Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Solemnity of Mary, The Holy Mother of God: January 1, 2023



The custom of blessing a home in the New Year is an invitation for Jesus from our Pastor to be a daily guest in your home,

comings and goings, your conversations, your work and play, your joys, and sorrows.

A traditional way of doing this is to use chalk to write above the home's entrance, 20 + C + M + B + 23. The letters C, M, B have two meanings. They are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They also abbreviate Latin words Christus mansionem benedictat, "May Christ bless the house." The "+" signs represent the cross and 2023 is the year when the blessing was called down upon the home.

Blessing the Chalk

Leader: Our help is the name of the Lord:

All: The maker of heaven and earth.

Leader: The Lord shall watch over your going

out and your coming in:

All: From this time forth for evermore.

Let us pray.

Loving God, bless this chalk which You have created, that it may be helpful to Your people; and grant that through the invocation of Your most Holy Name that we who use it in faith to write upon the door of our home the names of Your holy ones Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar, may receive health of body and protection of soul for all who dwell in or visit our home; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Instructions for Blessing the Home

Using the blessed chalk mark the lintel of your front door (or front porch step) as follows:

20 + C + M + B + 23 while saying:

The three Wise Men, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God's Son who became human two thousand and fifteen years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

Then offer the following prayer.

Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of Your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of Your love; and grant that we may manifest Your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch. May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of You; guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen

"Chalking the door" is a way to celebrate and literally mark the occasion of the Epiphany and God's blessing of our lives and home. With time the chalk will fade. As it does, we let the meaning of the symbols written sink into the depths of our heart and be manifest in our words and actions the Latin words. Christus mansionem benedictat, "May Christ bless the house."

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Epiphany of the Lord: January 8, 2023



For much of contemporary A note secular society, Christmas is over for another year. For Catholics and Christians. however, there is "still more

to come." This weekend, January 4-5, the Roman Catholic Church anticipates the Christmas feast of the "Epiphany of the Lord," traditionally celebrated throughout the Western Christian world on January 6. Known by many other names in a number of different cultures - "Little Christmas," "Three Kings' Day," the "Twelfth Day of Christmas," "Twelfth Night," etc. - this feast extends the Christmas season by commemorating the visit of the "magi" or "wise men" to the Christ Child. What is the Feast of the Epiphany all about in the Church?

Most of us are familiar with the legendary presence of the "three kings" from manger scenes in our churches and homes. We can sing the words of the popular hymn "We Three Kings" from memory. We know the gifts they brought as they followed the Christmas star to the place of the Nativity: gold, frankincense and myrrh.

The story of the "three wise men" or "magi" is derived from the Gospel of Matthew, chapter 2, where the sacred author describes their visit to King Herod in Jerusalem in search of the "newborn king of the Jews." They told him they "saw His star at its rising" and – recalling the words of the prophet Micah that the "One to rule Israel" would come from Bethlehem (Micah 5:2) – they wanted to pay Him homage.

"Troubled" by this news of competition, King Herod dispatched them to Bethlehem and directed them to return to him once they found Him there. And so, following the star, they entered "the house and saw the Child with Mary, His mother" and presented their gifts. They had a dream, however, not to return to King Herod and, so, they journeyed home via another route.

That's the story. It is only found in the Gospel of Matthew, nowhere else in the scriptures. In the early centuries of the Church's developing tradition, the visit of the three magi had a great impact on its imagination and became part of the whole liturgical re-presentation of Christ's birth, His early life, His baptism by John in the Jordan and His first public miracle at the wedding Feast of Cana. Eventually, Epiphany became a separate liturgical celebration as did the commemoration of the Baptism of the Lord.

Scripture does not claim that they were "three" in number nor does it identify them as "Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar" as later tradition customarily names them. The presumption that there were "three" of them comes from the three gifts Matthew says they offered to the Child and His Mother: gold, representing royalty – Micah predicts He will "rule Israel;" frankincense, used in ancient worship rites - the magi "prostrated themselves and did Him homage;" and myrrh, a perfume used at the coronation of kings or to anoint the dead – perhaps a prediction of the eventual death of the King.

Next, the star. Whether or not the star was a miraculous or unusual apparition is not clear from the story itself. It is entirely possible that the star was clearer in the sky at the time of the journey of the magi "from the east." It cannot be dismissed or discounted but it certainly was interpreted at the time to have a special prominence or significance. It does add to an amazing story.

In his book "Jesus of Nazareth: The Infancy Narratives," Pope Benedict XVI observed that it was not the star that determined the Child's destiny but the Child who directed the star.

Finally, the story itself. "Epiphany" comes from a Greek linguistic expression that is translated as "display" or "manifestation." In Matthew's account, the visit of the magi is intended to demonstrate or "manifest" that Jesus, the Child of Mary born in Bethlehem, is the long-awaited Messiah of Israel, predicted by the prophets of old. They called upon King Herod during their journey as a courtesy because they presumed that he, too, shared their enthusiasm for the anticipated birth of "a Ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time: January 15, 2023

In May of 2022, A note Paula Sandridge, a member of St. John from our Pastor the Baptist Church in Hot Springs, AR,

shared this reflection in their diocesan newspaper. Her thoughts on the plethora of prayer-styles is spot-on!

Our temperament and personality affect many aspects of our lives. For example: how we relate to the world around us and our relationships with other people, and also how we work, play and enjoy our free time.

Some of us love to talk and socialize with other people and get our energy this way. Others prefer solitary time to be fueled from within or to process information. These descriptions are some of the general traits of being an extrovert or an introvert. There are other facets to a personality or temperament, though — like whether we are more of a thinker or feeler, sensitive or intuitive, judging or perceiving.

Besides work and play, these general descriptions can also determine how we prefer to pray and worship. Have you felt more energized or fulfilled during a group worship service, or would you rather pray the rosary alone? Do you prefer to raise your hands in charismatic praise and worship, or would you rather study the Bible and meditate on the Scriptures?

Or have you not really discovered a fulfilling prayer life at all? Throughout history, temperament has affected Christian why we spirituality. This is Benedictine, Carmelite, Ignatian and many other forms of spirituality and prayer. Not everyone is attracted to or can relate to the same method of becoming closer to God. In a book titled: "Prayer and Temperament" by Chester P. Michael and Marie C. Norrisey, the different personality types are matched with suggestions for different ways of praying and becoming closer to God.

The personality types are based on the Myers-Briggs personality test, which is explained further in the book or can be taken online. There is a different type of prayer and spirituality that is matched to each of the four basic temperaments and 16 types of personality. The four particular spiritualities mentioned in the book are Ignatian (St. Ignatius of Loyola), Thomistic (St. Thomas Aquinas), Franciscan (St. Francis of Assisi) and Augustinian (St. Augustine).

The Ignatian spiritually is a carefully organized regimen of striving toward a relationship with God. Franciscan is the opposite, which depends on spontaneity and spirit. Augustinian openness to the spirituality is based on self-development and growth, while **Thomistic** temperaments truth search for competency. Introverts will prefer different form of prayer than extroverts.

Feelers pray in a different way than thinkers. Judging people want structure in their prayer while perceiving people wish for flexibility. Of course, these are based on generalities; there are many more gifts and charisms that different religious orders and saints have enriched our faith throughout the ages. The apostles and Gospel writers had differing temperaments and gave us four different viewpoints of the character, life events and teachings of Jesus.

You can see the different temperaments of priests in how they preach or say Mass. Exploring temperaments our personalities on a deeper level can help us understand ourselves better, improve our relationships by being more aware of the differences between us and help us in our spiritual growth by finding a prayer method that best feeds our souls.

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time: January 22, 2023



We have just completed our second week in what the church refers to as "Ordinary Time." In our vernacular usage,

the word "ordinary" describes what is commonplace, "everyday" or without uniqueness or special distinction.

