all the blessings of the

Christmas and Easter seasons; for this mystery is a synthesis of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Ascension and Pentecost. This feast, which falls on the first Sunday after Pentecost, should make us mindful that actually every Sunday is devoted to the honor of the Most Holy Trinity, that every Sunday is sanctified and consecrated to the triune God. Sunday after Sunday we should recall in a spirit of gratitude the gifts which the Blessed Trinity is bestowing upon us. The Father created and predestined us; on the first day of the week He began the work of creation. The Son redeemed us; Sunday is the "Day of the Lord," the day of His resurrection. The Holy Spirit sanctified us, made us His temple; on Sunday the Holy Spirit descended upon the infant Church. Sunday, therefore, is the day of the Most Holy Trinity.





Dr. Brent Pietri, in his series *Mass Readings* Explained, begins his reflection on this weekend's readings with the following:

The 13th Sunday in ordinary time for Year C takes us into the heart of Luke's gospel, which is Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. One of the unique things about Luke is that in the middle of his gospel, there's this long section where Jesus sets His face toward Jerusalem and He begins journeying from the north in Galilee down to the south in Judea, to the city of Jerusalem, as His ultimate destination. And many of the teachings of Jesus that are famous from Luke's gospel, like the Parable of the Prodigal Son or The Good Samaritan, a lot of that material comes to us from this central section, when Jesus is on the way to Jerusalem. And so today we begin that section, as we're looking at the Gospel of Luke 9:51-62. This is the famous story of James and John (of the zeal of James and John), who want to call down fire from heaven upon the Samaritan people, and then Jesus' response to that zeal when He teaches them about the cost of discipleship.

In the 23 July 2016 issue of The Arkansas Catholic,, Deacon Matthew Glover, chancellor for canonical affairs for the Diocese of Little Rock, wrote the

following reflection on freedom. He is also an attorney & holds a degree in sacred theology from the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome.

Our American freedom is enshrined in our Declaration of Independence, which is the founding document of our freedom. It recognizes that all people are created equal, and that from God we have all been given "inalienable rights," which means cannot be granted or taken away by any earthly government. They just are.

As Americans, we love our freedom — or, at least, what we like to consider "freedom." For our society, freedom often means being able to do pretty much whatever we want, so long as it's not hurting anyone else.

As Catholic Americans, we ought to have a radically different view of "freedom." The Catholic tradition has long recognized and defended the concept of free will. But our Catholic tradition would not necessarily recognize our society's notion of freedom as true freedom.

For Catholics, true freedom is when someone has chosen the good so often and so repeatedly, that it has become a habit, a routine, a way of life — so much so that choosing evil would not even occur to him or her as a legitimate option.

As long as we are still tempted to choose sin and evil, we are not completely and totally "free." Of course, we won't ever be completely free during this lifetime, but that's our aim and our goal. Why? Because at the end of the long struggle for true freedom lies our only true happiness — union with God our creator.

Perhaps the greatest explanation of freedom in our Catholic tradition comes from St. Thomas Aquinas. In his "Commentary on the Sentences," he notes that freedom is inherently ordered toward the good, and so being indecisive in the face of good and evil is not in fact freedom. Rather, freedom "is by its nature ordered to the good, and tends to evil only by defect." (II Set., Dist. 25, Q. 1, A. 1, Ad. 2).

Thus, to the extent that our freedom allows us to even think about choosing evil, our freedom is defective.

In his "Summa Theologica," St. Thomas Aquinas compares the freedom of humans with the freedom of angels. He's not saying that humans ought to become like angels (that's not a part of God's design). But

rather, he's trying to make a point about the nature of true freedom.

He says that the ability of freedom "to choose something not ordered to the end, that is, to sin, evinces a defect of freedom. Therefore the angels, who cannot sin, enjoy greater freedom of choice than we do, who can." (Ia, Q. 62, Art. 8, Ad. 3)

For Aquinas, and for us as Catholics, the greatest freedom lies in the inability to sin — not because we are perfect or have no choice in the matter, but because choosing the good is so ingrained in us that choosing evil isn't even on our radar. The great Dominican moral theologian Servais Pinckaers calls this the "freedom for excellence." And this "habit" of choosing excellence is called virtue.

The United States' founding fathers believed that virtue was essential to a democratic republic, and Benjamin Franklin wrote that "only a virtuous people are capable of freedom." Over the past 246 years, more than 1.1 million Americans have died in battle.

Those Americans died to obtain or protect all the freedoms that you and I now enjoy. We owe it to them, to God and to ourselves, to use those freedoms wisely; to use our freedoms for excellence. And to live in such a way that choosing the good becomes a habit — for that's the only way to attain true freedom.

