

The word 'January' comes from the name a Roman god; Janus. His statue had two faces; one that looked backwards and the other forward. The Romans believed that this was the appropriate time to give thanks for what had passed and to be hopeful for what lies ahead. We keep this ancient tradition alive when we let go of the old year and make new year's resolutions. For what am I thankful from last year? Am I beginning this new year with faith, hope and optimism?


Today as we celebrate the Epiphany, we recall that Jesus is born for everyone and the whole universe. The word 'Epiphany' means to show or to reveal; the curtain is pulled back and all is now revealed to us. God is not distant, silent or remote. God is with us personally in the very person of Jesus. When Jesus speaks, we hear God speaking; when we see the face of Jesus as the Magi did, it is God eyes into which we look. No one is outside the loving gaze or embrace of God through the person and presence of Jesus.

Beginning something new can fill us with anxiety, especially a new year. We don't know what will happen to us or what lies ahead of us. But we are not our own; God is with us. There is the modern parable about the woman who was worried about the new year. She prayed to God saying.; 'Lord, give me a light so that I can find my way as this year starts.' There was silence. Then she heard God say, 'No, I will not give you a light. You take my hand and we will walk into the new year together.' We are not our own as we continue this New Year.

The Nativity and the Epiphany call us to remember and celebrate the deep mystery and reality that God is with us in the most personal and intimate way possible. To

repeat, God is now no longer distant, remote or silent. St. Paul's letter to the Colossians reminds us of this and encourages us with these profound words: it is Christ in you, the hope for glory! (Col 1:27b)

When the shepherds looked at they Jesus, saw



someone like themselves who later said, I am the Good Shepherd. When these visitors from East offered their gifts, they too saw one like themselves, who later said, *Yes, I am King.* Take some time these days to look into crib; who and what do you see? Do you see yourself in this child's face? Do you see someone like just like you?

As Pope Leo the Great reminds us; O Christian be aware of your dignity and nobility, it is God's own life that you now share.



Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Second Sunday in Ordinary Time January 14, 2024



As Jesus walked by minding His business, John pointed at those who were with Him, 'Look

there is the Lamb of God.' They dropped everything they were doing, left John and followed Jesus. Before they could speak or say anything, Jesus turned, looked at them and asked a very direct and personal question; 'What are you looking for?'

What a question! Jesus wasted no time in getting to the heart of the matter. They responded with a question of their own, 'Master, where do you live? This question was not about directions or an address. They really wanted to know who Jesus is and where He comes from. In response, Jesus did not give them directions or an address. He offered them an invitation, *`Come and see.'* This was a very open and a very challenging invitation; it was then and still is today.

Jesus did not force them to follow Him. He did not insist that they go with Him. He simply said to them that if they wanted to know who He is, then they were welcome to go with Him and spend some time with Him. The best way to get to know a person is to spend time with them. And so, we are told that they went with Him, saw where He lived and stayed with Him the rest of the day. We can only guess that they ate with Jesus, they spoke to Him and that they listened to Him. After their time with Jesus, we are told that one of them, Andrew, went and told his brother, Peter, about Jesus and actually brought him to meet Jesus. Andrew became a missionary disciple. He shared with Peter what he himself experienced from being with Jesus.

Are we so different from these people in the gospel? Every day Jesus offers us the same open invitation, 'Come and see.' Jesus wants to be with us so we too can spend some time with Him. The choice whether or not we accept this invitation and follow Jesus is ours to make. He will

not force us or make us follow Him. It has to be our choice. If we do follow Jesus, then we are going to be changed, just as Andrew was. You can't experience Jesus and stay the same. Andrew didn't keep to himself the experience of being with Jesus and neither can we. We are called by Jesus to share our good news about Him with others. That's what being a disciple means. Today each of us is being called by Jesus to become a missionary disciple.

The best way we can talk to Jesus and listen to Him is through prayer. We can read the gospels, pray the rosary, go to mass or we can simply light a candle in our kitchen and sit in silence. Through our prayer, we hear the invitation of Jesus. When He says, 'Come and see,' what is your response?



Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Third Sunday in Ordinary Time January 21, 2024



Today we begin our trek through the Gospel of Mark. John the Baptist has been arrested and Jesus is beginning to proclaim the Good News

from God.

Jesus is beginning His public ministry and so He starts to call people to follow Him. Jesus always made a point of meeting and calling people wherever He found them. He met and called Matthew the tax collector when he was counting his money. He met and called the woman when she came to the well for water.