The fact is that "Ordinary Time" makes up most of the Church's year, roughly 34 weeks between the first and final Sundays of the liturgical calendar. The Lenten and Easter seasons constitute, for lack of a better term, an "interruption" of "Ordinary Time" before Advent and Christmas come again. There are also individual feast days and solemnities that appear in the liturgical calendar "interrupting Ordinary Time" here and there.

The term "Ordinary Time" comes from two Latin root words referring to the "order" of numbering the weeks of the year in the "ordered life" of the Church, beginning after the solemn feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which took place on Monday, January 9 this year in place of a "First Sunday in Ordinary Time." and will end with the solemn feast of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, the "Final Sunday in Ordinary Time."

What takes place in the Church's official prayer during "Ordinary Time" is anything but ordinary. It is the unfolding in Masses, Scripture readings and prayers of the whole life of the Lord Jesus Christ between the "seasonal celebrations" of His Incarnation and Birth and His Passion, Death and Resurrection.

The Church's liturgical calendar is "ordered" in three cycles of Scripture readings on Sundays — Years A, B and C (we are currently in the year A cycle of Sundays of 2023) — and two cycles of Scripture readings on weekdays — Years I and II (we are currently in the year I cycle of weekdays of 2023). This arrangement was established in the revisions of the Church's liturgical

calendar after the Second Vatican Council.


The vestments used by the priest and deacon at Mass during "Ordinary Time" are green in color. Green is used to represent in Christ's Resurrection characterizes each day in "Ordinary Time." Different colors are used to correspond to other seasons and times and on other days and occasions celebrated during the liturgical year – white (sometimes gold) for Christmas and Easter seasons and on special feasts of the Lord, the Blessed Mother or saints who were not martyred; violet for Advent and Lent and optionally may be used at Masses for the Dead; red for Masses of Palm Sunday, the Lord's Passion, Pentecost, the Holy Spirit, the Apostles, Evangelists or other saints who were martyred.

With all that in mind, we ought use "Ordinary Time" to deepen our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and His Gospel, to nourish our reading and understanding of the Word of God, to enhance and grow in our spiritual lives and prayer and to strive for personal conversion. "Ordinary Time" should be the opportunity to make progress in putting the Catholic faith into action with ongoing works of charity toward others, respect for and protection of human life in all its stages, support for marriage and family life, respect for the environment as our "common home," and personal witness to the Lord Jesus Christ.

The annual Catholic Charities Appeal is almost upon us. This year's theme is *A time to heal. A time to help.* and it is based off the

While Ash Wednesday is NOT a holy day, and Catholics are NOT required to begin Lent by going to Mass, many do opt to do so.

A note from our Pastor We're but a few days into Lent and, like New Year's resolutions, it's likely that we've not been entirely faithful to whatever Lenten resolutions we've chosen to embrace.

What's critical is not giving up—but getting up and trying again. In the midst of my failures, I find great strength in ponder the Stations of the Cross—specifically the three which recall Jesus' falls. If He can find the strength to get back up and walk to Calvary, I have no excuse for staying down when I fall.

One great source of strength, especially when our falls are sinful, is to embrace the Sacrament of Confession. To hear the words of Absolution and to know that, as far as Jesus is concerned, the matter is closed and your sins are forgiven is a great comfort and strength.

I encourage you to make it a point to embrace God's forgiveness during this Lenten Season—and the opportunities for confession are plentiful:

- Every Friday morning at Sacred Heart from 7:00 until 8:20am.



To aid in your prayerful preparation for the sacrament. I've included an Examination of Conscience with this weekend's bulletin (a different one for each parish, in the hopes that you'll peruse both parish bulletins). There are a plethora of examinations available across the web, but the two being shared this weekend are ones that people have indicated to have been quite helpful.

On a personal note, thanks for all your prayers as I've trudged through the isolation required of those testing COVID positive. I truly have an understanding of how Typhoid Mary felt ... completely unaware that she was typhoidpositive and went about her daily life ... unknowingly infecting others.

My weekly protocol of COVID self-testing (given my asthma and frequent coughing) highlighted me as COVID positive (3 different tests; 2 at home and 1 in the doctor's office). But, except for an ever-so-slight scratchy throat, I exhibited none of the exhaustion, cough, aches, that so many have experienced when they've been infected.

I initially adopted the practice of self-testing in early 2022 when insurance started covering up to 8-self tests per month, and I'd take them on Saturday mornings—and prior to holy day Masses.





In this weekend's Gospel, the man born blind rejoiced when Jesus healed him. He rejoiced because now he had the fullness of vision. Jesus made

possible for him to see as God sees. But before this healing, the blind man actually learned a lot about seeing as God sees - through his blindness, he could "see" with his heart.

God doesn't see as humans see. God says so Himself to Samuel in our First Reading. God doesn't pick Jesse's oldest and strongest son to be King of Israel; He picks the runt of the litter, the one who looks least prepared for the job, but who is perfect for the job. Because God sees deeper, into the heart, He sees the fullness of potential, the unique beauty of each person's soul He has created. He doesn't get distracted by appearances, as we so often do.

Today's Gospel is not saying: Try to see Jesus in everyone. It's saying step back from that: instead, see people and the world with

Jesus's eyes, through God's eyes.



A note from our Pastor The realist knows that if something can go wrong, it will go wrong. And that's precisely what happened with our envelope company this year. Not only did

they encounter a shortage of envelopes in February—which delayed envelopes by 2-3 weeks ... but they've also printed the WRONG EASTER SCHEDULE on the single Easter envelope that they mailed out. Once I noticed their error, I immediately called them—and they've assured me that the Easter envelope that'll be in your April packet will be labeled "Corrected" - and will match the schedule printed below.

The good news is that the schedule that's been printed in the bulletin throughout Lent (the one you've been asked to share with others as you invite them to Easter Mass) is correct.

Hosanna in the Highest!

"The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum" according to the US Conference of Catholic Bishops' website, "from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday." In human measure, it is a three-day period; in spiritual consideration, it is "liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery."

As a single celebration, the Triduum begins with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, leads us Friday through the Passion and Death, and to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil. The Vigil Mass is the high point of the Triduum and the high point of the liturgical year. The Triduum observance closes with the Divine Office recitation of Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday.

The unity of liturgy and purpose found in the Triduum is reflected in the fact that both St. Patrick and Sacred Heart Parishes celebrate these events together.

We are individual parishes, but we also are a community of faith in the Diocese of Cleveland."

At the Holy Thursday evening Mass, there is a symbolic Washing of Feet "after the Homily, where a pastoral reason suggests it," according to the Roman Missal

The spirit of sharing in community continues into Good Friday observances where the service—not a Mass—is a bridge between the Eucharistic celebrations of Holy Thursday and the Easter Vigil. Good Friday is the only day of the year when a Mass is not said. The liturgy of the day focuses on the Passion and Death of Christ with the Word, adoration and veneration of the Cross and sharing of Communion consecrated at Thursday's Mass. The purpose of the Good Friday experience is "not to re-enact Christ's suffering," but rather "it's the suffering of Christ in the world today," echoing the Vatican office's reminder that this is a liturgy that is present to us always.

These days, so many people are focused on the terrible suffering in Ukraine. Our own personal crosses and pains and tragedies bring us solidarity in suffering. Jesus lifts up all the pain and suffering on the Cross."

The apex of the Triduum liturgy occurs at the Easter Vigil where, after sundown in the darkened church, a new fire is used to light the Paschal Candle for the first time, bringing the Light of Christ to the world. New water is blessed and new members of the church, those who have properly studied and prepared, are welcomed during the Mass with Sacraments of Initiation.

Easter Sunday Masses continue the celebration of the Triduum which ends with Evening Prayer later that day. The celebration of the Resurrected Christ never ends, though, as we always recognize the gift that the Savior is to us with gratitude to the Father.