Six months when ago we A note celebrated the Solemnity of the Epiphany—with its Solemnity emphasis on how

God visits us in the midst of the ordinary—it served as a reminder that the ordinary is full of the surprises of God. Although the term "Ordinary Time" may seem to connote normal, common, everyday, or mundane, this season of Ordinary Time in which we find ourselves is far from "ordinary." Epiphany reminded us that Ordinary Time is a season when things can get really exciting when we reflect on the "extraordinarily ordinary" aspects of Jesus' birth and ministry; it encourages us to renew our determination to recognize God in the ordinary aspects of our own lives as well.

There is a Christian practice that can help us discover God in our everyday lives; it is called the examen of consciousness and it is so very simple. All we need to do is take a few minutes at the end of each day to review the events of that day—asking God to show us evidence of the Divine Presence we might have missed as we hurried through the day. (You may prefer to take a few minutes in the morning to look back on the previous 24 hours.)

As we reflect on every aspect of the day waking, showering and dressing, eating, commuting, relating with others, difficulties and challenges at work, moments of pleasure and pain, consolation and desolation, decisionmaking, interacting with the news and needs of the world, returning home, the evening spent with friends or family, working late, crawling into bed-we can ask God: "Show me where You were present, making the ordinary something truly extraordinary. Reveal yourself to me!"

When we incorporate this simple practice of the daily examine into our daily routine, Ordinary Time becomes anything but ordinary! May this prayer offer us a way to begin (or continue) this practice together.

We thought we knew where to find You; we hardly needed a star to guide the way, just perseverance and common sense; why do You hide yourself away from the powerful and join refugees and outcasts, calling us to follow You there? Wise God, give us wisdom.

We thought we had laid You safe in the manger; we wrapped You in the thickest sentiment we could find, and stressed how long ago You came to us; yet, You are far from "tucked away" for You break upon us in daily life with messages of peace and goodwill demanding that we do something about it? Just and righteous God, give us justice and righteousness.

So where else would we expect to find You except in the ordinary moments of life turning the world to Your purpose through those who bear the name Christian? Enlighten us to the fullness of Your presence, as we seek to reflect to others the fullness of wisdom, justice, and righteousness which You have bestowed upon us through the gift of Your Holy Spirit.

Fr. Mark Latkovich is the Presidentrector of both rom our Pastor Borromeo Seminary and St. Mary

Seminary *Graduate* School and of Theology in Wickliffe.

Earlier this month Fr. Latkovich sent out an update on seminary renovations that are being funded through the generosity of the Heart of a Shepherd campaign. He wrote:

Last fall, students were welcomed back to the newly renovated East Wing of our seminary. One year earlier, Bishop Malesic donned a sledgehammer and symbolically cracked open a wooden door to signify that demolition had commenced.

Since then, the entire eastern corridor was gutted to its brick core, and steel beams began to reshape the former living space configuring wider and brighter corridors with a sprinkler system. Select windows were bricked up to accommodate a shower and commode with exhaust outlets for the shared bathrooms between rooms. Each room is forty percent larger with its own room temperature controls, five electrical outlets, and internet and Wi-Fi capacity. New sinks with light fixtures have been installed, and new modern light oak furniture has been placed.

While the East Wing has become the new Borromeo Seminary college residence, the pre-theologians, first-year and fourthyear theologians at Saint Mary Seminary reside in one of the corridors for the spring semester. Considering four faculty suites, the East Wing will be at capacity with 46 rooms.

Demolition began December 6, 2021, on the West Wing of the seminary that will

eventually house Saint Mary Seminary. Some major seminary students and faculty are temporarily housed at nearby parishes. They are commuting each day for prayer, meals, and classes.

While temporarily inconvenienced, November 2022 is the expected date for reopening the West Wing corridors that will house Saint Mary Seminary. Every one of us prays for those who have contributed their generous gifts to the Heart of a Shepherd campaign to provide a safe and updated living space for our seminarians today and priests for tomorrow. Paula Standridge is a member of St. John the Baptist Church in Hot Springs, AK. In 2012, she completed the diaconate formation training with

her husband, Deacon Robert Standridge. The following is from an article she wrote on praying through the scriptures for the Nov 21, '20 edition of the Arkansas Catholic. Hopefully her reflections on taking scripture to prayer will help you in your prayer.

One of the many facets of Ignatian prayer, developed by St. Ignatius of Loyola, includes the practice of placing oneself in Scripture to become a part of the biblical scene, in order to draw some practical applications for present life.

Using this method of prayer we can picture ourselves in the crowd that Jesus is speaking to and asking ourselves how we would react or what we would think about what Jesus is teaching or doing. We can also imagine ourselves as one of the main characters in the scene, someone in Jesus' parables or as Jesus.

To place oneself in the biblical setting we try to imagine what we might see and hear and what others might be doing, as well as ourselves.

If you were a devout Israelite and happened to be in Jerusalem on a particular Friday morning would you follow the crowd to find out what they were so noisy about? Knowing what you know now would you be honest with yourself about how you felt about what was happening, or would you automatically always fall on the "right" side of the situation?