In the gospel this Sunday Jesus meets people while they doing their ordinary daily work of fishing and mending their nets on the sea shore. They weren't on their knees praying in the temple or the synagogue. Jesus called these men by their given names, so He must have seen them before and known them. Today in the same way, Jesus continues to call us by our name. In the Old Testament, there are two beautiful pieces of scripture through which God says, I have called you by your name, you are Mine and that I have written your name on the palms of My hands. This is how personally and intimately God knows and loves each of us.

Jesus calls us wherever we are, regardless of who are. Each of is called by Jesus. He breaks into our world through our ordinary daily lives and activities. Jesus has not stopped calling people to follow Him. Today we are the ones He looks at, calls by name and says, 'Come follow Me.' Those in the gospel dropped everything they were doing and followed Jesus when He called them. This was all very sudden and dramatic. Our response may not be as quick and decisive, but it doesn't need to be; we all follow Jesus at our own pace, in our time, and in our own way.

The important thing to remember and realize is that Jesus never stops calling us by our name. He is still inviting us to follow Him with these words, if you want to be disciple, come, take up your cross and follow Me.

After Jesus called these men and women to follow He sent them out in His name to proclaim the good news of the Kingdom of God. He sent them out in His name, not their own. Today we are the ones who are not only called, we are also

sent out to proclaim the gospel through how we live; through what we say and what do.

This very day Jesus is calling you by your name; how will *you* respond?

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time January 28, 2024



A note gospels, we know that Jesus was great speaker and wonderful storyteller. So good at

this was He, that Peter even once said, 'Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life.' Jesus always knew His audience and to whom He was speaking. He spoke about seeds being sowed, He talked about sheep and shepherds, wine and vineyards and He even spoke about a woman baking bread! Perhaps that is why in this Sunday's gospel we read that 'the people were astonished at His teaching, for He taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes.' What Jesus offered the people then, and to us today, is Good News—not fake news!

But it is not only what Jesus says that makes an impact on the people, it also what He does. In the gospel this Sunday, Jesus heals a man who is sick with an unclean spirit. At the time of Jesus, to be sick was seen as punishment by God because the person was a sinner. When Jesus healed the man, the gathered people were even more amazed at what He did rather than just what He said. If this Jesus could heal a man and forgive him his sins, then who is He? They have heard Him speak with authority and they have seen Him heal a man who was sick; their response to experiencing Jesus is 'What is this? A new teaching – with authority!

As we continue through these early days and weeks of this New Year, it seems appropriate that Jesus offers us something that is radically new. What is this 'new' message that Jesus offers us? The intimate presence of God in our midst!

There is the story that tells of a man praying to change his ways and begin anew; he is worried, afraid and anxious about the road ahead. So he prays to God saying, 'Lord,

give me a light so that I may walk into my new way of life without fear of failure. 'His prayer was initially met with silence. But after a period of silence, God spoke and said, 'No, I will not give you a light. Instead, you take my hand and we will walk into your future together.'

As we're already 1/12th of the way through 2024, and our New Years' Resolutions were likely long-ago discarded, will you take the opportunity to attempt those resolutions again—but this time, hand-in-hand with the Lord?

Friday's of lent. Additionally, the practice of **fasting** (eating smaller meals) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday is obligatory for those age 14-59 ... but is encouraged of others—so long as it doesn't post a risk to your health.

Although Ash Wednesday is NOT a Holy Day, many opt to being the Lenten season by coming to Mass. Two options for Mass on Ash Wednesday are:

Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church First Sunday of Lent February 18, 2024



A note
Pastor

Strange as it may seem to us so soon after Advent and Christmas, but this is the first Sunday of Lent. On Ash Wednesday, we began our Lenten Pilgrimage with Jesus as we prepare to

celebrate Easter. However, we have some way to go with Jesus and each other before we can experience the joy and new life of Easter.

Our gospel this Sunday sees Jesus being led into the desert. The gospel puts it rather more seriously than Jesus being led into the desert! It opens with the words, The Spirit drove Jesus into the wilderness (desert) and remained with Him for forty days. Why was Jesus led or driven in to the desert?