A note

Pastor

We should take literally the command at the end of Mass: Go in peace to love and serve the Lord! Having gathered together as the church, having


listened together to God's word and having shared the Eucharist, we are sent out to go and give to others what we have received here: fullness of life and love, justice and charity, mercy and peace. Remember sharing the sign of peace? To introduce the significant ritual gesture, the priest says the first words that the risen Christ says to the disciples on Easter evening: "I leave you peace, my peace I give you." In the gospel of John, Jesus completes His greeting of peace with these words: "As the Father has sent Me, so I send you" (John 20:21). Thus, at the end of Mass, we are sent forth by the presider or the deacon's admonition to "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord." "Thanks be to God!" we exclaim, and part of that means, "Yes, we will go, I will go, and love and serve the Lord by loving and serving the poor and those at war, the needy and the oppressed."

In one sense, this admonition and our promise is general: Having shared in this Eucharist, becoming what we have eaten and drunk, we live our whole lives in loving service of God's justice, ready to be broken like bread and poured out like wine so that others may be nourished and live. This is what St. Paul is talking about when he tells us who are baptized that we must "present [our] bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God" (Romans 12:1). Having completed our Eucharist (for the time being, until next Sunday), we must not merely think good thoughts," we must do something, we must act. In other words, we must "put our bodies on the line," whether it's the soup kitchen serving line or the protest line, whether it's going to the front line or erasing the line in the sand.

So, in another sense, the admonition to go in

peace to love and to serve, and our resulting promise, is specific: We cannot say, "OK, I'll get around to loving and serving in some way sometime this week." We should leave Mass with a certain sense of urgency: "What, precisely what, am I going to do now?"








A note Holy Spirit, the Lord and giver of life"

We say these words every time we pray the Creed and yet, the Holy Spirit is really the forgotten person of the Trinity. That quiet Presence in our lives that makes us say, "God is near me," is the Holy Spirit. Those times we stand up for what we believe and feel a Fire in us that gives us courage and strength are times when the Holy Spirit motivates us. Those times of crisis when we ask God for help are times when the Holy Spirit responds with the graces we need to get through the trouble we are in. The Holy Spirit is the God who dwells in us. God lives in us because of our Baptism. You probably never thought that Baptism still had an effect on you, but it does. Because you were baptized, God came to dwell in you, God the Holy Spirit.

It sort of puts a new spin on things doesn't it? God isn't up there in the sky; God is with us now, always. When we do good, and when we do evil, God is here. Maybe if we thought about the Holy Spirit more we'd think about how close God is to us. Maybe we wouldn't pretend so often that God was far away and not really concerned about us. Maybe we would want to be a little closer to God.

CONGRATS to those of our parish who were sealed with the Holy Spirit last weekend at St. John Cathedral—and pray for our 2nd graders who will receive Our Lord in the Eucharist next weekend.







Fifth Sunday of Easter: May 7, 2023

A note from our Pastor May devotions to Mary began in the 13th century, but there is little information to know how it was celebrated. In its present form, the practice of May

devotions to Mary originated within the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) in the 18th century under Fr. Latomia of their Roman College. Shortly afterwards, devotions were adopted at the Jesuit's mother church in Rome, the Church of the Gesù, and then began to spread throughout other area churches to the entire globe. (Pope Francis, who is also a Jesuit, has a special devotion to Mary, Undoer of Knots, a phrase first attributed to St. Irenaeus of Lyons who said, "The knot of Eve's disobedience was loosened by the obedience of Mary").

The image of Mary wearing a gold crown appears in early Eastern and Western iconography, drawing inspiration from the Coronation of Mary as understood in Catholic biblical tradition based on the passage from Revelation 12:1. Some churches and families participate in a special May Crowning celebration. Pope Clement VIII (1592-1605) first placed two crowns on the Marian icon called "Salus Populi Romani" in the Roman Basilica of St. Mary Major, but the crowns were later lost. On the Feast of the Assumption in 1838, Pope Gregory XVI once again added crowns in a special rite, officially starting the tradition as it is still performed today.

One reason the devotion has come to extend over the entire month is the abundance of Marian feast days in May: Mary, Queen of Apostles (Saturday before Pentecost – May 28th, this year), Our Lady of Fatima (May 13), Mary Help of Christians (May 24), and the Visitation (May 31).

- Seeking Peace: Pope Paul VI's encyclical was especially concerned with peace, invoking the "intercession and protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Queen of Peace" (n. 10). Amid ongoing persecutions and violence in many areas of the world, turning to Christ though Mary is an important way to pray that May becomes a month of peace.
- Honoring the Family: Mary receives an important role in Pope Francis' recent Exhortation Amoris Laetitia- The Joy of Love: On Love in the Family. He states, "Every family should look to the icon of the Holy Family of Nazareth" (n. 30). Pope Francis goes on to say, "The treasury of Mary's heart also contains the experiences of every family, which She cherishes. For this reason, She can help us understand the meaning of these experiences and to hear the message God wishes to communicate through the life of our families" (n. 30). Pope

- Francis reminds us that by honoring Mary, we honor Jesus and our families.
- Honoring the Body: Our culture and Church desperately needs the figure of Mary before our eyes as an exemplar of the dignity and uniqueness of women, especially in light of the real and present danger of pornography. The USCCB has also created a pastoral guide regarding pornography "to raise awareness of its pervasiveness and harms." This month, ask Mary's intercession for an end to this destructive force, and healing for those deeply affected.
- Honoring Your Mother: For good measure, May also celebrates our biological Mother's Day (May 8, don't forget!). Let Mary's month be a new reason to honor and celebrate your own mother.

There is no lack of reasons to stay close to Mary this month, and throughout our lives. Find ways to honor Her with your words and actions by seeking new ways to bring about mercy and peace through our churches into our hurting world.

A note from our Pastor

Have you planned your funeral yet?

While this may seem a little strange to think about, and a little depressing too, it really isn't. Because of the

resurrection of Jesus that we celebrated several weeks ago, we can be confident that death is not the end of the story. Throughout this Easter season, we've seen signs of new life everywhere - whether it's the flowering buds of a tree or the new grass growth, there is hope among us. But our hope as Christians goes far beyond the new life we encounter in nature. Our hope is in Jesus. Jesus conquered sin and death so we could live forever. We celebrate that at Easter. But we also celebrate that at a Christian's funeral. proclaims: "Therefore my heart is glad and my soul rejoices, my body, too, abides in confidence; because You will not abandon my soul to the netherworld, nor will You suffer Your faithful one to undergo corruption." This is the God we celebrate now and forever!

Sadly, when I talk to funeral directors, it seems like some of our brothers and sisters in Christ have lost the real desire to pray for and to celebrate the new life God has in store for them. There seems to be a minimalist viewpoint that says: "I don't need to do anything for me." I'm good. But when it comes to Christian funerals, the Church offers ample opportunity to pray for that person (which we need) and to pray for the loved ones left behind. That is why choosing the songs and readings for your funeral are important things to do as they help to form your last message to the world—what you believe in, and in Whom you believe.

If you navigate to http://funeral.shoj.cc you'll find a copy of our funeral planning booklet as a printable PDF document. I encourage you to download the booklet and prayerfully ponder the variety of scripture passages the ritual lists for Masses of Christian Burial. The booklet also lists the Top 40 or-so hymns frequently sung at funeral Masses; that said, if a song you desire is in our hymnal and we know it, you're welcome to choose it ... just list it on the selection page 28 of the booklet. And, if you're so inclined, offering a few written thoughts as to why you chose the scripture passages has proven very helpful as I've written homilies for those who've planning their own Mass of Christian Burial.

Lastly, should you opt plan your Mass of Christian Burial, please give me a copy and I'll keep it until it's needed. On more than one occasion, having a plan onfile has resolved familial tensions, as it spells out precisely what the deceased desired.