I remember as a young girl when the Passion was being read at Mass I would never say the part "Crucify him!, Crucify him!" because I loved Jesus too much and would have never said that.

As an adult I joined in the chant, because I know it was my sins that he died for, and I am indeed one of the guilty. This is an example of how our insight can change as we grow in years and spiritual maturity.

The purpose of the prayer exercise is to be honest with ourselves and to grow in self-knowledge and awareness and to see what application can be made to our present life. Otherwise we are simply engaging in a time machine exercise and missing the point.

We may picture ourselves as one of the characters in Jesus' parables. It is easy to imagine being the prodigal son but have we ever felt or acted


like the brother or experienced all the emotions of the father?

In the parable about the good Samaritan I would like to think I would help the bleeding, helpless Samaritan, but I am a rule follower. The priest and the Levite who passed by this man would not risk becoming unclean — they were following the strict rule of law for their role in the Israelite community. Would mercy triumph over following the rules? I want to think so, but what about safety, especially in these times?

Lest we get discouraged and think only of all the things we have to work on and ways we are still deficient in our spiritual life, it helps to also think of ourselves as the one lost sheep that the shepherd goes to find, or of my favorite analogy: The pearl of great price.

"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant searching for fine pearls. When he finds a pearl of great price, he goes and sells all that he has and buys it." (Matthew 13:45-46)

Is God the pearl of great price, or are we? The answer is yes. When we find God in our life and realize his ultimate worth, we will work every day to retain our relationship with him. Imagining ourselves as the pearl helps us to remember how precious we are to Jesus, especially in prayer.

The Peace and Justice Committee are inviting members of different parish committees, groups, and all interested parishioners to a special presentation by Andrew Mathay, Coordinator for the Migrant and Refugee Service of Catholic Charities for the Cleveland Diocese on Thursday, August 4, 2022 at 7:00PM at the Education Bldg. He will talk about the MRS Parish Engagement Program. This was initially scheduled for June 2nd. but had to be postponed due to Covid outbreak at the MRS office. The Migrant and Refugee Service (MRS) was created during the Afghan Crisis to address the multiple needs of Afghan families arriving in this area. Initially, the work was daunting and complex. You will remember that our parish helped with financing special visa applications for those who have family members left behind still trying to leave to join their families here. MRS has now settled 270 families and 50 more are coming. Federal aid provides housing and food but there are other basic needs and supports necessary toward the immigrant family's productive adjustment to their new lives, and help from parishes are needed. Andrew heads the volunteer assistance enculturation program. He will also speak about how Ukrainian immigrants will be helped when they arrive. It behooves us to remember that the Holy Family were once immigrants, and that we are a nation of immigrants. Refreshments will be served.





Tomorrow (Monday) is the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary into heaven. Although a Holy Day, it is NOT one of obligation this year—

because it falls on a Monday. Thus, the only Mass on the Assumption will be Monday morning at St. Patrick Parish.

Here's a bit of reflection on this Marian Feast:

All the feast days of Mary mark the great mysteries of Her life and Her part in the work of redemption. The central mystery of Her life and person is Her divine motherhood, celebrated both at Christmas and a week later (Jan. 1) on the feast of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. The Immaculate Conception (Dec. 8) marks the preparation for that motherhood, so that She had the fullness of grace from the first moment of Her existence, completely untouched by sin. Her whole being throbbed with divine life from the very beginning, readying Her for the exalted role of mother of the Savior.

The Assumption completes God's work in Her since it was not fitting that the flesh that had given life to God himself should ever undergo corruption. The Assumption is God's crowning of His work as Mary ends Her earthly life and enters eternity. The feast turns our eyes in that direction, where we will follow when our earthly life is over.

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they do not look only to the past. They look to the present and to the future and give us an insight into our own relationship with God. The Assumption looks to eternity and gives us hope that we, too, will follow Our Lady when our life is ended.

The prayer for the feast reads: "All-powerful and ever-living God: You raised the sinless Virgin Mary, mother of Your Son, body and soul, to the glory of heaven. May we see heaven as our final goal and come to share Her glory."

In 1950, in the Apostolic Constitution <Munificentissimus Deus>, Pope Pius XII proclaimed the Assumption of Mary a dogma of the Catholic Church in these words: "The Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-virgin Mary, having completed the course of Her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heaven."

With that, an ancient belief became Catholic doctrine and the Assumption was declared a truth revealed by God.

We're close to students beginning a new academic from our Pastor year and, to a large extent a lot of our extent, a lot of our extra-curricular and

social activities begin happening in the days after Labor Day. As we all prepare for "new beginnings" in our lives, here are a couple proverbs or lessons to ponder - as our perspective is very influential.

Here is the first proverb:

Two men went to visit a wise sage. He was a very holy man.

The first man says: "I'm thinking of moving to this town. What's it like?"

The wise sage asks: "What was your old town like?"

The first man responds: "It was dreadful. Everyone was hateful. I hated it."