The desert in Jewish history is very important. When God freed and saved the People of Israel from slavery in Egypt, they spent forty years in the desert. They wandered and sometimes got lost as they tried to find their way to the Promised Land. This was not an easy journey for them. At times they lost faith in each other and in God. They forgot the promise that God made with them; 'I will be your God and you will be mMy people.' As they made their way through the desert, many would have stopped travelling and settled near the closest oasis or watering hole. Some others would have joined others tribes and religions that they met on along the way. Famously, when they were at their lowest, they made a statue of a golden calf and began to worship it. They had forgotten where they had come from, what God had done for them and lost sight of where God was leading them.

It is no surprise that we begin Lent with Jesus in the desert. Like His ancestors, He too is tried, tested and tempted. However, Jesus refused to give up or give in so quickly or so easily. Although our gospel for this Sunday is written by St. Mark, the gospel of St. Matthew gives us more information about what might have happened to Jesus. He is tempted with the false gifts of power, prestige and wealth. His power and identity come from God. Jesus knows who He is, where He comes from and where He is going on His own journey. He leaves the desert with these powerful words which He offers us today; 'The time has come, the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News.' What is this Good News that Jesus asks us to hear and believe? It is the good news that each of us is created, loved and forgiven by God.

As we begin our own Lenten journey today, we need to recall and remember that we are not setting out on this journey on our own. God is with us walking by our side very step of way. When we are tempted, we need to follow the example of Jesus. He did not rely on His own strength. He turned to God and asked for help which He received. We will not be able to walk the Lenten journey on our own. We need to realize that like Jesus, we too need God's help, support, guidance and protection. Whenever we feel tired or ready to give up or give in, we need to turn to God for encouragement. We know that God will be with us during Lent as God was with Jesus when He was in the desert. God will never leave us alone.



Sacred Heart of Jesus Catholic Church Fourth Sunday of Lent March 10, 2024



At the time of Jesus, those in charge of A note the religious and social laws of the Jewish wom our Pastor people were the Scribes and Pharisees. They had reduced belief in God to

rules, laws and regulations. Anyone who could not keep these strict rules was not worthy of God and were generally kept out of the synagogue and the Temple. This meant those who were sick in any way, the poor, the widows and tax collectors. According to the Pharisees they were not worthy of God. But these were the very people that Jesus came to be with it. These are the very people to whom Jesus came with the good news that God loved them and that the Kingdom of God belonged to them. Because of this, the Scribes and Pharisees were always looking for a way to undermine Jesus. They even said of Him, 'Look this man even eat's with sinners.' Jesus in return was never afraid to challenge these religious leaders. He accused them of being hypocrites. He said that they laid burdens upon people's shoulders but did nothing to help people. They liked to be seen as important and often took the best seats in the synagogue and the Temple. He accused them of saying one thing, but then doing the very opposite.

The person in the gospel today with Jesus is called Nicodemus. He is a Pharisee. He comes to see Jesus at night because he is afraid that someone might seem him talking with Jesus. He

God loves each of us so much and so deeply that He sent Jesus so that we might have eternal life. God loves us so much and so passionately that He sent Jesus so that we may not be lost, but found. God sent us Jesus so that we will be saved, not condemned. Jesus comes to not only show us how to live but how to life fully in the

Being a Christian is not just about following rules and regulations; it is about following a person. It is about following Jesus Christ. Being a disciple of Jesus is not just or even a matter of the head; it is a matter of the heart. God, through the words, actions, life death and resurrection of Jesus offers us the gifts of reconciliation and eternal life. God through the person of Jesus reaches out to each of us; God through Jesus speaks to us. To see Jesus is to see God. To hear Jesus is to hear God. To experience Jesus is to experience God.

Jesus invited Nicodemus out the dark and into the light. As we take another step on our Lenten journey, Jesus does the same for us. We are people of the light, not the darkness. We are a people who are on a journey with Jesus to the cross and crucifixion. As Jesus asks us to walk with Him to the cross, He also invites us to share in His resurrection. Through the new life of Easter will be renewed and restored to new life in Jesus. What word or message does Jesus wants to offer you this week?

Hopefully, at this stage of the year and at this part of our Lenten journey, we have a deeper awareness that the long cold darkness of winter is behind us. By now we will


have noticed more light in the mornings and at evening time. The hibernation of creation and nature is coming to an end and new life is beginning to be seen and felt all around us.

You may have like other people sown seeds and bulbs in the ground or even in small pots during winter. When we sow seeds or bulbs, we care for them and nourish what we have sown. We water and nurture the ground and then we patiently for nature to take its course. As spring approaches what was sown is now beginning to grow and flourish. As if by a miracle beyond our control new life begins to come forth from the dark earth. The small seed sown months ago has changed and transformed into something beautiful that is beyond our dreams and imagination.