At the October '22 diocesan-wide clergy convocation, the question was raised about returning to the distribution of the Blood of Christ at weekend

Mass. The bishop indicated that, as a biologist, he remains concerned about the possibility of spreading COVID through the use of a common cup*. In the weeks following the convocation Bp. Malesic sent out a letter indicating that, while his concern remains unresolved, he will allow parishes to return to communion by BOTH Body and Blood of Christ if they so choose.

In the days and weeks following the Bishop's permission to return to distributing both Body and Blood of Christ I solicited the opinions of a few parishioners about communion by the cup—and all were hesitant, so I left it as status quo.

In recent weeks I've received a few inquiries about the possibility of returning to the cup – so perhaps it's time to do a more general survey of preference. That said, any decision about returning to distributing both the Body & Blood of Christ involves more than just personal preference! It also requires that a sufficient

Over the last 3-years some of our Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHCs) have stepped back from the ministry, and others have passed away. Should there be a desire to return to distributing both the Body and Blood of Christ, it will be necessary to acquire additional EMHCs. And one of the stipulations of an EMHC is that any Precious Blood remaining in the chalice after communion must be consumed. I am aware that some present EMHCs may not be comfortable with this. If you are in favor of returning to the practice of receiving both the Body and Blood of Christ at Mass under both species, I would encourage you to prayerfully consider becoming an EMHČ.

[* In the past, people have asked about the small single-use communion cups that some protestant churches use. We believe what is received at Communion is the actual Body & Blood, soul and divinity, of Christ. As such, items which contain it become sacred by use. Also, after consuming the Blood of Christ, there are droplets that remain in the chalice. Single use cups can't be properly purified of the remaining droplets of the Blood of Christ – to say nothing about not being able to reuse them, and they can't simply be discarded because they've become sacred vessels by use. Long story short, a common cup is our only option as Catholics.]

A note from our Pastor

A note In recent weeks, at both Sacred Heart and St. Pat's, I've been asked about the periods of silence at Mass.

Most of us will never forget the silence of Sept 11, 2001. Although our senses were assaulted by the sirens, alarms, confusion, & pandemonium we witnessed through the news coverage of that We watched in stunned silence as the South Tower collapsed, followed 47 minutes later by the North Tower. What amazed me was that television commentators also silence. For long periods of time, the television displayed terrible images, with almost no sound, commentary or interruption. Everyone seemed to know that words were nearly useless in the face of something so unthinkable. Silence, if you will, seemed to amplify the magnitude of what we were watching.

This is the reason the Church calls for silence, and a great deal of silence, during the Mass. Silence amplifies the reality of what we experience, and it is an appropriate response to a reality which words cannot express—in the case of the Mass, to the reality of God's presence in both Word and Eucharist.

We are invited to silence numerous times during the Mass. We are called to silent reflection:

- even before Mass begins; we need that space of time to recollect ourselves in order to enter into prayer;
- · as we recall and repent of our sins;
- after each Scriptural reading and after the homily, and;
- after we have given communal thanksgiving (by means of the Communion hymn) for the gift of the Body & Blood of Christ in the Eucharist. During this post-communion period of silence we offer a personal prayer for thanksgiving for the gift of Christ in the Eucharist.

These periods of silence are intended to bring reality into focus. At Mass we express to God our contrition, we hear His word, and we receive His physical presence sacramentally. These realities go beyond our comprehension. To hear and understand the Word of God is an

expression of His great love for us. To receive the body of Christ is the deepest kind of communion with God. The silence in the liturgy punctuates a rich and profound time of prayer with opportunities to reflect on the reality of our experience. The silence of the liturgy is a gift which helps us to understand the greatest gifts we can receive.

Silence isn't easy for any of us. The Church gives us silence in the liturgy to train our hearts and minds in silent prayer. But attentive, active, "positive silence" takes work. Often, we may find it difficult to focus. The Church encourages us to ask the Lord to help us to experience His presence. As we cultivate silence, we will begin, more frequently, to hear the voice of the Lord.

Silence points us to reality. It is a rare gift, but to understand it may take us each a lifetime. Let us give thanks for the silence of the liturgy. Let us ask the Lord to help us use it to see more clearly the reality of His magnificent and loving presence.

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: July 2, 2023



As we celebrate the 4th of July this coming Tuesday, this seems to be a good time to reflect on the true meaning of freedom.

True freedom should empower us to do what we ought to do, not just anything we may want to do. This distinction can be difficult for most of us to absorb in our American culture. We often focus on being free "from" something or someone. Our Independence Day celebrates our declaration that the 13 American colonies were no longer subject to the monarch of Britain. That is certainly worth celebrating.

Over time some have adopted a sense that freedom means we have no purpose other than to do what we want when we want — with no deeper meaning. We want to be able to do what we want unencumbered by anything or anyone.

As Christians, we have a deeper understanding of freedom. Freedom makes us responsible for our own actions. Our actions should be in accord with what is good and right. The more we choose to do what is right, the freer we become. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church: Freedom is the power, rooted in reason and will, to act or not to act, to do this or that, and so to perform deliberate actions on one's own responsibility. ... The more one does what is good, the freer one becomes. There is no true freedom except in the service of what is good and just. The choice to disobey and do evil is an abuse of freedom and leads to "the slavery of sin." (CCC 1731, 1733)

If you know someone in the grip of an addiction, you can see how this plays out. Someone might be "free" to indulge in that addiction. Yet in exercising that freedom, people would say they feel trapped, not free. They desire help to do what they know they should do, and to stop the cycle of seeming powerlessness.

When we turn away from God's perfect will, we become less than the people God wants us to be. We become freer when we follow His plan. There is a lightness in our step and a goodness that cascades forth. The alternative is a downward spiral into sin and despair.

The beauty of our faith is that we are not alone, and God gives us a remedy when we turn away from His will, when we lose our true freedom. Jesus came to set us free from sin. He forgives us and draws us into a loving relationship with God the Father. Baptism and the sacrament of reconciliation are pathways to freedom from sin.

We can grow in true freedom by growing as disciples of the Lord. We can immerse ourselves in His Word. We can treat others as we should – with dignity, respect, love, and compassion. We can use our freedom to do what is right and good. In so doing we become truly free.

May this year's celebration of our freedom lead us to reflect more deeply on how God is calling us to use our freedom in our daily lives. May He set us free so that we can do what is good and right. Happy Independence Day!



Issue 1 is a proposed amendment to the Ohio Constitution that protects our state's most important document. The ballot language, which is only 131 words, reads: ELEVATING THE STANDARDS TO QUALIFY FOR AND TO PASS ANY CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The proposed amendment would:

- Require that any proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Ohio receive the approval of at least 60 percent of eligible voters voting on the proposed amendment.
- Require that any initiative petition filed on or after January 1, 2024, with the Secretary of State proposing to amend the Constitution of the State of Ohio be signed by at least five percent of the eligible voters of each county in the state.
- Specify that additional signatures may not be added to an initiative petition filed with the Secretary of State on or after January 1, 2024, proposing to amend the Constitution of the State of Ohio.

Why are we voting in August?

The urgent need to protect Ohio from out-ofstate special interest groups, which continue to pour millions of political donations into Ohio in the hopes of changing our state Constitution, prompted the Ohio General Assembly to refer Issue 1 to the August ballot.

Issue 1 protects 30,000 unborn lives every year.

Right now, Planned Parenthood and the ACLU working to enshrine abortion up to birth, without parental consent, in our state Constitution. Issue 1 makes it more difficult for this dangerous and

deadly proposal to be inserted into our Constitution.

The abortion industry is a multi-million dollar force in America and will relentlessly spend political cash to amend our Constitution if the threshold is only 50 percent plus one. Elevating the threshold to 60 percent will establish an important protection to save the lives of unborn children and maintain parental rights.

If Planned Parenthood succeeds in amending the state Constitution, an estimated 30,000 children will lose their life at the hands of the abortion industry in Ohio every year.

<u>Issue 1 protects Ohio's Constitution from</u> out-of-state special interest agendas.