The wise sage says: "This town is very much the same. I don't think you should move here."

The first man leaves and the second man comes in. The second man says: "I'm thinking of moving to this town. What's it like?"

The wise sage asks: "What was your old town like?" The second man responds: "It was wonderful. Everyone was friendly and I was happy. Just interested in a change now."

The wise sage says: "This town is very much the same. I think you will like it here."

A similar proverb hails from Native America:

An old Cherokee is teaching his grandson about life. "A fight is going on inside me," he said to the boy. "It is a terrible fight and it is between two wolves. One is evil - he is anger, envy, sorrow, regret, greed, arrogance, self-pity, guilt, resentment, inferiority, lies, false pride, superiority, and ego."

He continued, "The other is good – he

is joy, peace, love, hope, serenity, humility, kindness, benevolence, empathy, generosity, truth, compassion, and faith. The same fight is going on inside you - and inside every other person, too."

The grandson thought about it for a minute and then asked his grandfather, "Which wolf will win?"

The old Cherokee simply replied, "The one you feed."

What we seek is what we find. The reasons WHY we do the things we do matters as much as, if not more than, the things we end up doing since our rationale shapes our perceptions and discoveries. So, ultimately, our motivations, in large part, lay the foundation for what we'll find.

Enclosed in today's bulletin is the Parish Financial Report for the last fiscal year $(7/1/^221 \rightarrow 6/30/^222)$.

Here are a few points of consideration, which are intended to quell any sense of alarm that might arise.

Although we ended the fiscal year a slim \$6,131.28 in the black, please know that thin positive margin is due to a loss from our parish investments (aka: stock & bond market). Losses in stock & bond value (we're invested 60% stock & 40% bond) amounted to \$38,772.96. If not for the change-in-value of our investments, our bottom line would have been solidly in the black.

As we're all aware, the stock & bond market experiences occasional "corrections." And although the above losses are significant over the last calendar year, when considering our investments over the last 4 years (for the period 7/1/2018→6/30/2022) our investments have shown significant dividends: \$58,779.96 (even with this year's correction).

If you have any questions concerning the enclosed report, don't hesitate to approach me – or any member of the parish finance council (all of whom are listed on the cover of the bulletin).

Today, Sunday, 9/11, our nation remembers the attacks on our country 21 years ago. It was an event that changed everyone's

perception of the reality of our world. Just about 10 years before, we had witnessed the end of the Soviet Union, which had been the great enemy of America throughout most of the 20th century. Perhaps a future of peace and freedom and cooperation among nations lay before us. Sept. 11 showed us that this was not to be the case.

On that terrible day 21 years ago, 2977 people died at the World Trace Center, the Pentagon, and in Somerset County, PA. September 11th stands as the most deadly terrorist attack in US history.

Each of those who died was a son or daughter, husband or wife, father or mother, brother or sister, or friend. They left behind shattered families, and shattered communities. In addition to the national tragedy, each was a personal tragedy that impacted many, many lives.

That day also launched America's wars in Iraq and in Afghanistan. Each of these has cost thousands of lives and billions of dollars. It is somewhat ironic that we ended our involvement in Afghanistan just one year ago—as we witnessed the collapse of that country's government and army, and the victory of the Taliban. It will take generations for our nation to recover from the effects of those conflicts and to regain the standing that we had before. Once again, these wars were not merely national tragedies but personal tragedies for those who have returned wounded impaired, physically and emotionally, and for grieving families who have lost loved ones.

On this Sunday, 9/11, we express our grief and sadness at the loss of life twenty-one years ago today— as well at the loss of life in the wars and conflicts since 2001. We also must pray for our leaders and the leaders of the world, that they will

work together to find effective ways of addressing the ongoing threat of terrorism and violence. Finally, we pray for the conversion and healing of all human hearts, so that we can recognize one another as brothers and sisters, and rise above those things that divide and separate us.

A common query of people is What do I do during Adoration? To help answer that question, I'll be sharing a few reflections that others have written concerning their discoveries about time before the Eucharist. This weeks pondering comes from Fr. John Paul Gardner of the Diocese of Bismark:

When I was about 12 years old I was much like most Catholics who don't understand the value of adoration. Real "tragedy" struck when on the first Friday of July that year my mother told me I had to spend an hour in adoration before I could go swimming at the community swimming pool.

I remember how distraught I was as I entered the church almost completely empty except for an old lady and a few of my fellow captives, I mean, my brothers and sisters. The first 10 minutes were the most painful. I was constantly thinking of the beautiful swimming pool I was not able to swim in, but instead, I was stuck at church.

Then my mind began to clear and I realized where I was, in the presence of almighty God. His presence revealed my selfishness. In fact, when I began to consider the fact that I was in the presence of His Divine Majesty, the whole church became, for me, like an amazing pool of grace. Believe me, I was extremely happy when the holy hour was up and I could dive into the swimming pool outside, but something in my heart changed forever. I realized there was an infinite amount of incredible, phenomenal, untold, mind-blowing graces available at the church every day.

Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament is a time we Catholics (or anyone with a prayerful heart) take to worship the true God in the person of Jesus Christ Who is really, truly present in the eucharistic host. Catholics usually make what is known as a holy hour to honor Jesus' heartfelt request to His closest disciples during His lonely agony in the garden, "Could you not spend one hour with me?"

Perhaps you've stayed for a few moments of adoration at your parish and then left, or maybe you pondered taking a holy hour each week, but, like me, you hesitated—thinking of all the other things you could be doing.

Here are some ideas about how to spend your time

in adoration.

- First of all, don't worry about what you are to say, simply be in the presence of Jesus. That is pretty mind-blowing stuff in and of itself.
- Second, call to mind your sins or sufferings and ask Jesus to have mercy on you. Great healing is available to those who come to adoration.
- Third, are you thankful for anything? Think of each person or thing in your life you are thankful for and thank Jesus for each one.
- Fourth read a little of the Sacred Scriptures and pause quietly to think in your heart what it means. The holy rosary and our Blessed Mother can be very helpful when doing this. Listen to what Jesus is saying to you. After all, He is truly present in front of you.

Lastly, I remind you of the first advice, be in the presence of Jesus and look at Him. The catechism of the Catholic Church tells the beautiful short story of St. John Vianney who was amazed that one of his parishioners would spend such long hours in front of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. He said to him, "What do you do in adoration?" The man simply responded, "I look at Him and He looks at me."

you make use of the ones that you find beneficial.

- Slowly read the Sacred Scriptures until something touches you. Then LISTEN.
- Say the Rosary.
 - If you can't say 5 decades, say one decade.
 - If you can 't say a decade, say one Hail Mary.
 - If you can't say one Hail Mary, say "Holy Mary", like a child saying "Momma."
- Look at the Good God, and let Him look at you.
- Consider that the Sacred Body of Jesus came from Holy Mary, and thank Her.
- Tell Jesus something that made you happy. Then LISTEN.
- Tell Him what you are afraid of. Then LISTEN.
- Tell Him what angers you. Then LISTEN.
- Speak about your loved ones.
- Pray for an enemy.
- Talk with Him about work.
- Pray to St. Joseph for a happy death.
- Pray for the Souls in Purgatory.
- Sing a song to Him in your heart.
- Promise to trust Him.
- See the Blessed Virgin kneeling next to you, adoring Her Son & praying with you.
- Realize that your Guardian Angel is with you, & ask him to coach you in holiness.
- Thank Jesus for the Sacraments.
- For a time don't DO anything; simply be with Him, as a friend, while the Lord works.
- Tell Him of your failures, & ask Him for help. Then LISTEN.
- Slowly recite the Beatitudes.
- Pray for a great love of the Cross.
- See our Lord in His Passion ... and stand there, with Him, as does Our Lady.
- Lean into the hurricane of graces coming from the Eucharistic Presence of our Lord in the monstrance.
- Consider the blinding Uncreated Light shining out from Jesus in the Eucharist.
- Be aware that He is sending out graces to the

world right then through you.

- Pray the Jesus Prayer: Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner.
- Tell Him: Jesus, I trust in You; strengthen my trust.
- Ask Him: Lord, what do you want me to do? And how do you want me to do it?
- Talk to Him heart to Heart.
- Pray for vocations to the priesthood of Jesus Christ.
- Enjoy being in His presence.

Being in the physical Presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is a very special and powerful thing, but... just what

do you do while you're there? Do you just sit there for an hour and stare at the Eucharist? Well, you can, but that method of prayer doesn't work for everyone all the time. Here are some suggestions for how to pray during Adoration if you're not sure what to do:

JUST TALK TO JESUS

He's right there present in the Eucharist. Talk to Him like you would any of your friends. Tell Him how your day went, your plans for the weekend, all the problems you've been facing, etc.

Then, listen to what He has to tell you. It's not a conversation if only one person is talking.

EMBRACE THE SILENCE

In this busy world, filled with the noise of the everything happening around us, silence can often be hard to come by. Use this time to embrace the silence, to allow Jesus to speak to you without the distractions and noise that are usually in the way. In this time, it can be a lot easier to hear what He has to say.

JOURNAL

Write down your thoughts, emotions, what you're struggling with, what you're hopeful about, etc., and bring them to Jesus. Maybe treat it like you're writing a letter to Him. Writing things down can often help get you thinking.

READ THE BIBLE

One of the ways God speaks to us is through Scripture. If you're not sure where to start, try choosing one of the Gospel parables or the Psalms, or maybe one of the readings for the upcoming Sunday Mass. Start by asking Him to open your heart to what He has to tell you. Then, read through it slowly, seeing what stands out to you, and meditate on it.