There are many different images and symbols used in scripture to talk about and describe Jesus. He talks about Himself as Light, Water, Bread, the Vine and being like a Shepherd. In the gospel this Sunday, He talks about Himself in terms of a seed being sown in the ground. There is nothing romantic in or about nature. The circle and cycle of life can be harsh and even violent. The seasons themselves do not last forever. The each come and go in their own way and in their own time. The fruitfulness of spring and summer give way to the harvest of autumn. The fruits of summer are collected and consumed in autumn

previously unseen comes to light and to birth.

Though the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, this is what happens for us. Jesus goes into the earth. There through the power of God He is changed and transformed, He emerges from the earth with new and everlasting life. This is the mystery of the cross and fruit of the resurrection. Jesus freely gives Himself to us. He offers Himself to each of us as the seed that falls to the ground and dies only to be resurrected.

Jesus does not hang on to or cling to His earthly life. Like all things in nature, He lets go when the time and conditions are right. We are almost coming to end of our Lenten Journey. Next Sunday is Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. Jesus knows His time of suffering His approaching. As we began our Lenten journey with Him, Jesus now asks to remain with Him.

Can we stay with Jesus as He falls to the ground and dies? Can we stay with Him, experience the cross with Him so that we can experience the new life and fruitfulness of His Resurrection?

A lot is going to happen A note this coming week. Jesus is going to do and say from our Pastor things that will annoy and anger the Jewish and Roman leaders. He

is going to do and say a lot of things that will confuse and challenge His closest friends, followers and even His family.

By the end of the week He will share a meal with His family and friends. He will offer Himself to them through bread and wine. He will take the place of a slave and do the unthinkable; He will wash the feet of those who are at table with Him. After this meal His closest friends will turn their backs on Him. Judas will betray Him and Peter will deny that he even knows Him. A few hours later Pilate will condemn Him to death. The soldiers will beat Him and make Him carry His own cross. On the way to Calvary, Simon will be forced to help Him carry this cross. Veronica will push her way through the crowd and wipe His face in a daring act of tender compassion.

I think the danger is that because we read and hear this story every year, we can become used to it and a bit overly familiar with it and what it means to us. The invitation and question that Passion or Palm Sunday puts before us is where am I as Jesus is going through all of this? At the

beginning of Lent each of us 'Take' Sc. Packick Pakish up your cross and I follow Me.' Am II still walking with Him or am I hiding safely at the back of the keeping crowd distance? my Where am I as Jesus carries His I cross?

Mary, the I Mother of Jesus is I the great disciple I of Holy Week. She followed Him I and stayed with Him every step of

the way. She has the courage, strength and faith to stand with the other women as He died when all the others deserted Him. As we begin our own Journey through the dramatic events of Holy Week can we stand with Mary? Can we be inspired by Her and so draw courage and strength from Her so we too can stay with Jesus?

The journey of Holy Week does not end nor stop at Calvary. But before we can stand at the empty tomb with Mary Magdalene we have to travel with Jesus as He carries His cross and stands on the Hill of Calvary. There is no resurrection without crucifixion. We are not asked to stay at the cross, but we are asked to experience the cross. Then and only then can we share in and experience the joy and new life that God freely offers each us through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. If we die with Him, we shall live with Him. If we hold firm, then we shall reign with Him. (2 Timothy 2.11)

Perhaps Holy Week offers each of us the opportunity to hear that invitation that Jesus gave us at the beginning of Lent; 'Take up your cross and follow Me.' This is invitation that Jesus gives to each of us. However, each of have to make our own

response. What's yours?

"Indeed, for your faithful, Lord, life is changed, not ended..."

These are the words prayed from the altar during funeral many Masses here and in Catholic parishes around the world. They are hopeful words that can be prayed only virtue of the Easter mystery, in which the life of Jesus was changed but



not ended. At Christmas we recall how Jesus became one of us, born of Mary, and subject to all the limitations of this world. Like Christmas, Easter shows us the God who is doing something new. On Easter God has not only raised up His Son to newness of life; God also pledged to raise us up with Jesus.

When we think about life after death, we are tempted to think of some kind of angelic existence, ethereal but without bodily substance. But the resurrection of Jesus says something more. We are meant to live eternally in our souls and in our resurrected bodies. And we do so not in isolation but in communion with all the saints of God in the heavenly kingdom. This claim is radical; it defies our earthly experience. Yet, it has been held by Christians from the moment Christ was raised: body-and-soul!