For decades, corporate interests have taken advantage of the low threshold currently required (just 50 percent of the vote plus one) to amend the Ohio Constitution.

For example, Ohioans voted against legalizing casino gambling four times in the last 20 years. Because the gambling industry only needed to get over the 50-percent threshold, their fifth attempt to lock a gambling monopoly in the state Constitution succeeded with a mere 52 percent of the vote.

Issue 1 protects our Constitution from these political games. As Ohio Senate Majority Leader Rob McColley and Representative Brian Stewart recently wrote in their official statement of support for Issue 1, "By raising the threshold for Constitutional amendments to 60 percent, the People will ensure amendments have widespread support."

<u>Issue 1 safeguards the Ohio Constitution</u> from other radical proposals.

From legalized recreational marijuana, to decriminalizing fentanyl possession, to raising taxes, to allowing sex change surgeries on minors without parental consent, to repealing election integrity laws, the ACLU and other special interest groups have publicly stated their intention to place their entire political agenda into our state Constitution.

Issue 1 aligns Ohio's constitutional amendment process more closely to the U.S. constitutional amendment process.

Our nation's Founders understood that widespread support was needed to modify the foundational charter that enumerates our rights as U.S. citizens. That's why amending the U.S. Constitution requires a supermajority: two-thirds of the vote in both chambers of Congress and three-fourths of the state legislatures. As a result, the U.S. Constitution has approximately 7,500 words. In comparison, the Ohio Constitution has more than 67,000.

In most other states, greater protections are in place to ensure Constitutional amendments have broad support before being enshrined in the state's most crucial document. Ohio is one of only 10 states that allows a simple majority to amend the Constitution.

Issue 1 preserves existing voter rights.

Issue 1 ensures voters still have the ability to pass new laws or change existing Ohio law by a simple majority, while ensuring that the more weighty Constitutional changes require greater, more widespread support to be enacted.

Issue 1 does not change the initiated statute process, which allows voters to collect signatures and place an issue on the ballot to

change Ohio law (as opposed to the Constitution). Issue 1 also does not affect the referendum process, which voters can use to repeal a law passed by the General Assembly.

Also, Issue 1 does not change or affect any voter's ability to register to vote or go to the polls.

FYI: While the Bishops of Ohio have not taken any position on Issue 1 in the August 2023 election, the Diocese of Cleveland has received complaints about parishes that have chosen to remain silent on the topic—as well as complaints about parishes that have chosen to address the issue.

While you are free to vote as you choose, I felt it was important to offer some material to ponder as you prepare to vote. All material offered for reflection was obtained at a diocesan meeting for priests on 6/29 concerning the August & November elections.

In November '22, Bp. A note Malesic gave parishes within the Diocese of Cleveland permission distributing

Blood of Christ at Mass. Informal consultation at that time resulted in an overall negative response – and so we didn't

invoke the option.

Last month I did a more universal survey via the bulletin about returning to the distribution of the Eucharist under both species (Body and Blood), and the results have trickled in. The results are two-fold:

- There is mild interest in returning to communion under both species, AND
- We do not have sufficient active Eucharistic Ministers to invoke this option.

In order to offer the Blood of Christ at weekend Mass, we're in need of additional Eucharist Ministers. In order to serve as a Eucharistic Minister, one needs to: have received the sacrament of Confirmation, and; if married in the church (anyone married outside the Church, or who might be cohabitating, needs to be married in the Church in order to be eligible to serve as a Eucharistic Minister). Preparation for this ministry involves a parish orientation as well as a Diocesan training (which takes place in the fall at various parishes throughout the diocese).

If you're interested in serving as a Eucharistic Minister at Mass, please contact me so we can discuss this further - and hopefully get things in process for a return to distribution of the Eucharist under both

species.

At such a time as we have sufficient Eucharist Ministers to afford the opportunity to offer the Blood of Christ at weekend Masses, we'll return to the practice of offering both the Body and Blood of Christ.

On their survey, several people: Is permissible to dip the host into the Precious Blood – rather than drinking from the cup. The one-word answer is: NO. The longer answer is multi-faceted:

• We only ever "receive" the Eucharist; we never "take" the Eucharist. That's

- why, when we come forward, it is either placed in the hand or on the tongue; it is never grabbed or taken. (Over the last 37 years I've gotten rather proficient at circumnavigating any reaching fingers as I go right for the tongue ... when someone attempts to grab the Eucharist).
- · Receiving the Body of Christ in the hand, and then attempting to TAKE the Blood of Christ by dipping the Body into the Blood, is inappropriate and disallowed because of the element of "taking." Beyond the issue of taking, there is the sanitary issue of ones fingers actually contacting the Blood of Christ ... as well as the potential of dripping the Blood of Christ onto the floor as one would attempt to move the host from chalice to mouth. Thus for a whole plethora of reasons, one is NEVER allowed to dip the Body of Christ into the Blood of Christ.

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Transfiguration of the Lord: August 6, 2023



As you've likely noticed, todáy's Mass empted the typical 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time so we could celebrate the Solemnity of the

Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor. Here's a bit of

background about this Solemnity:

The Solemnity of the Transfiguration of our Lord became widespread in the western (Roman Rite) church in the 11th century and was introduced into the Roman calendar in 1457. Before that, the Transfiguration of the Lord was celebrated in the Syrian, Byzantine, and Coptic rites. The Transfiguration foretells the glory of the Lord as God, and His Ascension into heaven. It anticipates the glory of heaven, where we shall see God face to face. Through grace, we already share in the divine promise of eternal life.

The well-revered publication *Butler's Lives* of the Saints (1894 edition) offers the following

reflections on The Transfiguration:

Our divine Redeemer, being in Galilee about a year before His Passion, took with Him St. Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, James and John, and led them to a mountain. Tradition assures us that this was Mount Tabor, which is exceedingly high and beautiful, and was anciently covered with green trees and shrubs, and was very fruitful. It rises in a vast plain in the middle of Galilee.

While Jesus prayed He experienced that glory which was always His, but of which He willingly deprived Himself for our sake. His face was altered and shone as the sun, and His garments became white as snow. Moses and Elijah were seen by the three apostles in His company on this occasion, and were heard discoursing with Him of the death which He was to suffer in Jerusalem.

The three apostles were wonderfully delighted with this glorious vision, and St. Peter cried out to Christ, "Lord, it is good for us to be here. Let us make three tents: one for Thee, one for Moses, and one for Elias" While St. Peter was speaking, there came, on a sudden, a bright shining cloud from heaven, an emblem of the presence of God's majesty, and from out of this cloud was heard a voice which said, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; listen to Him." The apostles that were present, upon hearing this voice, were seized with a sudden fear, and fell upon the ground; but Jesus, going to them, touched

them, and told them to rise. They immediately did so, and saw no one but Jesus standing in His ordinary state.

This vision happened in the night. As they went down the mountain early the next morning, Jesus bade them not to tell anyone what they had seen till He should be risen from

the dead.

In the Transfiguration Christ enjoyed for a short while that glorified state which was to be permanently His after His Resurrection on Easter Sunday. The splendor of His inward Divinity and of the Beatific Vision of His soul overflowed on His body, and permeated His garments so that Christ stood before Peter, James, and John in a snow-white brightness. The purpose of the Transfiguration was to encourage and strengthen the Apostles who were depressed by their Master's prediction of His own Passion and Death. The Apostles were made to understand that His redeeming work has two phases: The Cross, and glory—and that we shall be glorified with Him only if we first suffer with Him.



celebration, here's a bit of background on this feast...


On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of Her earthly life, was assumed body and soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various Commemoration, names Dormition, Passing, Assumption – from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Assumption Mary's into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testaments, Her Assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in His glorification. So close was She to Jesus on earth, She must be with Him body and soul in heaven.

"But I'm a good A note person!" Or so goes one of a myriad of common excuses for common excuses for why someone doesn't need to qo confession.