ASK FOR INTERCESSION FROM THE **SAINTS**

Ask Mary, St. Joseph, your guardian angel, or any

of the Saints for their intercession. Ask them to help improve your relationship with Christ and help you grow in your love for Him.

PRAY THE ROSARY

The rosary is a powerful prayer that's always good to turn to if you're not sure what to pray. If you don't want to pray a full 5 decades, praying even one is efficacious. If not even that, pray one Hail Mary really well.

There are also other rote prayers that you can use, such as the Divine Mercy Chaplet or the Jesus prayer, that you may find helpful.

PRAY FOR OTHERS

Pray for your family, your friends. Pray for your enemies. Pray for Father Clint, Cardinal Dinardo, Auxiliary Bishop Sheltz, and Pope Francis. Pray for the sick, the lonely. Who else can you pray for?

DON'T DO ANYTHING

It's fine to do nothing! St. John Vianney once described a man who always came in to spend a long time with the Blessed Sacrament. When St. Vianney asked him what he said to Jesus during those visits, he replied, "I say nothing to Him, I look at Him and He looks at me!" It's a beautiful thing to just sit and spend time with Jesus, even if you have nothing to say.

During his pontificate, Pope John Paul II wrote numerous times about Eucharist Adoration. Here are a few of his writings:

The Church and the world have a great need of Eucharistic worship. Jesus waits for us in this sacrament of love. Let us be generous with our time in going to meet Him in adoration and in contemplation that is full of faith and ready to make reparation for the great faults and crimes of the world. May our adoration never cease.

—Dominicæ Cenæ (1988)

During this year Eucharistic adoration outside Mass should become a particular commitment for individual parish and religious communities. Let us take the time to kneel before Jesus present in the Eucharist, in order to make reparation by our faith and love for the acts of carelessness and neglect, and even the insults which our Savior must endure in many parts of the world. Let us deepen through adoration our personal and communal contemplation, drawing upon aids to prayer inspired by the word of God and the experience of so many mystics, old and new. The Rosary itself, when it is profoundly understood in the biblical and Christocentric form which I recommended in the Apostolic Letter Rosarium Virginis Mariae, will prove a particularly fitting introduction to Eucharistic contemplation, a contemplation carried out with Mary as our companion and guide.

The worship of the Eucharist outside of the Mass is of inestimable value for the life of the Church. This worship is strictly linked to the celebration of the Eucharistic Sacrifice. The presence of Christ under the sacred species reserved after Mass — a presence which lasts as long as the species of bread and of wine remain — derives from the celebration of the sacrifice and is directed towards communion, both sacramental and spiritual. It is the responsibility of Pastors to encourage, also by their personal witness, the practice of Eucharistic adoration, and exposition of the Blessed Sacrament in particular, as well as prayer of adoration before Christ present under the Eucharistic species.

It is pleasant to spend time with Him, to lie close to His breast like the Beloved Disciple (cf. Jn 13:25) and to feel the infinite love present in His heart. If in our time Christians must be distinguished above all by the "art of prayer," how can we not feel a renewed need to spend time in spiritual conversation, in silent adoration, in heartfelt love before Christ present in the Most Holy Sacrament? How often, dear brother and

sisters, have I experienced this, and drawn from it strength, consolation and support!

This practice ... is supported by the example of many saints. Particularly outstanding in this regard was Saint Alphonsus Liguori, who wrote: "Of all devotions, that of adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest after the sacraments, the one dearest to God and the one most helpful to us." The Eucharist is a priceless treasure: by not only celebrating it but also by praying before it outside of Mass we are enabled to make contact with the very wellspring of grace.... The Catholic Church has held firm to this belief in the presence of Christ's Body and Blood in the Eucharist, not only in her teaching but in her life as well, since she has at all times paid this great Sacrament the worship known as latria, which may be given to God alone. As Saint Augustine says: "It was in His flesh that Christ walked among us and it is His flesh that He has given us to eat for our salvation; but no one eats of this flesh without having first adored it ... and not only do we not sin in thus adoring it, but we would be sinning if we did not do so."

Without the necessary spiritual direction and guidance of how to make a holy hour, we can forget that this precious time with the Lord is more about His desire to be

with us than our desire to be with Him. He is the one who longs for our company more than we long for Him: "Could you not watch with Me one hour?" (Mark 14:37). Here I offer a few guidelines of how we can make a holy hour by dividing it into three blocks of twenty minutes.