We long for redemption, and God has accomplished it in Christ. But in the crosses of our lives and the violence in our world, we are well aware of the need of God's ongoing redemption. Easter hope tells us that these too will one day be redeemed. God is not finished with that first Easter because it is intended for all times, including our own.

St. Augustine put it famously some sixteen centuries ago when he said, "We are an Easter people, and alleluia is our song." Right he was. Let us never lose hope of the promise of new life to come. Let us celebrate and nourish that hope in word and sacrament. Let us live as Easter people, for life is changed, not ended.

As just an FYI to anyone planning to attend either of these Anointing Masses: if your schedule is tight and cannot accommodate a Mass that might be slightly longer than usual, you may wish to come to the Saturday 4:00pm or the Sunday 8:15am Mass—as the sacrament of the Anointing will not be shared at those Masses.

With increasing regularity

malcontents harvest any phone number associated with either St. Patrick or

Sacred Heart parishes—and then send a text, purportedly from me, asking a "favor." What's the "favor?" They want gift cards. Lot's of gift cards. In fact, last week they asked someone for \$800 in gift cards!

Lest you think I'm immune to these scam requests, about 2 years ago I received one such text: "me" asking myself for monies. Furthermore, the text told me I couldn't call "myself" because "I" was in a meeting. Now I

do occasionally joke about having a split personality—but this was not my other personality playing a joke on me.



Any such contacts ARE SCAMS! Do not reply and, most importantly, do NOT purchase any gift cards or send any money. I will never ask a "favor" via text or email that involves anything financial. And if you do ever hear anything from me about finances, it'll likely be an invitation to place it in the Sunday collection!

Occasionally people will call requesting to have a Mass intentioned for a loved one—only to learn that there is already another intention scheduled. When told they'll need to look for another day, it's sometimes mentioned: "I sometimes see 3, 4, or 5 names as a Mass intention. Why can't you add my loved one to that list?" The answer is simple: While we can only accept one intention per Mass (meaning only one person can request an intention for the Mass), that one person requesting the Mass may list multiple names. Thus, when you

see several names listed—it's the same requester who has asked for several names as the Mass intention.

In centuries past, there were multiple intentions accepted from multiple people for a particular Mass—but this led to abuses. Thus, church law is very specific that only one individual may request an intention for Mass. And while that person may ask that several names be listed, it is still only one person requesting the Mass intention.



aspect of imitation, they sit down. The last person to be still standing is the winner and they become the leader in the next round of the game.

There are many powerful images and symbols used to talk about and describe Jesus. He even described Himself as the Bread of Life, the Vine, the Light of the World and the Water of Life. However, perhaps the most universally well known is Jesus the Good Shepherd. He is shown in many paintings, posters and prayer cards as the shepherd carrying a lamb on His shoulders.

We live in a modern world and society of famous, glamorous people; celebrities. They are on our televisions most evenings. There are magazines dedicated to them and their wealthy lifestyles. And now because of the internet and social media, we are told we can 'follow' them as they keep us up to date and informed as to what they are doing on daily basis. Some of these celebrities claim to have millions of followers. However, as we are all aware celebrities come and go very quickly. What is fashionable and trendy one month may not be as popular the next.

At the beginning of His ministry Jesus called people to follow Him with these powerful and challenging words, 'If you want to be My and disciple, come take up your cross and follow Me.' There is nothing popular, trendy or fashionable about following Jesus. In fact, I suggest it is the very opposite. This call to follow Jesus is a real, relevant and radical today for us as when Jesus first said it. Jesus is not a celebrity. He won't be fashionable one month and gone the next. He has promised to be with each of us all the time and until the end of time. He won't disappear, He won't let us down and we can rely on His word and what He says to us.

The call to follow Jesus the Good Shepherd is in open invitation. Jesus simply says, 'Come follow me.' He doesn't demand that we follow Him and He can't make us follow Him. Jesus the Good Shepherd freely invites us and asks that we follow Him out love. He invites us freely and the choice to follow Him is one that we need to make freely. Our response to follow Jesus the Shepherd needs to be based on freedom. He calls us by our name and waits for us to respond freely.

'The Lord is like a shepherd feeding His flock, gathering lambs in His arms and holding them close.' (Isaiah 40.11)

When Jesus the Good Shepherd calls us by our name to follow Him, may we respond freely, and wholly out of love.