Confessina wrongdoings our antithetical to the human problem of pride; we like to keep our sins to ourselves, and we definitely don't like to admit when we're wrong. When a Catholic — lapsed or otherwise — is encouraged to go to confession, another common response like the aforementioned one may be, "But I didn't kill anyone today! Why do I need to go to confession?" Or for a non-Catholic, there may be a hang-up on telling a priest one's sins because "I can just go straight to God." True as this may be, St. Paul tells us to confess our sins to one another, meaning they are not meant to be bottled up inside they are meant to be expunded.

The biblical reasons for confession are many, but even on a practical level, it makes sense that we would need to tell our sins to another human being every once in a while (for practicing Catholics, the Church requires a good "expungement" at least once a year, but I recommend 2-to-4 times a year; perhaps seasonally). After all, this is where the Sacrament of Reconciliation gets its namesake we must be reconciled to God for our wrongdoings against him and against others.

Of course, the beautiful thing about confession is that when we confess our sins to a priest, we are really telling them directly to The Catechism says this confession: "Christ has willed that in her prayer and life and action his whole Church should be the sign and instrument of the forgiveness and reconciliation that he acquired for us at the price of his blood. But he entrusted the exercise of the power of absolution to the apostolic ministry which he charged with the 'ministry of reconciliation.' The apostle is sent out 'on behalf of Christ' with 'God making his appeal' through him and reconciled to God''' (CCC 1442). pleading:

Think of the last time you got into an argument with a close friend or family member. Maybe you said something you didn't mean. Perhaps you acted a bit irrationally. In doing so, maybe you caused a rift in the order to relationship. In repair relationship, a conversation needs to happen;

you need to admit your wrongdoings, the other party needs to admit theirs, and you need to forgive one another. Forgiveness, however, requires mercy. This is essentially what happens between us and God in confessional: we make things right with God.

So while it's true that you probably are a "good person" and that you, in fact, didn't manage to kill anyone today, that's not really the point of confession. Confession is how we tangibly receive forgiveness from the Lord for our transgressions, and trust me: we all need it. There is absolutely nothing we could do on our own to merit God's mercy, and we need it even for the tiniest of trespasses.

And therein lies the ultimate purpose of confession: We don't deserve God's mercy, but he gives it to us anyways. No sin is too big or small for God. His grace is always there, ready to be freely given to us; what's stopping you from receiving it?

The fiscal year A note throughout the Diocese of Cleveland runs from July 1 from our Pastor through June 30. Over the years, the Diocese has

continued to hone their oversight and tracking of parish financials. At present, the parish sends quarterly reports to the Diocese, and an extensive end-of-year report, once the books are closed on June 30th. The report we submit to the Diocese automatically generates a report that is intended to be shared with the parish—so everyone has a sense of the financial wherewithal of the parish; that report is enclosed in this weekend's bulletin.

The budget for the current fiscal year is also part of the report. My preference is to be conservative financially, so income estimated close to FY2023 actuals. and expenditures were estimated higher FY2023 actuals. Yet even with that approach, we anticipate being in the black for FY2024.

Your generosity over the past many years has enabled us to prudently put money into savings and investments. Although the total assets appear quite healthy when compared to your home budgets, expenditures of the parish are also far higher than yours at home. We recently spent ~\$25k just on roof repairs. The LG heat pumps (providing heat & AC) hasn't been produced in ~10 years, and parts are no longer available. Their replacement, so we can still cool the place in the summer, is an upcoming expense.

My intention is to be prudent and plan for future needs, so that when we need to shell out a large chunk of change for unplanned repairs, I don't need to turn to you out of desperation. My goal is to say: "We planned for that, thanks to you!" So, please don't look at our assets and reduce your donations; rest assured that they will continue to be put to good use for present and future needs.

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time: September 3, 2023



On this Labor Day A note weekend most of us take a break from what we refer to as our "jobs" in order to rest and recreate. We are invited

to honor human work and all human workers. It is a unique secular holiday with profound Christian potential. Many will gather for late summer cookouts and celebrations. We may sleep in a bit later than usual and relax from what is so often a frenzied pace in our contemporary pattern of life.

For many parents, Labor Day weekend marks a transition from the hectic pace of the summer to the new hectic pace of the school year. For students and teachers, it is also a portal into the new school year when we begin the work of education, a word whose Latin root means to "draw out" of the student what is good. Through authentically Christian education we are all invited to be drawn out into a fuller way of life.

For Christians, Labor Day invites us to examine how we view our own labor in the light of what the Scriptures and the teaching Church proclaims about the dignity of all human work, no matter what kind, precisely because it is done by human persons who are created in the Image and Likeness of God.

In 1981 John Paul released an Encyclical letter entitled "On Human Work" which beautifully presents a Christian vision of the dignity of human work and the worker. In the introductory paragraph he wrote: "Work means any activity by man, whether manual intellectual, whatever its nature circumstances; it means any human activity that can and must be recognized as work, in the midst of all the many activities of which man is capable and to which he is predisposed by his very nature, by virtue of humanity itself. Man is made to be in the visible universe an image and likeness of God himself, and he is placed in it in order to subdue the earth."

"From the beginning therefore he is called to work. Work is one of the characteristics that distinguish man from the rest of creatures, whose activity for sustaining their lives cannot be called work. Only man is capable of work, and only man works, at the same time by work occupying his existence on earth. Thus work bears a particular mark of man and of humanity, the mark of a person operating within a community of persons. And this mark decides its interior characteristics; in a sense it constitutes its very nature."

A Catholic Christian vision of work views it in light of the Incarnation of Jesus Christ: God became a human person! The early Church Father, Gregory the Theologian (Nazianzus), reflecting on the Incarnation, proclaimed "Whatever was not assumed was not healed!" The insight has the potential to revolutionize the way we view our own work!

The early Christians knew the dignity of all human work. Even their early worship became known as "liturgy" which literally meant the "work" of the Church. For them, the real world was not a place to be avoided - it was their workshop! They were there to bring all of its inhabitants to Baptism and inclusion in Christ and then prepare the real world for His Real return, through their prayer, their witness, their worship and their work.

Let us ask the Holy Spirit to renew our minds concerning all human work. (Romans 12:2) When Jesus ascended He promised He would not "leave us orphans". (John 14:8) Jesus now lives in us and we now live in Him, through the Holy Spirit. He has made it possible for us to begin to live our entire life differently, every single day, through the grace which is poured out through the Holy Spirit. We are living in an age which desperately needs a vibrant living Christian witness of the dignity, meaning and true value of all human work - one which is rooted in a rediscovery of the dignity of the human person. Let's offer it to them by living a Christian approach to work in our own daily lives.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Peace be with you! As Catholics, we are committed to protecting the sanctity of human life no matter the circumstances or stage of development. We live this out by, among other things, accompanying the poor and needy, refugees and immigrants, prisoners on death row, young mothers, and children.

In Ohio, the dignity of life in its earliest stages is threatened by groups proposing an amendment to Ohio's Constitution for the November 2023 ballot that would enshrine and expand abortion at the expense of protections for preborn children and women. The Church must not be silent and cannot remain on the sidelines when confronted with such a clear threat to human life. This proposal demands a response, and we strongly encourage Catholics and all people of good will in Ohio to work against including the proposed amendment for the November ballot and, if it appears on the ballot, vote against the amendment to prevent countless deaths of preborn, innocent children.

Our Holy Father Pope Francis reminds us that "Our defense of the innocent unborn ... needs to be clear, firm and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development" (Gaudete et Exsultate, no. 101). Our commitment to protecting and promoting life includes providing resources and accompanying women during and after pregnancy through our numerous social service agencies, schools, and parishes. This commitment also includes rejecting abortion expansion, which only perpetuates a throwaway culture that does not value human life.

The Catholic Conference of Ohio will be

collaborating with statewide organizations, and diocesan respect life offices will be seeking volunteers to help coordinate a campaign at every parish. More information and materials will become available as we mobilize to oppose the proposed amendment on the November 2023 ballot.