The first twenty minutes before the Lord really present in the Eucharist is a sacred time of intimacy between us and Him. It is a time to just be present to our God who welcomes us and accepts us. In the words of St. John Vianney, it is a time when "I look at Him and He looks at me." Before the Eucharist is a time when we lean on Jesus' breast, like John did at the last supper, and allow His heart to speak to ours. This was the episcopal motto of Blessed John Henry Newman: cor ad cor loquitur (heart speaks to heart). We begin to grow in our "interior knowledge of the Lord" as we contemplate His words, His life, and His real presence before us (St. Ignatius of Loyola, Spiritual Exercises, 104). Here is the zone into which we are drawn in the first third of our holy hour, where our heart speaks to His. It is also a time when we listen to Him and allow Him to speak to us. This is a time when we can tell Him everything about how we are and how we feel. It is a time to tell Him about our day and to ask His help in ways in which we need it. Above all it is a time to thank the Lord for His presence and action in our lives and to adore Him for His goodness, truth, and mercy. It is also an opportunity to present to Him the things we don't understand, our sins, failings, and the worries that burden us. In this twenty minutes of our holy hour, we bask in the light of His love that never fails us.

The second twenty minutes can be a time when we intercede for all the people we know and are part of our lives. At this stage of our prayer, we bring to the Lord all who have asked us to pray for them, our families and friends both living and dead. In this time we pray for all we have met in the past day or week, the conversations we had, the things we have said and done. Often during this time in the holy hour, some person will arise in our minds who we feel the Lord is calling us to pray for, reach out to, to contact or to visit. It is also a time to focus on what lies ahead—our next appointment, our next challenge, or perhaps a courageous conversation we need to have with someone to clear the air. In this time of prayer, our hearts are reminded that our call is to love others in

Christ's name, and that the same Lord before us in the Eucharist is the same Lord present in everyone, especially in the least of His brothers and sisters (cf. Matt 25:31ff).

The final twenty minutes can be a time when we pray for the entire human family and the whole universe. So we might pray for persecuted Christians around the world, for the victims of famine, and for an end to conflicts and wars. We might pray for the Church around the world, for the Holy Father on a foreign visit, or for all missionaries away from home. We might pray for the environment and for the care of the earth, thinking of ways to conserve more and consume less. For His beauty revealed in creation, this is a time to thank God for the sun, moon, and stars that were made through His Word present before us in the Eucharist. Finally, we can pray in this time for the peace among all nations for which Jesus lived and died-and that it might become a reality in our troubled world today.

There are many ways of praying and many ways of making a holy hour for "the Spirit blows where it wills" (John 3:8). But sometimes we need a little guidance that helps us to focus. Above is a guide for a holy hour of Adoration before the Lord, truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. It starts off with His love for us but ends with a prayer that blesses God for the whole of creation. In this way we exercise our share in Christ's priesthood that lovingly embraces every individual but extends to the entire cosmos we inhabit.

"O sacrament most holy, O sacrament divine, all praise and all thanksgiving be every moment thine!"



All Souls' Day on Nov. 2 is often overshadowed by the holy day of obligation that immediately precedes it; All

Saints' Day, which has a rich and important history of its own. The two feasts are intrinsically linked: All Saints' Day memorializes the holy men and women who have already entered into the presence of God; All Souls' Day remembers those whose fate is unknown, but who may still be in purgatory awaiting their final reward.

The entire month of November is dedicated to praying for the deceased. These faithful men and women have long been remembered in the Catholic Church at different times throughout the year. But in the 11th century, St. Odilo of Cluny chose the day following All Saints' Day as an official day of prayer for all the Clunaic monasteries, and the date quickly became a fixture of the liturgical calendar.

Indeed, the entire month of November is dedicated to praying for those who are being purified in the fires of God's love in purgatory. Jesus tells us that nothing unclean shall enter heaven, so those of us who are not perfect

when we die can expect at least a short stay in purgatory. Those who are there can pray for us but cannot pray for themselves. That is why we have a sacred duty to fast, pray, and make other sacrifices on behalf of the holy souls.

Parishioners both here & at St. Patrick Parish, are invited to write the names of deceased family members and friends in the Book of the Dead. Since the most powerful prayer we can offer for the holy souls in purgatory is the Mass, we will remember them in our weekend petitions throughout the month of November.

All Souls' Day, and praying throughout this month for our loved ones who have died, is not intended to be a time of sadness or sorrow, or simply fulfilling our duty of praying for the dead. Rather, our ongoing prayer for those who have died offers us an opportunity to renew our hope in Christ's promise of eternal life!

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time: November 13, 2022



Praying for the dead is a Christian obligation. In the modern world, when many have come to question the Church's teaching on

Purgatory, the need for such prayers has only increased. The Church devotes the month of November to prayer for the Holy Souls in Purgatory, and participation in the Mass of All Souls Day is a good way to begin the month.

The church teaches that 'all who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven. The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different the punishment from of the The existence of Purgatory or a 'purifying process' after death is a Catholic Dogma of the Faith which means every Catholic must believe in order to remain a Catholic. The Church does not insist that it is a place, but may be a process only. It is not a destination, but a sort of passage through which all who must experience it will eventually be purified enough to see God face to face.

It's understood that the souls undergoing this purification may benefit from the prayers of the living, but that the opportunity of grace to pray for their own relief has passed. Just as a prisoner who awaits his trial may be released from jail by a friend who pays the cost of his bail, so we may help to gain the release

of a holy soul from the prison of his suffering. It's considered a great act of spiritual mercy by the Church to pray for the dead. The idea of a Purgatory is not exclusive to the Catholic Church. The concept of purgatory or a place for the dead (other than heaven or hell) has long been a part of ancient Jewish before Christianity made beliefs, long appearance. It is mentioned by various names such as 'The Nether World", "Limbo", 'Paradise' or in Greek 'Hades', or in Hebrew 'Sheol' (found in both the Old and the New Testaments), which all translate to 'the abode of the dead.' But there is a definite distinction made between purgatory and hell. The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence (1439) and Trent (1563). The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire.

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Second Sunday of Advent: December 4, 2022





The Immaculate Conception is "one of the wonders of the story of salvation," Pope Francis said in his Angelus address on 12/8/2020. The

pope encouraged Catholics to entrust themselves to Mary, seeking purity and holiness. He said:

The uncontaminated beauty of our Mother is incomparable, but at the same time it attracts us. Let us entrust ourselves to Her and say 'no' to sin and 'yes' to Grace once and for all.

Today's liturgical feast celebrates one of the wonders of the story of salvation: the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary. Even She was saved by Christ, but in an extraordinary way, because God wanted that the Mother of His Son not be touched by the misery of sin from the moment of Her conception. And so, for the entire course of Her earthly life, Mary was free from any stain of sin, She was the 'full of grace' (Luke 1:28), as the angel called Her. She was favored by a singular action of the Holy Spirit so as to always remain in perfect relationship with Her Son, Jesus. Rather, She was Jesus's disciple: His Mother and disciple. But there was no sin in Her.

Citing the hymn that opens St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians, the pope said that we too are created by God for the *fullness of holiness* granted to Mary from the beginning.

And what Mary had from the beginning will be ours in the end, after we have passed through the purifying 'bath' of God's grace.. What opens the gates of paradise to us is God's grace, received by us with faithfulness.

Yet even the most innocent person is marked by original sin, he said, and therefore must engage in a lifelong struggle against its consequences. Lest we be discouraged, we should remember that the thief who was crucified beside Jesus *is the first person we* are sure entered paradise, the pope noted.

Let us take advantage of the present moment! This, yes, is the Christian sense of seizing the day. To not enjoy life in each passing moment -- no, this is the worldly sense. But to seize today, to say 'no' to evil and 'yes' to God, to open oneself to His grace.

The pope said that the "journey of conversion" begins with seeking God's forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We must then seek to repair the harm we have done to others.

And this, for us, is the path for becoming 'holy and immaculate' he explained.



Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Fourth Sunday of Advent: December 18, 2022






During Advent, we patiently wait for the birth of Jesus, and we sing "O Come, O Come Emmanuel". This song is based on the seven O


Antiphons which are called such because they all begin with the letter 'O' for they address Jesus by one of His Old Testament titles. They are fervent prayers asking Him to come to us.

Remember the Advent season is about the many ways in which the Lord comes to us. He came at Bethlehem. He comes to us Sacramentally. He will come again at the end of the world. He comes to us in the reception of Holy Communion. He comes through the priest, in persona Christi Capitis, in the person of Christ the Head of the Church. He comes through the Scriptures. He comes in our community and neighbor through the spiritual and corporal works of mercy.

The texts of the O Antiphons originate from the Old Testament Hebrew Scriptures, the Prophetic and Wisdom Books. They are found in the Liturgy of the Hours, or Breviary, which are used for daily prayer. The Antiphons are short prayers recited before and after the Magnificat, the great prayers of Mary used during Vespers or evening prayer, beginning on December 17th, and ending on December 23rd.

An interesting but little-known fact about the order of the O Antiphons is not apparent in English, but it can be clearly seen in the Latin, the official language of the Roman Catholic Church. The Latin versions of each of the titles of the Messiah: Sapienta (Wisdom), Adonai (Lord), Radix (Root), Clavis (Key), Oriens (Dawn), Rex (King), and Emmanuel (Immanuel). Take the first letters of each of the titles and write them backwards, thus counting down the days of the feast: EROCRAS or "ero cras" which in Latin means "I will be (here) tomorrow."

The Nativity of the Lord: December 25, 2022



Once upon a Christmas time, in a place not far away from our hearts, people longed for a king to come and lead them where they could not go on their own, to a world of perfect love. So they wished upon a midnight star, for a silent knight to come and slay the dragon of loneliness and fear.

Starlight drew some to the town of Bethlehem, where a star was born. There, they beheld the stable presence of God, a newborn prince in pauper's gown. Some brought Him gifts of clothes to suit their own image of what a king should be...

- A rich man presented the child with an expensive emerald-lined cape, for he believed that a king must wield great wealth. Mary thanked him, but refused the gift, knowing that Jesus would live in simplicity, not in luxury.