We, the Catholic Bishops of Ohio, stand with you, our faithful, in our commitment in the name of the Lord of Life, to each human person from conception to natural death. Let us unite in fasting and offering this prayer:

God our loving Father, grant wisdom to those who govern us, compassion and courage to those who work to defend human life, and safety and care to every human being. For you alone who formed us in our mothers' wombs, and who call us home to heaven, are God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Writing a reflection article on a Monday is always iffy, especially when one addresses events that are to happen later in the week.

In early May of this year, I did an out-of-the-blue search on Facebook Marketplace for *hymnal racks*. We've never had hymnal holders at Sacred Heart, and have always distributed/collected hymnals at our entryways. While that has worked, it does cause excessive wear-and-tear on the paperback books—which is why we need to have plastic covers on them.

Imagine my surprise when I found an ad for about 70 of them; 45 longer ones and around 25 shorter ones; the lot of them cost \$180. I made the trek to the Youngstown area and filed my trunk with them. Then I called Dave Ockenga (who crafted our hymn board and the *ambry* by the baptistry) to see if he'd be willing to use his skills to craft the remainder we'd need to put 2 hymnal racks per pew; he was more than happy to oblige (recruiting the services of Mark McKinley as well), but would prefer to have 3 hymnal racks per pew. I didn't refuse his offer. Over several weeks Dave and Mark refinished the holders I'd purchased, and crafted and stained the holders they made.

This past week, Dan Clark (a parishioner who is a wood-worker as well as PSR Catechist, among other things) worked with Mark McKinley to affix the hymnal holders to the backs of the pews. [And, if complications arose which precluded this from happening as anticipated, then they'll be affixed in the near future.]

The book shelves in the main and side entryways will not remain empty for long, however. Some of the 688 books that comprise our parish library will be placed in the empty shelves. You'll be welcome to peruse and borrow any book on the honor-system. And if browsing our inventory in person isn't convenient for you, our holdings are cataloged and available ONLINE at:

From the online listing of holdings you can search by: title, rating, publication year, or Dewey number. Any holding not on the entryway shelves will be on the library shelves in the sacristy.

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time October 8, 2023



The Bishop's of Ohio have put together a document concerning the proposed Constitutional Amendment that CATHOLIC will be on the November ballot.; CONFERENCE OF OHIO they quote the amendment, and then offer their concern regarding its verbiage.

The proposed Constitutional Amendment reads as follows:

ARTICLE I, SECTION 22 The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety

- 1. Every individual has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on contraception, fertility treatment, continuing one's own pregnancy, miscarriage care, and abortion.
- 2. The State shall not, directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either an individual's voluntary exercise of this right or a person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right, unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.
- 3. However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health.
- 4. As used in this Section, "Fetal viability" means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis"; and "State" includes any governmental entity and political subdivision.

The Bishop's, who are adhering Catholic moral teaching, have voice their objections to the ways in which the proposed amendment is directly opposed to our Catholic beliefs and moral teachings; their objections to the colored sections of the document are as follows:

This verbiage THREATENS PARENTAL

RIGHTS. By using "individual" instead of adult or woman, anyone under the age of 18 could have an abortion or make any other reproductive decision without their parents' consent or notification.

This language PUTS WOMEN AT RISK. Current Ohio laws (Ohio Revised Code, sections 2317.56 & 3702.303) require abortion providers to explain procedure risks and ensure access to hospital transfer if needed. These health and safety standards could be seen as a "burden" and be eliminated, making it even less safe for women seeking an abortion.

This text ALLOW ABORTIONS THROUGH 9 MONTHS OF PREGNANCY. In U.S. law (based on Doe v. Bolton), "health" includes age or physical, emotional, or psychological well-being. This means a woman's age or emotional health could be cited to justify aborting a full-term baby. An abortion-providing physician would decide when a baby could survive outside the womb, leaving no clear protections for preborn children.

Lastly, inclusion IS this Vote \ C MISLEADING. Referring to "miscarriage care" promotes a myth that a "right to abortion" is necessary to preserve care for miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. This is false. Catholic hospitals always provided comprehensive miscarriage care and will continue to do so regardless of the outcome of this vote.



This article was in the bulletin a few weeks ago right before early voting began; it is reprinted here for those who will be voting in-person on Tuesday.

The Bishop's of Ohio have put together a document concerning the CATHOLIC proposed Constitutional Amendment conference of ohio that will be on the November ballot.; they quote the amendment, and then offer their concern regarding its verbiage.

The proposed Constitutional Amendment reads as follows:

ARTICLE I, SECTION 22 The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety

- 1. Every individual has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on contraception, fertility treatment, continuing one's own pregnancy, miscarriage care, and abortion.
- 2. The State shall not, directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either an individual's voluntary exercise of this right or a person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right, unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.
- 3. However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health.
- 4. As used in this Section, "Fetal viability" means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis"; and "State" includes any governmental entity and political subdivision.

The Bishop's, who are adhering Catholic moral teaching, have voice their objections to the ways in

which the proposed amendment is directly opposed to our Catholic beliefs and moral teachings; their objections to the colored sections of the document are as follows:

This verbiage THREATENS PARENTAL

RIGHTS. By using "individual" instead of adult or woman, anyone under the age of 18 could have an abortion or make any other reproductive decision without their parents' consent or notification.

This language PUTS WOMEN AT RISK. Current Ohio laws (Ohio Revised Code, sections 2317.56 & 3702.303) require abortion providers to explain procedure risks and ensure access to hospital transfer if needed. These health and safety standards could be seen as a "burden" and be eliminated, making it even less safe for women seeking an abortion.

This text **ALLOW ABORTIONS** THROUGH 9 MONTHS OF PREGNANCY. In U.S. law (based on Doe v. Bolton), "health" includes age or physical, emotional, or psychological well-being. This means a woman's age or emotional health could be cited to Vote NO justify aborting a full-term baby. An abortion-providing physician would decide when a baby could survive outside the womb, leaving no clear protections for preborn children.

Lastly, this inclusion IS MISLEADING. Referring to "miscarriage care" promotes a myth that a "right to abortion" is necessary to preserve care for miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. This is false. Catholic hospitals have always provided comprehensive miscarriage care and will continue to do so regardless of the outcome of this vote.

A personal invitation to come to Mass is critical. During the pandemic, when we couldn't gather together for fear of infecting others, many withdrew from Mass. Although it felt awkward at first, as with all behaviors, the longer you do them the more comfortable they become. And there are still many who remain comfortable away from Christ in the Eucharist. Your gentle invite and/or prodding may be just what they need to return to Mass—so they can be nourished by Christ in His Word and the Eucharist.

As for the Christmas schedule, you'll notice we are no longer scheduling a Christmas Eve 6pm Mass. For the last several years that Mass had the least attendance of the four Christmas Masses, and so has been dropped. Henceforth, as we alternate

the parish that hosts the 4pm &... Christmas Eve Mass, we'll follow the mindset that the other parish will have the Christmas Night and Christmas Masses. (And, yes, the Christmas schedule will be Christmas printed on your envelope).

As we are on the doorstep of closing out another liturgical year, our readings in recent weeks have focused on the end

times. Well, sooner or later, each one of us will encounter our end-time ... but will we be prepared for it when it arrives?

While it is common practice to meet with a funeral director to pre-plan your funeral, it is not nearly as common to prayerfully plan ones Mass of Christian Burial. While some might think pre-planning to be a morbid thought, it has many beneficial aspects to it. Two that immediately come to mind are:

- · When you plan your own Mass of Christian Burial, those who come to the Mass are participating in a prayer that you planned - rather than a prayer that was planned for you; there is something powerful about listening to scripture passages singing hymns that were particularly meaningful to you. often ask those who've planned their own funeral to give me a brief synopsis of what was meaningful about the scriptures they chose - as I find that particularly helpful when putting together the homily for the Christian a Mass of Burial.)
- Mindful that some families grieve differently than others, tensions have been known to arise funeral concerning arrangements. On than more one occasion familial tensions have been quelled by my telling them that: "This is a copy of the planning sheet your father/ other gave me several years ago, at which time they requested"

I would encourage you, regardless of your age or youthfulness, to prayerfully ponder and plan your Mass of Christian Burial – and then share a copy of that planning sheet and your reflections on the scriptures with me; we'll keep it on file at the parish until such a time as it is needed or you request it back.

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Third Sunday of Advent December 17, 2023





Today, the third Sunday of A note Advent is called 'Guadete Sunday' which means 'Joy' or Rejoice'. The opening antiphon for today's liturgy

asks us to *Rejoice in the Lord always; again I* say rejoice. Indeed the Lord is near. Today, on our Advent Wreath we light our pink candle to mark this day of joy.

St. Paul's advice and encouragement from the first reading today gives this third Sunday of Advent its traditional name *Gaudete Sunday*. Joy is the central message of our readings and prayers this Sunday, and indeed the whole of Advent and the celebration of Christ.

One of the most well-known Christmas carols is 'Joy to world.' The words to this carol were written by Isaac Watts in 1719. At Christmas it will be sung all over the world. The music for it comes from Handel's 'Messiah.'

The first words that Mary hears when She is told that She is going to be the mother of Jesus are, 'Rejoice, so highly favored.' Mary is to be filled with joy because God has called Her by Her name and Her son will be the long awaited Messiah. When She goes to see Elizabeth, Her cousin, She breaks into song, singing out loudly, 'My souls proclaims the greatness of the Lord, My spirit rejoices in God My savior'. Mary does not keep Her good news or Her joy to Herself, She freely shares them with Elizabeth and the whole world. When the angels appeared to the shepherds they heard this life-giving message, 'Do not be afraid, I bring you news of great joy. The good news of Jesus' birth is meant not only for the shepherds, it continues to be good news for each of us today.

Up until recently we prayed these words after the Our Father, 'as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ. Although the translation has changed, this is still central message of Advent. We are called to wait for the birth of Jesus and we are to wait in hope joyfully. As we wait, we are not to be afraid, anxious or worried; we are to wait in joyful hope. Why? Because, as the opening antiphon tells us, 'The Lord is very near.'

Like Mary who shared Her joy with Elizabeth, today each of us is asked to be a person of joy and we are asked to share that joy with others.

There are many people, some of whom we may even know, who have little reason to be joyful at this time of the year. As Mary did with Elizabeth, may we follow Her example and share our joy with all those we meet during these last few days and weeks of Advent. May we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Our Advent journey reaches a climax with Mary's Story and Mary's "Yes". Through Her hearing and accepting God's word

and message for Her, the long awaited promise made to David and to each of us will be fulfilled.

Our God is not distant or silent; God is very close to us. God's dwelling place is humanity. God will take His place among us through Mary. God's temple is Mary. Filled with the Holy Spirit and open to God's will for Her, Mary becomes God's dwelling place. Through Her faith, Her courage and Her Yes, God will become flesh and live among us. In the face, voices and actions of Jesus we experience God. God has no need for temples; God dwelling place is the human heart.

Like Mary, we too are temples of God, Do you not realize that you are a temple of God and that the Spirit of God is living in you; and God's temple is holy and you are that temple. (1 Cor. 16)

Like Mary, through our baptism we are filled with the same Holy Spirit. As we live out our faith through our ordinary daily lives, God becomes real in and for the world today. All God asks is that we follow Mary's example and say "YES". Through our YES today in our families, our homes, in our community and with our friends, we can build the Kingdom of God and make God's love real and visible.

In our first reading today we read that the temple that David wanted to build God would not last forever. The true temple of God is our heart. God's love and life have been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit who has been given to us (Rom 5.5), God has both anointed us and marked us with His seal and giving us the Spirit in our hearts. (2 Cor. 1.22).

Mary was not asked to bear God's Son by Herself or rely solely on Her own efforts. And neither are we. God gives us the strength and courage to follow Mary's example. Just as Mary heard and listened to God's words for Her, we too are asked to open our hearts and lives to God. Through our own daily lives may we say YES to God as Mary did, so that God will become flesh and live among us this Christmas.


Just as God called and chose Mary, God

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church The Nativity of the Lord December 25, 2023

Christmas Day is finally here; the cleaning is done, the tree is fully lit and decorated, and all the presents have been brought and wrapped. Now it's time to rest, relax and rejoice!

So what have the last four weeks of being-busy and preparation been about? Christmas, which lasts for twelve full days, is about **Remembering and Celebrating.**

So, what are we remembering? We are recalling how, where and when Jesus was born. We retell this story through prayers and reading the gospels; we sing ancient and traditional Christmas Carols which keep the story of the birth of Jesus in our hearts and minds. We may take a few minutes over the next few days to stop and stand silently in front of the crib or <mark>manger, either in our h</mark>omes or in our parish church. We see the familiar scene of a young homeless couple and their new born child; they are surrounded by animals and the shepherds who came to see this family because God's messenger, the Angel, proclaimed to them; 'Do not be afraid, I bring you news of great joy. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born you; He is Christ the Lord.'

So after remembering, we then celebrate, and rightly so. We have cleaned and decorated our homes; we with friends, families neighbors and we share a meal. We recall Christmas' past, and we remember those who are no longer with us. Why do we keep these and other ancient traditions? At the heart of Christmas is what God does for us. Through the birth of Jesus, it is not just that we come close to God; God comes close to each of us personally and intimately in the face and voice of Jesus, His Son. In the dark of winter, Jesus, the Light of World comes and shares God's very life with us. Pope Gregory the Great, who died in 640 AD, said, 'O Christian, be aware of your dignity, it is God's own life that you now share.' This is great meaning, magic and mystery of Christmas.

The challenge for each is that we don't just think of Christmas and the birth of Jesus as something that happened a long time ago in a far off country. Christmas happens in our hearts, our homes, our families and our community when we reach out in compassion and love to each other as Jesus loves each of us. Through our words and actions, we are called to make real in our own daily lives the love Jesus has for us. The birth of Jesus cannot remain in the past. It must happen now, today and every day, not only for us, but through us!

Herry Christmas!

Advent — the wonderful season of anticipation to celebrate Jesus' human birth, the second step, after Mary's Fiat, in the greatest event in history, our salvation. Recognizing humankind's inability to offer adequate recompense for

Adan's egregious sin, Jesus gave up the riches of Heaven: "He became poor to make us rich." Christmas, although sullied in many respects by the market place, will be eternally celebrated by grateful Christians everywhere. A Holy, Blessed, and Merry Christmas to all!

A note gather around the Holy Family: Mary, Joseph and Jesus. It is through com our Pastor this poor family that God's love for each of

us and the whole world is revealed and experienced. God did not come to us in power, glory, wealth or majesty; God chose to come close to us and become one of us through Mary who said 'Yes' when She was asked to be with Mother of Jesus. When Joseph was uncertain what to do, he heard these words of hope and encouragement: "'Joseph, Son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary into your home as your wife, because She has conceived what is in Her by the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son and you must name Him Jesus."

We often forget that Joseph was also called by God and he too said 'Yes'. Jesus, their Son 'is the one who is to save His people from their sins.' Jesus is the face and voice of God. Jesus comes to bring the Good News to Poor. Jesus is the Light of the World, the Bread of Life and the Good Shepherd. He will become the Suffering Servant who will give His life for us. Today is also a special time for us to remember and celebrate our own sacred families. Let us remember these three words.

As we celebrate the Holy (not perfect, but the Holy) Family of Nazareth, let us also remember and pray for those families that have difficulty saying "may I," "thank you," and "sorry." Through our prayers, may they know and feel the loving protection of Mary, Joseph and, their Son, Jesus Christ—the Holy Family.
